202 Session: Understanding the Numbers & Asking for Money

In this practical workshop, participants learn how the project pro forma is used to test the feasibility, risks, and profitability of a project from the early conceptual stage through the development of detailed budgets and financing proposals.

Pro forma spreadsheet templates are provided for a basic land development project and for the development and construction of smaller scale apartment buildings, simple commercial buildings, and small mixed-use buildings. Participants learn how to put together common deal frameworks and how to present projects to likely investors and lenders. (AIA LU 3, CNU-A 3)
