CHETYWYND COUNCIL MEETING

The October 3rd council meeting began with the opening statement and the adoption of the agenda, with Councillor Mel Deck acting as Deputy Mayor for the meeting.

The first presentation was by April Whyte and Luisa Surerus from Success by 6. The two ladies described their ideas for an indoor playground that would be open 12 months of the year, and were looking for support from the council. They provided survey results from a recent survey they did a few months ago. The results came back with 89% of people who took it saying they would use the indoor playground for free, and only 40% saying they would be willing to pay a fee. The council asked whether they had sought out potential buildings. At this point, the ladies have no set area in which the indoor playground can operate from.

The next presentation was from Ana Peasgood of the Chetwynd Public Library with an update on business. She began by giving a few statistics of the library. Specifically, the junior fiction genre of books was the highest borrowed book with 28%. Followed closely at 24% was children's books in 2015. Additionally, between 2014 and 2015 there was a 5% increase in cardholders and a 75% increase in program attendance, and because of this they have roughly doubled the amount of programs they're offering for this year.

There was a temporary land permit request from Somerville-Aecon, who are constructing the Jackfish pipeline project for Spectra. The permit will allow Somerville-Aecon to install temporary bulk fuel tanks on the property beside the new car wash. After the completion of the application and payment of fees, the company will be granted permission to install the bulk fuel tanks.

The last item discussed was in regards to the Legion's fundraiser for the Veteran Banner Program. The Community Improvement Committee has teamed up with the Legion on this project to get companies and families to purchase banners that will be hung up along Veterans' Way. Each banner is \$600. One banner has already been purchased by the Tansi Friendship Centre featuring Veteran Albert Flett and will be hung up in time for Remembrance Day. The hardware to hang the

banners comes at a cost of approximately \$126 a set and the council has agreed to pay the cost of hardware for each banner that is purchased.

Thanksgiving has been celebrated for centuries in different countries around the world. The first accounts of harvest celebrations date back to ancient times, where Egyptians, Greeks and Romans would have magnificent feasts and thank their gods for their bountiful fall harvest. Ancestral Native Americans also had a rich history of commemorating the fall harvest.

In 1621 Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Indians shared a harvest feast in what we know now as Massachusetts. They gathered together to celebrate the wonderful harvest they had after a year of sickness and scarcity the year prior. Since then people have celebrated fall harvest by gathering and sharing feasts.

During and after the American Revolution, American refugees who were loyal to Great Britain

moved north to Canada and brought with them customs of thanksgiving.

Canadian and American colonies continued to celebrate Thanksgiving on different days in either October or November. It wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday to be celebrated in the third week in November.

In 1879, Canadian parliament did the same and declared Thanksgiving a holiday. The date bounced around year to year between October and November until 1957 when it was ultimately decided it take place the second Monday of October.

The cornucopia, or horn of plenty, was a symbol of abundance and nourishment that derived from ancient mythology and was later adopted as a decorative piece to display the overflowing bounty of vegetables, nuts and fruit from fall harvest.

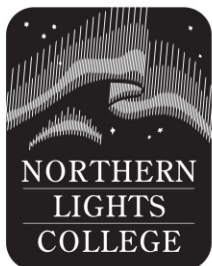
Whether you celebrate with turkey and stuffing or glazed ham and brussels sprouts, gathering together with family and friends is something you can always be thankful for.

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MEET THE MAYOR

Resource extraction and you. Did you ever feel like a lower-class or non-person when exposed to the vibes emanating from the professional protesters? As one whose living is derived from beneath the ground (oil, gas, coal) or above the ground (forestry) do you ever feel misunderstood, abused? Let's face it Chetwynd (and all our friends throughout the great North East), we are all party to the results of resource extraction. The products we dig out of the earth or cut from the mountain sides are basic resources that have to be transported and refined to make them palatable to the end user. Some of those end users are waving placards and protesting your occupation as you read these words. What is our answer? How can we justify our role as those who live on the pain of the earth? Let's consider for just a moment some of the products and services we all, protesters included, take for granted every sunny day.

And let's start with food. Not too long ago the hundred-mile diet was a popular way of saving the planet. Ever try to live on one of those? Check out your grocery store. How many of the items on your grocery list originated within 100 miles? Or even 1000 miles? Oh, sure, if you're the beneficiary of a multigenerational piece of earth that will grow vegetables and perhaps a little fruit you might, with grit and determination be able to eke out a subsistence – but most of us don't have the land or the means to acquire the land. Hence, the grocery store and the wholesaler and the farmer who can and the packager and the transporter and the go-between. Guess what: it takes stuff from our mines, wells, and forests to get the food to our tables.

Clothing: with winter approaching more rapidly than most of us care to admit, we'll have to check out our wardrobes to see if last winter's duds are up to another season. And if not, back we go to the haberdashery. And guess again: it takes stuff from our mines, wells, and forests to keep Jack Frost off our tender parts.

Heating and lighting: no, the candle won't do it in these enlightened times. It's more polluting than the incandescent bulb. And for some of us, the old fashioned airtight heater is nothing but a bad, bad memory – the rest of us haven't heard of it. So, to keep our houses liveable in these climes we need more of that stuff from under the ground.

Transportation: let's be candid here. Some of us could get comfortably by with a little less rubber on the road. We could. I'm not saying we should. The should is up to your needs and conscience. But even for basic transportation (protesters included) we need our mines, petroleum wells, and forests.

Books (forests, mines, and gas wells), electronics (mines and gas wells), furniture (mines, gas wells, forests), shelter (forests, mines, gas wells.) Perhaps we could do with less.

It seems that our daily existence is bound up in a bundle with the fields, forests, mountains, and the great mysteries beneath the surface. Go as far back in time as you can measure: metal mining was a part of society practiced out of sight of the upper classes on the backs of slaves whose life spans were very short. Forestry, as practised by the Romans did not serve to maintain a healthy forest. Still trees grow.

I submit that our modern methods of resource extraction are far in advance of those of the ancients. Do we still need the protesters? Probably. They serve to draw our attention to the things we are doing and, yes, we do need to improve our stewardship of the Creator's handiwork.

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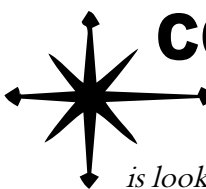

We thank all applicants for their interest, however, only those selected for an interview will be contacted. Preference will be given to persons of Aboriginal ancestry in the event of equal qualifications.

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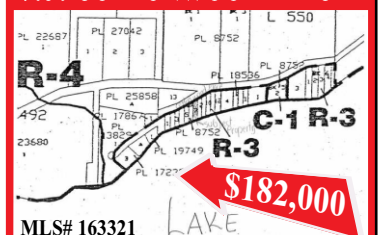
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
