After making the decorations and laying out our plans we enjoyed a delicious brunch of homemade egg casseroles (I'd call them quiches) made by Nancy.

On Tuesday evening, the decorating commenced. Shirley, Marilyn Tallant, Dr. Shaler, Cathy Caccia and our new member Emily Frye arrived at the Ramada at 5:30. We located our tree and found out that actually another group claimed our designated tree. We were to have a tree with white lights but ended up with multi colored lights. The Ramada was quite accommodating and went and got a couple sets white lights for us.

Marilyn, Shirley and Emily proceeded to put purple and white lights on the tree.

Recap of November's Meeting:





Immediately following the business meeting, this month's program was a presentation by two of our members, Kate Frame and Emily Frye, about their recent trips abroad. Kate told us that she spent a week in Amsterdam, Brussels and London in July. She flew into Iceland and then went on to Amsterdam and stayed with her friend's nanny. She described the houses there as very small but that everyone is very "laid back". A "Coffee Shop" there is a shop that sells marijuana and they

are plentiful. Amsterdam is also well known for its "Red Light" district, which is the legal prostitution trade there. She explained that she and her friends took a very quick daytime tour of that area. Kate told us that everyone there uses bicycles for transportation but that no one actually owns one, they all share whatever bicycles are available for use. She mentioned that the food in Amsterdam was very good and that waffle stands are everywhere in Brussels. Kate was able to tour the Anne Frank house/museum and St. Paul's Cathedral. She also rode the Euro Star train from Brussels to London. spending two days in London. The bus transportation system in

London allows people to pay a lump sum and get on and off busses as they travel about in the city. She saw the very popular London Eye which is like a Ferris wheel with compartments that can each hold 20 people. Kate was also able to see the Tower Bridge. The Rooftop Bar in London is very exclusive. In what they call the "posh" district, everyone is well dressed and women wear dresses or skirts, but never slacks. The food in London, unfortunately, was not as good as elsewhere on her trip. All in all Kate told us that it was a wonderful trip and we certainly enjoyed her presentation.

Emily spent several months (May through August) living in Prague while participating in her college internship in Human Resources (International Internship Program). She has studied abroad twice. Emily noted that the economy in the Czech Republic is thriving and that businesses are recruiting from outside the Republic. Interestingly, they are known for having the largest beer consumption in the world. Although the Republic is multi-national, the Czech people are quite nationalistic. In terms of their work environment, Emily explained that there are not as many legal prohibitions regarding sexist behavior in the work place as we have in the United States. However, the people are very reserved because of the Communist influence, although they don't like their behavior being described as rude. Even so, the Czech people enjoy talking about subjects as personal as the amount of their income and their political beliefs even with someone they have only just met. They enjoy political arguments and Emily mentioned that President Trump's name came up frequently in conversation. The Czech Republic is the most atheist country in the world. When it comes to food,

meat and potatoes and goulash are popular. The celebration of birthdays is not important in the Czech Republic, but they do celebrate what they call their "name day". There is a list of names and each is assigned to a particular day on the calendar. On your name day, you are expected to bring cake to work and small gifts for your coworkers. Emily also visited Berlin, Germany and Slovakia. She hiked a mountain range in Slovakia and visited the famous Blue Church. On a trip to Croatia, she went to Zagreb and a national park. She also visited Budapest where she noted a strong eastern European influence. Emily was able to visit the Holocaust Memorial where there is a display of a line of shoes along a river commemorating a location where many Jews were executed. Emily also visited Ireland and described the people there as very friendly. She took a "whiskey tour" and learned about the Pub culture, where local musicians will come and play spontaneously as opposed to having recorded music and televisions in the pubs. Emily mentioned that she is thinking about moving to Europe after graduation. We thoroughly enjoyed her presentation

I was not sure if any of you noticed the article in the November 27th Tribune-Review newspaper article was titled "Norwin Grads Collaborate on Gender-Neutral, Race-Neutral Children's Book" by Joe Napsha on Alyssa Minko and her friend Rachel Bindas. They are collaborating on a gender-and-race-neutral book for children. It will be entitled "Before the Sun Wakes Up".

Rachael is doing the writing and Alyssa, the excellent artist that she is, is doing the art illustrations. They started a Kickstarter campaign to raise money for it. I thought that was pretty ingenious.

Alyssa was the young woman we gave the Greensburg BPW 2015 \$500 Scholarship in memory of my mom and dad. She came to our meeting at Hoss's. She is one of the most talented artists I have ever seen and is doing well at college - Rochester Institute of Technology.

I had stayed in contact with her the first year she went to college and it was quite a struggle as her home life was not good if you remember.

Her parents are divorced and have drug and alcohol issues so she really never had any support from them and she lived with her Grandmother

near Debbie Croyle in Irwin when she was going to high school. She won first place in the 2015 Congressional Art Contest and her pencil drawing was displayed in the US Capitol for a year. If you check out her Facebook page, you will see how talented she is from her artwork there.

I just wanted to let you all know how proud we should all be of the good we do with giving out our Greensburg BPW Scholarships. Even though at times it does not seem like much money with the high cost of college tuition, it does make a difference in these ladies lives.
