"College Admissions Scandal: Actresses, Business Leaders and Other Wealthy Parents Charged," New York Times 3.12.19

The federal government today announced charges against dozens of families that used their wealth to buy their child's way into some of the most competitive colleges in the country. In announcing today's charges, United States attorney Andrew Lelling said, "The real victims in this case are the hardworking students," who lost out on the opportunity to attend these schools to "far less qualified students and their families who simply bought their way in."
