It has been an interesting summer for me -

marvelous, wondrous moments I will always remember . . . and other equally unforgettable times I wish I could have never gone through. Within an hour of returning from an incredible vacation in Hawaii, I received the news about my son's accident and the times since has been focused on his recovery.

I went on an incredible trip to the Refuge of Hope with a group of people that got as much done as any team I've ever taken to Peru. And in the middle of that trip a four-month-old baby died changing the complexion of the entire experience. I saw Pastor Victor and the others in that remarkable place in a whole new light.

All of those moments, and more, have pushed themselves into my consciousness, vying for my attention, time and energy . . . and threatened to make me ignore some very important moments that are ahead of us, moments that if we forget, will change our world in ways that will not serve us well. They are calling out for our input.

The signs on the side of the road and the television commercials might have alerted you to the fact that an election is ahead of us - actually two elections.

On August 28, just about a month away, we hold primary elections in our state. Just over two months after that, on November 6, we hold the general elections. With the exception of John McCain's Senate seat, all of our state and national elected offices are up for election. In addition, there will be a number of ballot propositions up for our vote (at least 3 and possibly as many as seven). The one that is most interesting to me concerns funding for Arizona schools. Please look at them all and vote, vote, vote. Let your voice be heard.

To help in these efforts, your Financial Futures Team will be holding a series of lectures about the importance of politics in America and the incredible role that our church, St. Francis, has held in the past, and can hold in the present, as well as the future. These wonderful opportunities will be held throughout the month of October as we collectively and individually do our part to help our nation more forward.

But the United Methodist Church needs our attention at least as much. I am trying to finish this article so that I can leave to go to St. Louis for the Reconciling Convocation being held there this weekend. We are meeting in the same space where the UMC will hold our special General Conference in February which will focus on LGBTQ issues in the church. There is a good chance that the choices made at that conference will affect our church, both locally and nationally, in profound and long-lasting ways!

Next week, after I get home from this conference (which by the way is called *For Everyone Born* and is hosted by the Love Your Neighbor Coalition) we will need to begin the process of education and planning that will allow us to positively affect the decisions of that Special General Conference, so that, as a church and as individuals, we can truly live out the call to love, not just our neighbors, but everyone born.

There is wonderful work ahead of us. I am so proud to be the pastor of a community that embraces that work enthusiastically and energetically!

Join us for three thoughtprovoking lectures of the state of our politics and a celebration of our democracy.


