



What you need to Catch a Salmon





Drift fishing

A common method where the angler casts a line upstream, lets the line drift down through the run or pool, and then reels in the line to start the process over again.



winged bobbers





Plunking

Uses a similar setup to drift fishing, except that the gear is cast into a likely holding area or migratory path, and allowed to anchor in one spot. The gear is then left alone until a fish strikes, or if you decide to change gear

Kwikfish Spoon





Often used in situations where water is very slow moving or even stationary, such as in a big eddy or tidewater at slack tide.

Slip Bobber



Trolling

Consists of fishing out of a constantly moving boat. Trollers will use weights, divers, or downriggers to achieve a desired depth to present their bait or lures.
