Eddie Rose commented:

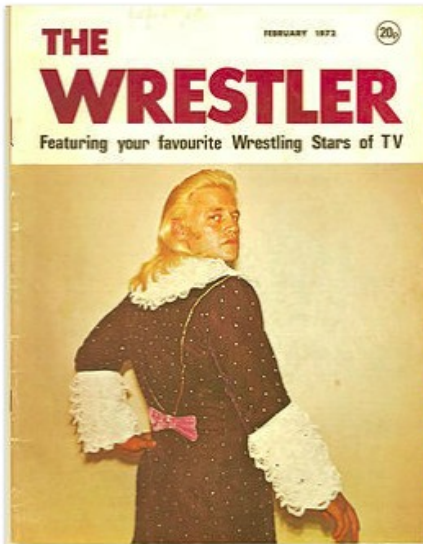

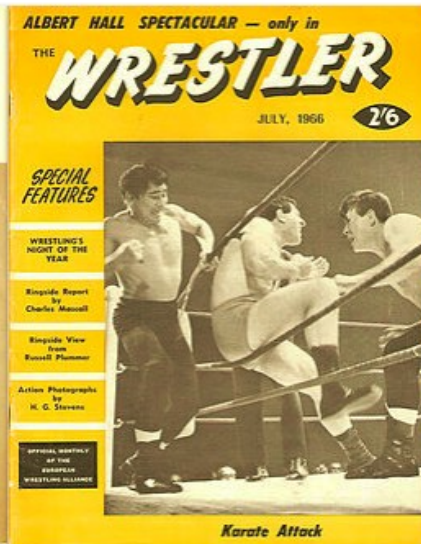

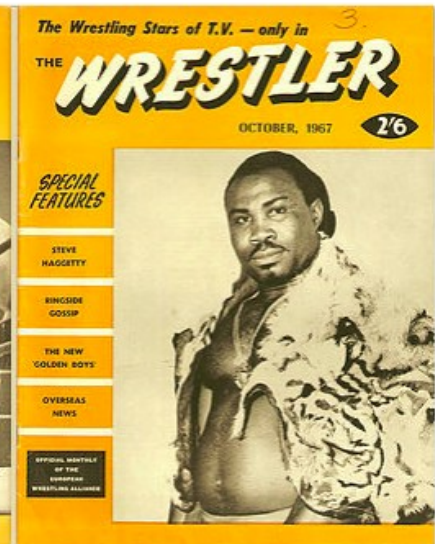
Mike Marino and Alan Dennison were never featured as single portraits but were often shown in action shots



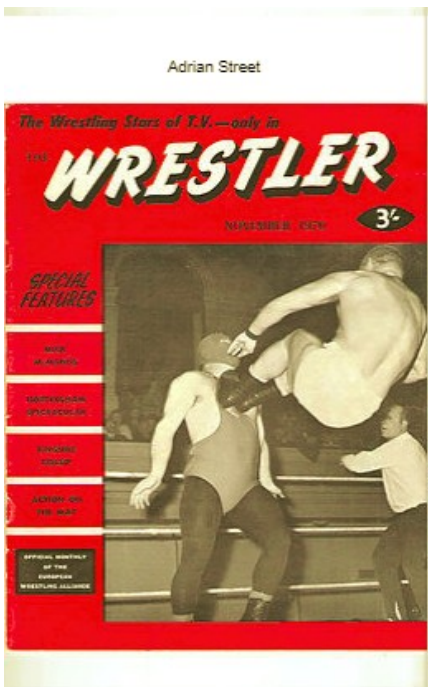

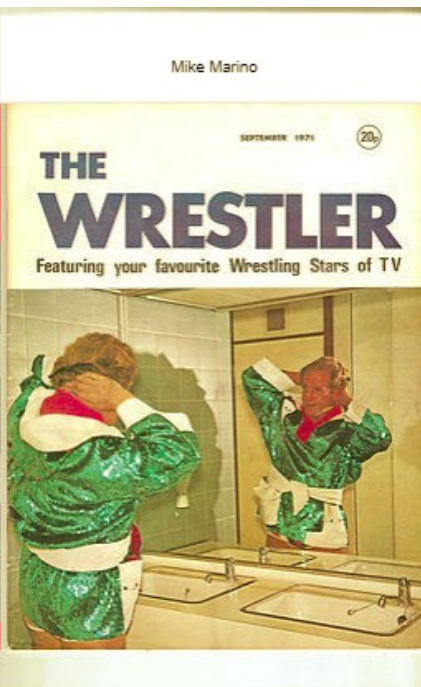

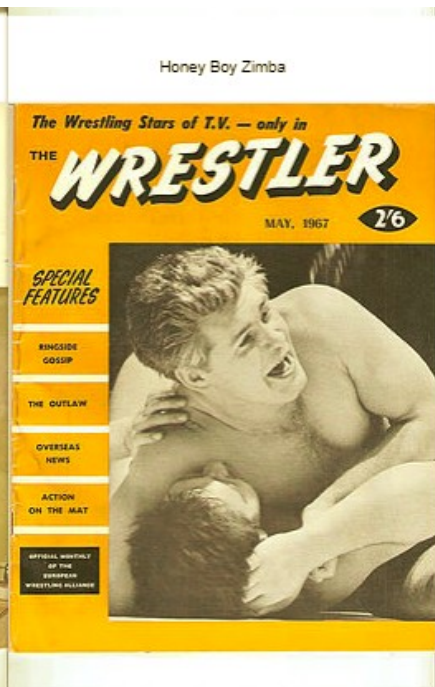
Honey Boy Zimba

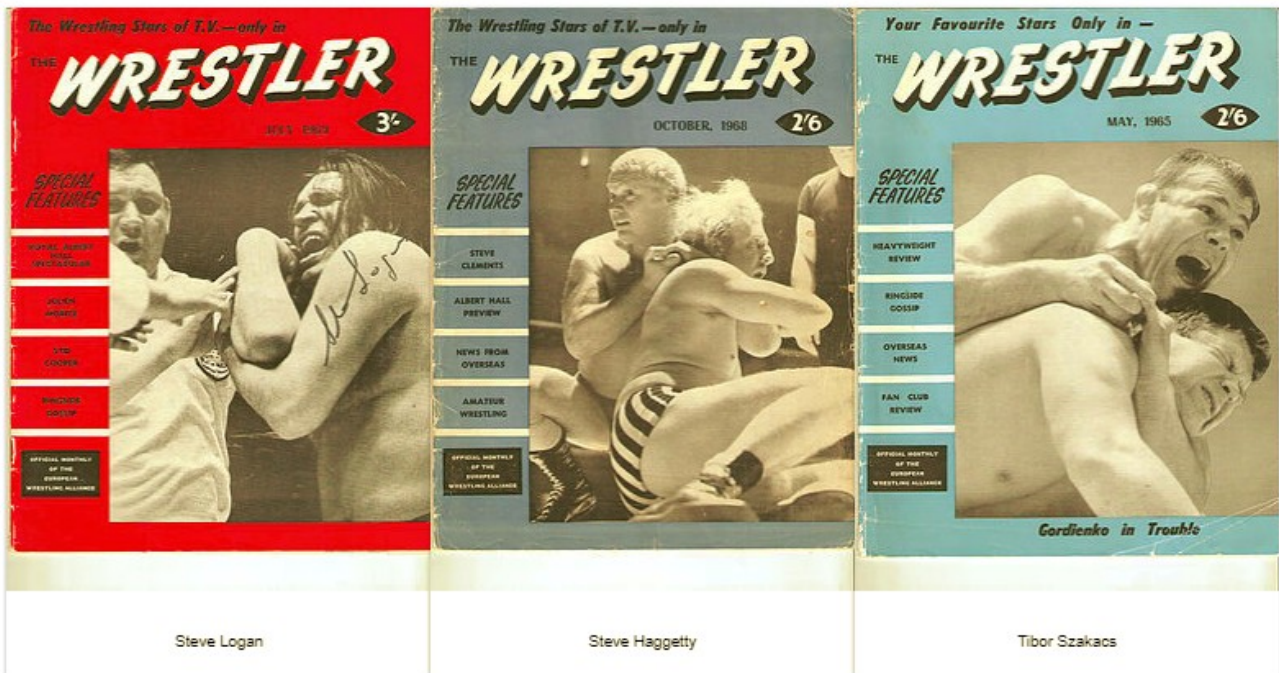
