## INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES

US Financial 15 Split Corp. invests primarily in a portfolio of commons shares which will include each of the following U.S. financial services companies listed below:

American Express Company

Bank of America Corp.

Bank of New York Mellon Corp.

Citigroup Inc.

CME Group Inc.

Fifth Third Bancorp

Goldman Sachs Group Inc.

J.P. Morgan Chase & Co.

Morgan Stanley

PNC Financial Services Group Inc.

State Street Corp.

SunTrust Banks Inc.

US Bancorp.

Wells Fargo & Co.

The Company may also invest up to 20% of the net asset value in equity securities of issuers other than the 15 financial services companies listed above. In order to supplement the dividends received on the portfolio and to reduce risk, the Company will from time to time write covered call options in respect of some or all of the common shares in the portfolio.

The Company offers two types of shares:

### Preferred shares

The investment objectives with respect to the Preferred shares are as follows:

- 1. To provide holders with fixed cumulative preferential monthly cash dividends at an annualized rate of 5.25% of the previous month's net asset value (subject to a maximum monthly dividend of \$0.04375 per Preferred share); and
- 2. On or about the termination of December 1, 2018 (subject to further 6 year extensions thereafter) to pay holders the original issue price (\$10) of the Preferred shares.

#### Class A shares

The investment objectives with respect to the Class A shares are as follows:

- To provide holders with such dividends as the directors of the Company may from time to time determine; and
- 2. On or about the termination date to pay holders such amounts as remain after paying the holders of the Preferred shares the amounts owing to them.

### Risk

The risks of investing in the Company remain as discussed in the Annual Information Form dated February 26, 2018. In addition, note 6 of the annual financial statements ("Management of Risk of Financial Instruments") contains disclosure on specific types of risks related to the financial investments held by the Company.

### RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The U.S. financial companies held in the portfolio had a banner year driven by an overall environment of accelerating economic growth, low unemployment levels, an increasing interest rate environment and prospects for a significantly more favourable regulatory and tax environment

The U.S. Federal Reserve increased interest rates three times during the year evidencing this improving environment. A gradual rising interest rate environment generally is expected to benefit banks in terms of realizing higher net interest income and wider net interest income margins. Most of the U.S. financial services companies rallied strongly towards the end of the year as prospects for the passing of a tax reform bill increased significantly. At the end of the year, most of the U.S. financial services companies held in the portfolio were at multi year highs. Strong capital positions have allowed U.S. financial services companies to continue to increase dividends as well as institute large share huyback programs. U.S. financial service companies

dividends as well as institute large share buyback programs. U.S. financial service companies appear well positioned to benefit from further strengthening in the U.S. economy as well as the implementation of anticipated tax, trade and regulatory reform.


The net assets per unit (consisting of one Preferred share and one Class A share) finished at \$9.18 as at November 30, 2017, after the payment of \$0.45 to Preferred shares.

Net assets of the Company finished the year at \$25.8 million.

The covered call writing program continued to provide additional income and supplemented the dividend income earned in the portfolio.


#### Class A shares - Distributions

Class A shareholders will receive dividends as the directors of the Company may from time to time determine. No distributions were made during the year.



### Preferred shares - Distributions

Preferred shareholders are entitled to fixed cumulative preferential monthly cash dividends at an annualized rate of 5.25% of the previous month's net asset value (subject to a maximum monthly dividend of \$0.04375 per Preferred share). Distributions during the year amounted to \$0.44701 per Preferred share.

Management expense ratio is based on total expenses for the stated year and is expressed as an annualized percentage of average net asset value during the year.
- (3) Share issue expenses, representing all Agents' fees and other offering expenses, are one time initial expenses connected with the launch of the Company or any subsequent secondary offering.
- (4) The Company's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively Quadravest manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Company buying and selling all of the securities in its Portfolio once in the course of the year. The Company employs a covered call writing strategy which can cause the portfolio turnover rate to be higher than conventional mutual funds. The higher the Company's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Company in the year and the greater chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of the Company.
- (5) The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of average net asset value during the year.

#### Management Fees

Pursuant to the terms of the investment management agreement, Quadravest is entitled to a base management fee payable in arrears at an annual rate equal to 0.65% of the net asset value of the Company, which include the outstanding Preferred shares, calculated as at each month-end valuation date. In addition, Quadravest is entitled to receive a performance fee subject to the achievement of certain pre-established total return thresholds.


Pursuant to the management agreement, Quadravest is entitled to an administration fee payable monthly in arrears at an annual rate equal to 0.1% of the net asset value of the Company, which includes the outstanding Preferred shares, calculated as at each month-end valuation date and an amount equal to the service fee payable to dealers on the Class A shares at a rate of 0.50% per annum. No service fee will be paid in any calendar quarter if regular dividends are not paid to holders of Class A shares in respect of each month in such calendar quarter.

The base management fee was used by Quadravest to provide investment analysis, make investment decisions, and make brokerage arrangements for the purchase and sale of securities including the covered call writing program. The administration fee was used to provide or arrange administrative services required by the Company which includes all operational services, financial accounting, shareholder reporting and regulatory reporting.

### PAST PERFORMANCE Year-by-Year Returns

The past performance of 1) the net asset value per unit; 2) the Preferred share on a net asset value basis; and 3) the Class A share on a net asset value basis for each of the last 10 years are presented in the bar charts below. Each bar in the chart reflects the change in percentage terms of how a unit, a Preferred share or a Class A share would have increased or decreased during the applicable year. In respect to the charts displayed below, please note the following:

- The performance information shown assumes that all cash distributions made by the Company during the years shown were reinvested in the applicable additional securities of the Company;
- The performance information does not take into account sales, redemption, distribution or other optional charges that would have reduced returns or performance; and



### 1. Incorporation

US Financial 15 Split Corp. (the "Company") is a mutual fund corporation established under the laws of the Province of Ontario on December 17, 2004 that began investment operations on February 15, 2005. The manager and the investment manager of the Company is Quadravest Capital Management Inc. ("Quadravest" or "Manager"). The termination date of the Company is December 1, 2018 and may be extended thereafter at the Company's discretion for additional terms of six years each. Shareholders would be provided with a special retraction right in connection with any such extension. The Company's principal office is located at 200 Front Street West, Suite 2510, Toronto, Ontario M5V 3K2. The Company invests in an actively managed portfolio of common shares comprised primarily of 15 core large capitalization U.S. financial services companies. The Company employs an active covered call writing program to enhance the income earned from the portfolio.

### 2. Sufficiency of Assets

The Company has 2,808,191 Preferred shares outstanding as at November 30, 2017 with a principal repayment target of \$10 per Preferred share for a total of \$28,081,910 due on the termination date, December 1, 2018. As at November 30, 2017 the Company has net assets equivalent to \$9.18 per Preferred share for a total of \$25,781,431. This represents a deficiency as at November 30, 2017 of \$0.82 per Preferred share for a total deficiency of \$2,300,479, as compared to the principal repayment amount.

### 3. Basis of presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") as published by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB"). These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities (including derivative financial instruments) at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL").

These financial statements were authorized for issue by Quadravest on February 26, 2018.

### 4. Summary of significant accounting policies

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies followed by the Company.

#### Investments and financial instruments

The Company recognizes financial instruments at fair value upon initial recognition.

The Company's investments are designated at fair value through profit and loss ("FVTPL") and derivatives (including options) are held for trading and also carried at FVTPL.

The Company recognizes regular purchases and sales of financial instruments on the trade date, which is the date on which it commits to purchase or sell the instrument. Transaction costs, such as brokerage commissions, related to financial assets classified or designated as at FVTPL are expensed as incurred and transaction costs related to financial instruments not at FVTPL are included in the carrying amounts thereof. A financial asset is derecognized when the rights to receive cash flows from the investment have expired or have been transferred and when the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset. Dividends are recognized as income on the ex-dividend date. Realized gains and losses and unrealized appreciation and depreciation are determined on an average cost basis. The cost of investments is determined using the average cost method.

Written option premiums received by the Company are, so long as the options are outstanding, reflected as a liability, in the Statements of Financial Position and are valued

at an amount equal to the current market value of an option that would have the effect of closing the position. Gains or losses realized upon expiration or exercise of the option are included in net realized gain (loss) on investments and derivatives in the Statements of Comprehensive Income/(Loss).

The Preferred shares rank prior to the Class A and Class B shares and are thus not subordinate to all other classes of puttable instruments and therefore, the shares have been classified as financial liabilities. These shares are carried at amortized cost. Amortization of premiums or discounts on the issuance of Preferred shares is included in gain (loss) on remeasurement of Preferred shares in the Statements of Comprehensive Income/(Loss).

The Class B shares are subordinate to the Preferred shares but rank prior to the Class A shares and are thus not subordinate to all other classes of puttable instruments and therefore, the shares have been classified as financial liabilities. These shares are carried at amortized cost.

The Class A shares may be retracted monthly, annually, or on the termination date of the Company. As a result, the shares contain multiple contractual obligations, and therefore, have been presented as financial liabilities at the annual redemption amount.

Financial assets and liabilities other than investments, derivatives, and Class A shares are recognized initially at the amount expected to be received or paid less, when material, a discount to reduce them to fair value. Subsequently, they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method less a provision for impairment, if any. Due to their short-term nature, the fair values of these financial assets and liabilities approximate their carrying amounts.

The net asset value of the Company is determined in accordance with requirements of law, including National Instrument 81-106, Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure, and is used to process shareholder transactions. For financial reporting purposes, net assets of the Company is determined as the difference between the aggregate amount of the Company's assets and the aggregate amount of its liabilities ("Net Assets of the Company").

### Valuation of investments

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active markets (such as publicly traded shares and options) are based on the last traded prices at the close of trading on the reporting date. The Company uses the last traded market price for both financial assets and financial liabilities where the last traded price falls within that day's bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager determines the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of fair value based on the specific facts and circumstances. The Company's policy is to recognize transfers into and out of the fair value hierarchy levels as of the date of the event or change in circumstances giving rise to the transfer.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques. The Company uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each reporting date. Valuation techniques include the use of comparable recent arm's length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and others commonly used by market participants and which make the maximum use of observable inputs. Refer to note 6 for further information about the Company's fair value measurements.

### Cash

Cash consists of cash on hand.

### Translation of foreign currencies

The Company's functional and presentation currency is Canadian dollars. The fair value of investments and other assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into the Company's functional currency at the rates of exchange prevailing at each measurement date. Purchases and sales of investments, income and expenses are translated at the rates of exchange prevailing on the respective dates of such transactions.

### Management fees, administration fees and performance fees

Management fees and administration fees are accrued by the Company over time, as services are rendered by Quadravest. At each measurement date, the Company recognizes an expense and financial liability based on the amount, if any, of performance fees expected to be paid based on net asset value of the Company. Refer to note 9 for further information about the calculation of management, administration fees and performance fees, if any, of the Company.

### Increase (decrease) in Net Assets Attributable to Holders per Redeemable Class A share

Increase (decrease) in net assets attributable to holders per redeemable Class A share based on the increase or decrease in net assets attributable to holders of redeemable Class A shares divided by the weighted average number of such shares outstanding during the year. Refer to note 10 for the calculation.

### **Taxation**

The Company qualifies as a mutual fund corporation under the Income Tax Act (Canada) (the "Tax Act") and it is subject to income tax in each taxation year on the amount of its net income for the taxation year, including net realized taxable capital gains, if any, at the rate applicable to mutual fund corporations. The general income tax rules associated with a public corporation also apply to a mutual fund corporation with the exception that taxes payable on net realized capital gains are refundable on a formula basis when its shares are redeemed or when it pays capital gains dividends out of its capital gains dividend account to its shareholders.

Interest and foreign income are taxed at normal corporate rates applicable to mutual fund corporations and can be reduced by permitted deductions for tax purposes.

All of the Company's expenses including management fees, administration fees and operating expenses will be taken into account in determining its overall tax liability.

As a mutual fund corporation, taxable dividends received from taxable Canadian corporations are subject to a Part IV tax of 38 1/3% (33 1/3% for dividends received on or before December 31, 2015). Such taxes are fully refundable upon payment of taxable dividends to its shareholders on a basis of \$1.15 for every \$3 of dividends paid (\$1 for every \$3 of dividends paid on or before December 31, 2015). Any such tax paid is reported as an amount receivable until recovered through the payment to shareholders of dividends out of net investment income. All tax on net taxable realized capital gains is refundable when the gains are distributed to shareholders as capital gains dividends or through redemption of shares at the request of shareholders, while the Company qualifies as a mutual fund corporation. As a result of the capital gains refund mechanism and Part IV tax refunds, the Company recovers any Canadian income taxes paid in respect of its capital gains and taxable Canadian dividends. As a result, the Company has determined that it is in substance not taxable. Consequently, the tax benefit of capital and non-capital losses and other temporary differences have not been reflected in the Statements of Financial Position as deferred income tax assets or liabilities.

The Company has estimated accumulated non capital losses for tax purposes of \$2,650,082 (November 30, 2016-\$2,641,929) that are available to lower taxable income in future years if required and expire after the scheduled termination date of the Company on December 1, 2018. The Company also has estimated accumulated capital losses for tax purposes of \$57,370,158 (November 30, 2016-\$57,327,696) which may be used to lower future capital gains if required.

The Company currently incurs withholding taxes imposed by certain countries on investment income and capital gains. Such income and gains are recorded on a gross basis and the related withholding taxes are shown as a separate expense in the Statements of Comprehensive Income/(Loss).

### 5. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of these financial statements include estimates and assumptions by management based on past experiences, present conditions and expectations of future events. Where estimates were made, the reported amounts for assets, liabilities, income and expenses may differ from the amounts that would otherwise be reflected if the ultimate outcome of all uncertainties and future events were known at the time these financial statements were prepared. The Company's most significant estimates involve the measurement of investments and derivatives at fair value as described in note 6. The following discusses the most significant accounting judgments that the Company has made in preparing the financial statements:

### Classification and measurement of investments and application of the fair value option

In classifying and measuring financial instruments held by the Company, the Manager is required to make significant judgments about whether or not the business of the Company is to invest on a total return basis for the purpose of applying the fair value option for financial assets under IAS 39, Financial Instruments – Recognition and Measurement (IAS 39). The most significant judgments made include the determination that certain financial instruments are held-for-trading, and that the fair value option can be applied to investments in financial assets which are not.

### 6. Management of Risk of Financial Instruments

The Company classifies fair value measurements within a hierarchy which gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and lowest priority to unobservable inputs. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can assess at the measurement date;

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and

Level 3 - Inputs that are unobservable for the asset or liability.

<sup>\*</sup> The Company employs an active and integrated strategy of writing call options on the underlying equity holdings in the portfolio. The requirement to measure and attribute gains separately to either derivatives or the underlying equities may not reflect the relative contributions and benefits from implementing this strategy. As an example, written call options that are subsequently repurchased and/or rolled as part of the active covered call writing program would have had the effect of lowering reported gains from derivatives (which would have otherwise occurred had the written call option been exercised or expired), while achieving other gains to the portfolio that would have been measured and attributed to the underlying equity holdings.

The Company's investment activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including price risk, interest rate risk and currency risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

Any sensitivity analysis presented below may differ from actual results and the difference could be material.

#### Market Price Risk

All securities investments present a risk of loss of capital. The 15 core holdings were selected because of their long term history of above average market price appreciation and dividend growth. These Portfolio companies were selected from the financial services index of the S&P 500 index and are among the largest financial services companies in United States.

The market price risk is affected by three main components: price risk, interest rate risk and foreign currency movements.

### Price risk

Other price risk is the risk that the value of financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk).

The Manager manages market price risk by limiting investment in any one portfolio company to no more than 10% of the net asset value of the Company at the time of purchase.

In addition, the supplemental covered call writing program generates an additional stream of income to the portfolio which may also help mitigate against market price declines during years in which a particular portfolio company has a covered call option written against that position.

Since the 15 core holdings are significant components of their corresponding financial services index, it would be reasonable to expect that the Company's portfolio will exhibit market price movements that are reflective and generally highly correlated with those particular securities and to a lesser extent with the price movements of the S&P U.S. financial services index based on the underlying composition of the portfolio.

The Company is exposed to other price risk from its investment in equity securities and written options. As at November 30, 2017, had the prices on the respective stock exchanges for these equity securities increased by 10%, with all other variables held constant, Net Assets of the Company would have increased by \$2,340,000 (November 30, 2016–\$2,321,142). Similarly, had the prices on the respective stock exchanges for these equity securities decreased by 10%, with all other variables held constant, Net Assets of the Company would have decreased by \$2,460,000 (November 30, 2016–\$2,321,142).

#### Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of interest bearing investments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The majority of the Company's financial assets and liabilities are non interest bearing. As a result, the Company is not subject to significant amounts of risk due to fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates and considers interest rate risk insignificant.

### Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that financial instruments that are denominated in a currency other than the Canadian dollar, which is the Company's reporting currency, will fluctuate due to changes in exchange rates. All portfolio holdings are listed on the New York stock exchange and trade in U.S. dollars. As at November 30, 2017, 100.1% (November 30, 2016-100.4%) of the Net Assets of the Company are invested in U.S. dollar denominated assets which includes U.S. dollar cash held. As a result, the Company's Net Assets will be affected by changes in the U.S. dollar relative to the Canadian dollar which is the functional currency of the Company. As a result, if the Canadian dollar appreciated/depreciated by 5% against the U.S. dollar, the Net Assets of the Company would currently decrease/increase by approximately \$1,291,000 (November 30, 2016-\$1,191,900).

#### Other risks

#### Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay amounts in full when due. All of the Company's transactions are in listed securities and options and are settled and paid for using approved brokers. The risk of default is considered minimal as delivery of securities sold is only made once the broker has received payment (consistent with previous year). Payment is made on purchase once the securities have been received by the broker. Credit risk of cash is considered low as it is held at a AA-rated Canadian bank (consistent with prior year).

### Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company may not be able to settle or meet its obligations on time or at a reasonable price. The Company is exposed to liquidity risk primarily through its monthly and annual retractions of Class A shares and Preferred shares. The Company receives adequate notice for all retraction requests. The Company's portfolio is invested in highly liquid large capitalization investments that trade on the New York Stock Exchange ('NYSE") (consistent with previous year). All Class A shares and Preferred shares outstanding are redeemable on a monthly and annual basis but are scheduled to be redeemed upon termination of the Company. All other financial liabilities are payable, except warrants, within three months from the end of the year.

#### Concentration risk

The Company's holdings are concentrated in the financial services sector and as such will be exposed to the specific factors that affect this sector (consistent with previous year). An individual Portfolio holding may represent no more than 10% of the net asset value of the Company at the time of purchase.

All Preferred shares outstanding on the termination date will be redeemed by the Company on that date. The Preferred shares have been presented as liabilities in the financial statements.

Preferred shares trade under the symbol "FTU.PR.B" on the TSX. Preferred shares trading price on the TSX was \$8.38 as at November 30, 2017 (November 30, 2016-\$8.00). Preferred shares may be surrendered at any time for retraction at specified retraction amounts, but will be retracted only on the last day of each month. Shareholders who concurrently retract a Preferred share and a

Class A share (together, a "unit") in the month of February in each year will be entitled to receive an amount equal to the net asset value per unit calculated on the last day of February. Preferred shares retracted in any other month will receive a retraction price based on a discounted specified retraction formula. Under the terms of a recirculation agreement, the Company may, but is not obligated to, require the recirculation agent to use its best efforts to find purchasers for any Preferred shares or Class A shares tendered for retraction.

The Preferred shares rank in priority to the Class A shares with respect to the payment of dividends. Preferred shares rank in priority to the Class A shares upon termination of the Company. Upon termination of the Company, Preferred shareholders will receive the lower of the net asset value or \$10 per Preferred share.

Class A shares may be surrendered at any time for retraction at specified retraction amounts, but will be retracted only on the last day of each month. Shareholders who concurrently retract a Class A share and a Preferred share (together, a "unit") in the month of February in each year will be entitled to receive an amount equal to the net asset value per unit calculated on the last day of February. Class A shares retracted in any other month will receive a retraction price based on a discounted specified retraction formula. Under the terms of a recirculation agreement, the Company may, but is not obligated to, require the recirculation agent to use its best efforts to find purchasers for any Preferred shares or Class A shares tendered for retraction. Gains or losses from the redemption of shares, if any, are recorded in gain (loss) on redemptions on the Statements of Comprehensive Income/ (Loss). The Preferred shares rank in priority to the Class A shares with respect to the payment of dividends. Upon the termination of the Company, Class A shareholders will receive an amount equal to any excess of net asset value per unit less \$10 (the redemption value of the Preferred shares).

The holders of Class B shares are not entitled to receive dividends. The Class B shares are retractable at a price of \$1.00 per share. Class B shareholders are entitled to one vote per share. On February 15, 2005, the Company issued 1,000 Class B shares to Quadravest, the Company's investment manager, for cash consideration of \$1,000.

### 9. Expenses

The Company is responsible for all expenses incurred in connection with the operation and administration of the Company, including, but not limited to, ongoing custodian, transfer agent, legal and audit expenses.

Pursuant to the administration agreement, Quadravest is entitled to an administration fee payable monthly in arrears at an annual rate of 0.10% of the net asset value of the Company, which includes the outstanding Preferred shares, calculated as at each month-end valuation date and an amount equal to the service fee payable to dealers on the Class A shares at a rate of 0.50% of the net asset value attributable to Class A shares per annum. No service fee will be paid in any calendar quarter if regular dividends are not paid to holders of Class A shares in respect of each month in such calendar quarter.

Pursuant to the terms of the investment management agreement, Quadravest is entitled to a base management fee payable in arrears at an annual rate equal to 0.65% of the net asset value of the Company, which includes the outstanding Preferred shares, calculated as at each month-end valuation date. In addition, Quadravest is entitled to receive a performance fee subject to the achievement of certain pre-established total return thresholds.

The monthly discount to net asset value of 2% applicable to the redemption of Preferred shares and Class A shares is payable to Quadravest. Redemption fees paid for the year ending November 30, 2017 were \$NIL (November 30, 2016-\$46,124).

Total management fees of \$181,050 (November 30, 2016-\$152,019), incurred during the year, include the administration fee and base management fee. As at November 30, 2017, \$15,497 (November 30, 2016-\$31,286) was payable to the Manager with respect to management and administrative fees and redemption fees. No performance fees were paid in 2017 or 2016.

Total brokerage commissions paid during the year by the Company for its portfolio transactions was \$6,765 (November 30, 2016-\$3,433).

### 11. Capital Management

The Company considers its capital to consist of Class A, Class B and Preferred shares.

The Company's objectives in managing its capital are:

- i) to provide holders of Preferred shares with cumulative preferential monthly cash dividends in an amount of an annual rate of 5.25% of the previous month end net asset value (subject to a maximum monthly dividend of \$0.04375 per Preferred share) and return the notional issue price of \$10.00, at the time of the redemption of such shares on the termination date; and
- ii) to provide holders of Class A shares with such dividends as the directors of the Company may from time to time determine and to pay on the termination date such amounts as remain after paying the holders of Preferred shares the amounts owing to them.

In order to manage its capital structure, the Company may adjust the amount of dividends paid to shareholders or return capital to shareholders.

# 12. Accounting Standards, Interpretations and Amendments to Existing Standards Not Yet Effective

The final version of IFRS 9, Financial instruments, was issued by the IASB in July 2014 and will replace IAS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement. IFRS 9 introduces a model for classification and measurement, a single, forward-looking 'expected loss' impairment model and a substantially reformed approach to hedge accounting. The new single, principle based approach for determining the classification of financial assets is driven by cash flow characteristics and the business model in which an asset is held. The new model also results in a single impairment model being applied to all financial instruments, which will require more timely recognition of expected credit losses. It also includes changes in respect of credit risk in measuring liabilities elected to be measured at fair value, so that gains caused by the deterioration of an entity's own credit risk on such liabilities are no longer recognised in profit or loss. IFRS 9 is effective for annual years beginning on or after January 1, 2018, however it is available for early adoption. In addition, the own credit changes can be early applied in isolation without otherwise changing the accounting for financial instruments. The Company is in the process of assessing the impact of IFRS 9.
