A Word from Our Pastor

Courageously

This last week Mary Harris sent me an article entitled *How To Engage a Fanatic* by David Brooks.

(I've included the link below).

He talks of several experiences he'd had and concluded:

Over the course of these experiences I've been rehearsing all the reasons to think that it's useless to try to have a civil conversation with a zealot, that you've just got to exile them, or confront them with equal and opposite force.

You've probably made this same type of conclusion yourself. I know I have . . . often . . . repeatedly . . . in various contexts . . . increasingly in the past several years. It is so easy to understand what Brooks stated in his article, "Civility is not a suicide pact." Dealing with others is challenging and easily encourages us to retreat from relationship with those others.

But none of this is the point of Brooks' article. About a third of the way in, he makes a shift, as he quotes from the book *Critic* by Stephen L. Carter: **"The only way to confront fanaticism is with love."**

Now he says that knowing full well the difficulties in making that happen, both in ourselves and in the other person, but he does it for three reasons.

First, if we try to look at the fanatic with love, then there is a possibility we hear a gift in their voice, not just the negative that shouts so easily in our face. "Then you'll defeat a dark passion and replace it with a better passion."

Second, "A lot of fanaticism in society is electron-thin." If we take the time and effort to hear them, especially in their fanaticism, then we open up the possibility that in the next moment transformation is possible. When someone is heard, they are more likely to open up.

The third reason is for the sake of our country. "We all swim in a common pool." We can't just expel the other because of the challenges they present. Instead we must courageously love them.

All you have to do is try to imitate Martin Luther King, who thrust his love into his enemies' hearts in a way that was aggressive, remorseless and destabilizing.

May we all love courageously!





This month's story offers a powerful demonstration of Spirit responding to a very specific request:

Easter morning, April 16, 2017. Almost noon, my phone rang. It was my sister-in-law Jacqui. "Pat left this morning about 5:30 for his regular run and hasn't come back. The Sheriff is here and they are looking everywhere for him."

Ron and I were on our way in minutes to my brother's house on East Tanque Verde Road. When we got there, a deputy was interviewing Jacqui. "Yes," she was saying, "the revolver is missing too"

The Pima County Sheriff's Department searched Tanque Verde wash, roadsides, gullies, and open desert for two days with Jeeps, dogs, volunteers on horseback, even helicopters as far as the upper falls in Redington Pass. Nothing.

My husband and sons and I searched till the first of June, tromping through sandy washes and mesquite bosques, sometimes falling, scanning the hillsides for vultures, growing more and more resigned to this loss in our lives. As the heat of summer came on, we had to quit.

I took a long drive to Pinetop in July, giving myself lots of time to feel my way through this. I found myself so sad and frustrated at one point on that quiet highway that I said, out loud, "PAT, WHERE ARE YOU??"

Immediately, I got an answer, in his voice:

"Well I'm where I've always been. With God. Where else would I be?

I never died, because I was never born.

You know, there never was a Patrick Kennedy as a separate person. And there is no Karen Kennedy. There are no separate people."

Then quiet.

One day, a hunter in the Rincon Mountains or a guy on an ATV will find something in those hills with the remains of a blue sweatshirt and jogging pants and running shoes.

But I don't need that any more. I have peace.
