PROVINCE DELIVERS ON COMMITMENT TO FREEZE BC HYDRO RATES

The British Columbia government is delivering on its promise to freeze BC Hydro rates, putting an end to the years of spiralling electricity costs that have made life less affordable for B.C. homeowners and renters, Minister of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources Michelle Mungall announced today.

BC Hydro rates have gone up by more than 24% in the last four years, and by more than 70% since 2001. Mungall says that in 2016, BC Hydro applied to the BC Utilities Commission for three years of increases, with a 3% increase planned next year, but will be pulling back its request, consistent with this administration's commitment to a rate freeze.

"After years of escalating electricity costs, British Columbians deserve a break on their bills," said Mungall. "From the moment we took office, we've taken action to make life more affordable. As part of that, we're going to make sure that BC Hydro is working for the benefit of all British Columbians and that its rates reflect that commitment."

The rate freeze will provide government the time to undertake a comprehensive review of BC Hydro. That review will identify changes and cost savings to keep rates low while ensuring BC Hydro has the resources it needs to continue to provide clean, safe and reliable electricity. Details of the scope and process for the review will be developed once government has made a final decision on Site C.

After completing a comprehensive review of BC Hydro, any cost and revenue adjustments identified will be reflected in rates starting in April 2019.

The rate freeze follows government's commitment in its September budget update to phase out the provincial sales tax on electricity.

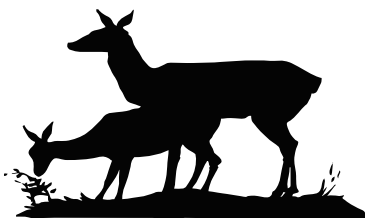

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MAYOR'S REPORT

November 10, 2017

Today is Budget day when Council will deliberate on the values we hold as representatives of the District of Chetwynd. After all, the collective values held determine virtually every outcome. As elected representatives it is assumed that Council values reflect generally the values of the majority of residents, though the values of any one of us as an individual will not necessarily represent the collective perspective.

One value we hold to be uppermost is that Mayor and Council have a fiduciary relationship to the resources we oversee. That is, we are trustees of the public resources and do not have the liberty to manage them as if they were our own.

This is, and always must be, the guiding principle for every decision we make on the allocation of public resources. Hence, decisions do not come quickly. It takes time to understand the various points of view brought to the Council table. It takes more time to reduce these points of view to coherent statements of fiscal policy.

So now we come to the values we hold as individual members of the Mayor and Council collective. You will be able to see more clearly why time is important, mutual respect is essential, and occasional compromise the lubricant to keep the discussion moving toward solutions.

Value: Taxes should not be raised.

Counter value: A tax not raised is in fact a tax that is reduced.

A tax that is reduced over time may result in reduced services, layoff of staff, or at best, a tightening of the fiscal belt. (Not necessarily a bad move even when taxes are raised.) A Council that does not raise taxes for a number of years will leave to the next Council problems that will take years to correct. Yet none of us like taxes.

Value: Attractive streets.

Counter value: Money spent on flowers might be better directed to building sidewalks.

Maybe.

Value: Ongoing maintenance of equipment and facilities.

Counter value: Can't think of a counter value. Who can argue against keeping up the value of community assets? To fail to maintain our collective assets would be akin to setting out pails to capture the rainwater from a leaky roof – or just letting it run.

Value: No debt. Period.

Counter value: Some debt is defensible and in some cases may demonstrate better fiscal management than a no-debt policy.

Consider the East Trunk Main as a project for which borrowing was authorized. Council could have instructed Management to postpone other important projects and save funds for a year or two or three and then build without debt. In the meantime the old main continues to deteriorate and residents are put at risk. Is that good management? Is that what the citizens really want?

Furthermore, the project now becomes a user-pay endeavour. During the twenty years of paying down the debt it is the users who pay.

On the other hand, reckless indebtedness to pay for golden statues is to be avoided. Period.

Value: Attractive recreational facilities suited to a variety of needs and interests.

Counter value: Go climb your own hill.

It is obvious that Chetwynd has embraced elements of both values and in doing so we have demonstrated another: we will always seek the good of our neighbours in the Regional District. Cooperation is a key to success. We are thankful for good neighbours!

Of course there are other values that will come up in Council deliberations but these few give you an idea of the complexity of the process that leads to decisions.

Oh, by the way, there are three things about which everyone must think: "Whence you came. Where you are going. To whom you must account" (B. Franklin, 1706-1790).

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EDITORIAL

Why is Remembrance Day so important? What do you think of when people say Remembrance Day? The first thing that comes to my mind is the World Wars, and then the Holocaust. It's hard to put words together to describe it. All you need to do is Google Holocaust and look through the images to know what I mean.

I think to myself, "How could that *actually* have happened?"

Almost inconceivably, it did. In fact, there were men and women who were there – several from Chetwynd itself – that fought for our freedom and won that war so that we wouldn't have to live against our will under one man's rule. They experienced things we can't even imagine, and they did it for us. Isn't that crazy? Someone from as far back as 78 years ago fought for us so that we could have freedom today.

Even having that knowledge, those wars were such a long time ago that the concept of them is sometimes hard for me to grasp. They can seem so far removed from my life in Chetwynd that it's easy to forget. As our Veterans from that time grow older and pass away, I fear the memories of the sacrifices that they already share and would have continued to share with us will fade away.

But did you know that Remembrance Day isn't just for the fallen, but for those that have ever served, still alive and fighting or not? Believe it or not, I just found that out this year.

With that in mind, it would be silly for me to apply Remembrance Day to only the past, because anyone that's paying attention to the news knows that the horrors of war are still happening.

You've probably seen the footage of the shell-shocked boy pulled from rubble, so stunned he didn't speak, or the body of the boy washed ashore a Turkish beach, or the chemical weapon attack on a small town in Syria. There are soldiers even at this very moment that are fighting to stop the wars that produced those terrible outcomes in the first place.

Do you see why it's so important to remember?

Veteran Affairs Canada puts it this way, "By remembering their service and their sacrifice, we recognize the tradition of freedom these men and women fought to preserve. They believed that their actions in the present would make a significant difference for the future, but it is up to us to ensure that their dream of peace is realized. On Remembrance Day, we acknowledge the courage and sacrifice of those who served their country and acknowledge our responsibility to work for the peace they fought hard to achieve.

During times of war, individual acts of heroism occur frequently; only a few are ever recorded and receive official recognition. By remembering all who have served, we recognize their willingly-endured hardships and fears, taken upon themselves so that we could live in peace."

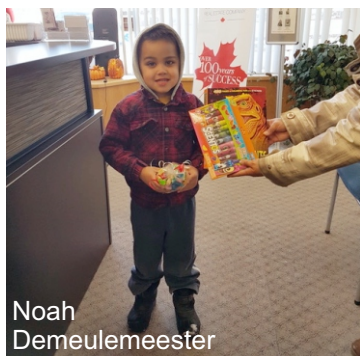
