


Province Introduces New Measures For Covid Safety

Police and other provincial enforcement officers are being given the ability to issue \$2,000 violation tickets for owners or organizers contravening the provincial health officer's (PHO) order on gatherings and events. They will also be able to issue \$200 violation tickets to individuals not following the direction of police or enforcement staff at events or who refuse to comply with requests to follow PHO orders or safe operating procedures, or respond with abusive behaviour.



Effective immediately, these new measures are enacted under the provincial state of emergency, using the extraordinary powers of the Emergency Program Act (EPA) in ongoing support of B.C.'s COVID-19 response and Restart Plan. "These orders will help us put a stop to the selfish acts of a small minority of British Columbians, who are threatening to erode the progress our province has made in controlling COVID-19," said Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General. "While I'm disappointed these measures are now necessary, I am taking this action to give police agencies and provincial enforcement officers the ability to take action against those who are putting people's lives at risk." In addition to enabling action from police, the Province is enlisting compliance and enforcement staff from provincial ministries to support enforcement and help issue tickets for the duration of the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes liquor, cannabis and gaming inspectors, community safety unit inspectors and conservation officers. "As a regional federation of local governments, we welcome these new measures, and we look forward to collaborating with the Province to ensure a co-ordinated and thoughtful response to COVID-19." said Linda Buchanan, vice-chair, Metro Vancouver board of directors. "Metro Vancouver will continue its critical role as a convener on ideas and strategies for preventing the spread of COVID-19 in our region and supporting the Province in keeping COVID-19 at bay."



The enforcement focus will be on \$2,000 fines to owners, operators and organizers for contraventions of the provincial health officer's order on gatherings and events. This includes hosting a private party or public event in excess of 50 people, failing to provide appropriate hand sanitation and washroom facilities, failing to provide sufficient space in the venue for physical distancing, failing to obtain a list of names and contacts at large event or having more than five guests gathered in a vacation accommodation.

When required, police and other provincial enforcement officers will also be able to actively enforce the order and ticket a series of other infractions, including:

\$200 violation tickets for individuals who actively encourage others to attend gatherings or events that do not comply with established requirements, or refuse to leave or disperse when directed to do so by enforcement officers; and, \$200 violation tickets for individuals who refuse to comply with requests to follow the PHO order or safe operating procedures of a restaurant, bar or other licensed establishment, or respond with abusive behaviour towards employees. Violation tickets expand the Province's enforcement toolkit to support the COVID-19 response. Police and other provincial enforcement officers will independently exercise discretion to issue tickets for Emergency Program Act order violations under the Offence Act's Violation Ticket Administration and Fines Regulation.

If violation tickets do not act as a deterrent, or in cases of particularly egregious contraventions or for repeat offenders, police can recommend charges in relation to the offence. On conviction, judicial penalties of up to \$10,000 may be levied.

"ABLE BC is pleased to see the Province step up compliance and enforcement during this recent surge in COVID-19 cases, and we're happy to assist where we can," said Jeff Guignard, executive director of the Alliance of Beverage Licensees. "Our primary concern continues to be the health and safety of both patrons and workers in British Columbia."

Working in partnership with local governments and other agencies, a comprehensive and integrated compliance and enforcement regime is being built to manage the recent surge in COVID-19 cases. These violation tickets build on existing tools, such as the ability to suspend or revoke the business or liquor licenses of problematic operators.

The Great French Mustache Strike

The stock image that comes to many people's minds when picturing 19th and early 20th century Frenchmen usually involves a mustache. However, one group of Frenchmen that went smooth-shaven during that era were domestic servants and waiters. For whatever reason, the French bourgeoisie and upper classes of the day wanted to mark off those "menials", and so deprived them, as a condition of employment, of the right to sport a mustache. "Sentenced to forced shaving", was how a contemporary newspaper put it.

That came to be seen as degrading and intolerable by the 'stache-less, so, being French, they went on strike. In 1907, high-end waiters in Paris and the rest of France went on strike to demand higher wages, fewer working hours, and the right to grow a mustache just like other Frenchmen. The strike captivated the country, and forced a reckoning with the classist injustice under its nose. After two weeks, the strikers finally prevailed, and French waiters won the right to a mustache.

In the summer of 1698, Charles' cousin, the Duke of Holstein-Gottorp, visited Stockholm to marry the king's sister. The duke was ten years older than the king and seemed to have a bad influence on him. The pair committed a variety of outrageous acts that summer and it became known as the "Gottorp Fury." Their antics included throwing furniture out of the palace windows, throwing cherry pits at the king's ministers, and taking a group of young people through the streets to wreak havoc.

The young king finally toned down his behavior after a bear was killed at one of his parties. The bear had been forced to drink wine, and then it fell out of a window. When it happened, Charles vowed never to drink strong alcohol again. With only a few exceptions, he kept his vow until his death in 1718.





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Small businesses, employers worried about what's to come By Mike Bernier, MLA Peace River South

Back to school is top of mind for families across the Peace. People are rightly worried about the mixed messages and lack of concrete plans from the provincial government.

They are worried for several reasons – student safety, their child's education, family schedules. They are also worried because families need a schedule if they are going to get back to work and back to business.



The worries don't end there. I'm hearing deep concerns about the lack of any economic plans to help our employers, our small businesses, and our economy recovery. All of us have been waiting for months for some kind of recovery plan – and we are being kept waiting.

The fight against the COVID-19 virus has been a global challenge we've faced as individuals, communities, and as a province. We've been lucky in BC to be able to navigate through without large losses of life so far thanks to the calm leadership of Provincial Health Officer Dr. Bonnie Henry. People have trusted her plans and her guidance.

But the virus is merely the first of the COVID-19 challenges. The rebuilding of our economy in the wake of the shutdowns during the pandemic presents hurdle after hurdle for British Columbians, for employers, and our way of life. Like many people, I am starting to worry that the provincial government doesn't have a plan to move our entire province forward.

Sectors like tourism are almost entirely shut down, with a small percentage of tourism-based businesses getting by with a bit of business from other British Columbians. If the many small businesses that make up the sector shut down, it will be a long time until someone takes their place. Family supporting jobs will be lost.

Restaurants, retailers, and small offices are all adapting to the new COVID-19 rules but face a multitude of challenges. Lower traffic that means fewer workers. They face higher costs due to cleaning, to managing the number of people inside, and from providing protections like hand sanitizer and plexiglass screens.

Businesses need to secure and pay for masks, gloves, and other protective equipment for their teams. But there is no help from government, despite a large surplus sitting at WorkSafeBC. Instead of helping the businesses who paid the premiums that built the surplus, WorkSafe is going to spend money on stress balls, tote bags, and other corporate swag.

We've also seen the minimum wage go up during the crisis – layering extra costs on some small businesses struggling to remain in business. And the government has sliced \$315 million out of the funds set aside to help employers recover.

These moves by the provincial government are making the outlook worse for businesses already working day and night to stay afloat. Without a solid plan from the province, a lot of people will be unable to get back to business. That will hurt families, communities, and our quality of life in every part of the province.



INGREDIENTS (FOR 10 OR 12 SERVINGS)

- 2 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 4 cups (600 g) frozen strawberries and blueberries, thawed
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, hulled and rinsed
- 1 cup fresh blueberries, rinsed
- · 2 cups 35% (whipping) cream
- 1 cup plus 2 tbsp white sugar1 tbsp maple syrup (optional)
- 1 box strawberry gelatin dessert (such as Jell-O)

DDEDADATION

 Preheat oven to 120°C (250°F). Mix melted butter with cookie crumbs and spread mixture in 25 cm x 25 cm square

- baking dish. Pack lightly. Bake 10 minutes
- Meanwhile, mix half a cup of sugar with defrosted berries in medium saucepan; simmer for 10 minutes. Add Jell-O and remaining half-cup of sugar. Mix well and allow to simmer five minutes.
- Cool mixture in fridge for 30 minutes or in freezer for 20 minutes.
- Add one cup of 35% cream to cooled mixture and mix well.
- Pour mixture over cooked crumb base and refrigerate for at least two hours.
- In a bowl, mix fresh fruit, 2 tbsp of sugar and maple syrup. Set aside.
