## **Annual Show Regulations and Arrangements**

## **Conditions of Entry**

- 1. Entry Forms should be received by the Show Secretary not later than 6 p.m. on the Tuesday prior to the show
- 2. Entries are accepted subject to the following conditions:
  - a. It is understood that by entering articles or produce for competition or exhibition, members signify their acceptance of, and willingness to conform to these Regulations and Arrangements.
  - b. The Society will take all reasonable care to ensure the safety of exhibits but will not be responsible for loss of, or damage to, any exhibit, howsoever caused.
- 3. Every competitor may be called upon to satisfy the Committee that the articles brought forward for competition are his/her bona-fide productions, and especially in regard to garden produce, have been under his/her management for the full time specified, i.e. eight clear weeks.
- 4. The location of the competitor's garden or allotment must be shown on the Entry Form, and the Committee will have the right to appoint a neutral party to inspect such garden or allotment.
- 5. Competitors are not allowed more than one entry in any class.
- 6. More than one entry per class per household will be accepted subject to condition 3.
- 7. In the Homecraft section no article may be presented for competition if it has been previously shown at a Helensburgh Flower Show but such articles may be submitted for exhibition.
- 8. Flowers and Shrubs: Gladiolus nanus primulinus may be exhibited as a cut flower in classes 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10. Pot Plants: Begonia Rex and small pendulus begonias may be exhibited in classes 40, 41, 43, 44 and 46.

#### **Staging and Removal of Exhibits**

- 9. Staging of exhibits will take place in the Victoria Hall between 6.00p.m. and 9.00 p.m. on the Friday evening before the Show and competitors should try to stage most of their exhibits at this time. Due to reduced staging time, vases, trugs and entry cards may be collected in advance. These will be available from the container (at the back of Victoria Hall) on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> August between 6.30pm and 8pm. All vase classes (1-22) should be staged on the Friday evening between 6.00p.m. and 9.00pm., but, for the convenience of exhibitors, all other exhibits will be admitted between 8.00 a.m. and 9.45 a.m. on the Saturday morning.
- 10. All competitors should stage exhibits to a high standard and committee members will be available to give advice on preparation and staging.
- 11. Vases for cut flowers will be provided by the Society and must be used for all exhibits. In the board sections, boards will be available from the Society if required but competitors may stage on their own boards.
- 12. Exhibitors may receive help with the staging of exhibits but the exhibitor must supervise this assistance.
- 13. All exhibits staged for competition should be named wherever possible.
- 14. All cut flowers entered will become the property of the Society and will be sold or otherwise disposed of at the close of the Show.
- 15. All other exhibits may be removed from the Hall after the prize giving and must be removed before 5.15 p.m. on the Saturday. Exhibits should not be removed before the prize giving.

#### **Judging of Competitions**

- 16. Judging will take place from 10.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. on the Saturday. No unauthorized person will be allowed within the Show Rooms during the time judging is in progress.
- 17. The decision of the Judges in all cases must be considered as final.
- 18. If the exhibits are considered unworthy of the scheduled award, the judges, at their discretion, may withhold or modify prizes. They may also recommend additional prizes or commendations for exhibits of special merit, although not specified in the Schedule.
- 19. Should a prize be awarded to any exhibit which is found not to conform to these Regulations, the prize money and/or award involved will be withheld.
- 20. While acting in any official capacity in connection with the Show, members of the Committee are expected to maintain complete impartiality with regard to exhibits, and their conduct at all times should be free from reproach.
- 21. Any competitor finding fault with the decision of the judges, or otherwise conducting himself/herself improperly, may, at the discretion of the Committee, be expelled from the Society.
- 22. Complaints on any aspect of the Show should be reported to the Society's Chairperson during the period of the Show otherwise they will not be entertained or considered. The Society's Chairperson and two Officials will decide on the appropriate action in respect of any complaint.

#### **Prize Money and Trophies**

- 23. Non-members are welcome to enter the competition and may receive prize money. Society members only may receive and have their names engraved on the Trophies which they retain for the following year.
- 24. Prize money will be paid to competitors at the Treasurer's Room between 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. on the Saturday. Prizes not claimed at this time will be donated to the Society's funds.
- 25. All trophy winners shall undertake to return the Society's trophies to the Trophy Master on request in a like state of repair as when they received them.
- 26. It is recommended that winners of trophies should check that while in their keeping each trophy is insured under a house contents policy.
