# **Synopsis of Workshops and Keynote Lecture**

The five workshops on Academic Writing (AQT1, AQT3) will be run by Dr. Gareth Dyke, an experienced academic author with more than 260 publications including in journals such as Science and Nature. Gareth has worked in or led research groups at leading universities across Europe and North America including the University of Southampton and University College Dublin. He is head of content development and delivery for The Charlesworth Group and is actively involved in research at universities in Europe and Central Asia.

### Workshop I: Academic Writing – Planning a First Draft, Drafting, Revising Draft, Time Management

Lecturer: Gareth Dyke, Ph.D.

This workshop will comprise discussion and worked examples of how to develop your key message, initially structure a thesis (which sections to include and what to put into each), understand why you are writing a thesis, and your target audience. We also emphasise the key transition between dissertation writing (which serves one purpose) and transition to publication: important steps to consider.

### Workshop II: ERC Starting and Consolidator Grants (TSK2, TSK4)

Lecturer: PhDr. Slávka Otčenášová, MA., PhD. - Dr. Otčenášová is a researcher, Assistant Professor at the Department of History, Faculty of Arts, UPJŠ, currently operating as a seconded national expert in the ERCEA, Brussels. The ERC (European Research Council) operates according to a "curiosity-driven", or "bottom-up", approach, allowing researchers to identify new opportunities in any field of research. Dr. Otčenášová will introduce the basic grant schemes funded by ERC. Presentation followed by a questions and answers session targetting early and mid-career researchers.

### Workshop III: Academic Writing – Writing an Abstract

Lecturer: Gareth Dyke, Ph.D.

This workshop will teach you how to write a good quality abstract that is: Honest and precise; Can stand alone (search engines, sometimes all people read). This must accurately reflect the full text of your thesis. Ask yourself: Why did you do the study? What did you do? What did you find? What did you conclude?

### Workshop IV: Academic Writing – Writing your Introduction

Lecturer: Gareth Dyke, Ph.D.

This workshop will address the basic structure of an effective introduction, what goes where, which information to include, and will provide

learners with a key template to put this section together. Many students put information into this section of their thesis that is either not relevant or should be in a different place. Build your thesis Introduction using our easy-to-use templates.

# Workshop V: Academic Writing – Writing Methods and Results Lecturer: Gareth Dyke, Ph.D.

This workshop is based around developing a clear structure in the methods section that can then be used as the basis of the remaining parts of the thesis. We will show you how to take your reader on a journey through the methods section, reconstructing the key steps to perform the analysis. The trick to writing a good Results section is knowing what information to include or exclude. You will not present the raw data that you collected, but rather you will summarise the data with text, tables and/or figures. Learn to use the text of the paper to state the results of your study, then refer the reader to a table or figure where they can see the data for themselves.

# Workshop VI: Academic Writing – Discussion and Conclusion Lecturer: Gareth Dyke, Ph.D.

This workshop will teach you how to explain what your results mean or why they differ from what other workers have found. You should interpret in light of other published results, by adding additional information from sources you cited in the Introduction section as well as by introducing new sources. Limit your conclusions to those that your data can actually support. You can then proceed to speculate on why this occurred and whether you expected this to occur, based on other workers' findings. This section presents the results of the study but does not attempt to interpret meaning.

# Keynote Lecture: Urbanisation and Urban Life in Scandinavia – the Role of Nature, Climate and Environment (FRT2)

Lecturer: Professor Steinar Aas (Nord Universitet, Bodø)


The two small towns of Narvik and Bodø in Nordland County in Norway were founded during the last half of the 19th century. Both towns were important harbour towns, which meant there had to be adaptions to nature in order to get an effective and modern harbour. Even though the two towns were in the middle of the nature, there were early signs of an awareness and consciousness about how to deal with the climate and the nature in and around the towns. The paper will deal with the role of the nature when it comes to town planning in Narvik and Bodø, and with detours to Sweden, as well. This will indeed deal with the influence of a more general planning regime in Norwegian small towns from the 1920s, both when it comes to town planning, but also connected with the urban views on nature and the surrounding environment to towns.
