Bullying + Harassment

Definition

Bullying is unwanted, intentional, aggressive, repeated behavior that involves an imbalance of power. Harassment includes systematic and/or continued unwanted actions; federal law prohibits harassment based on race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, disability, or religion. Bullying and harassment data included in this fact sheet are from the 2016 Minnesota Student Survey, combining 8th, 9th and 11th graders. Students responded to questions about whether other students at school did any or all of the following in the 30 days prior to the survey:

- > Pushed, shoved, slapped, hit or kicked them when not kidding around
- > Threatened to beat them up
- Spread mean rumors or lies about them
- > Made sexual jokes, comments, or gestures towards them
- Excluded them from friends, other students, or activities



Prevalence + Frequency

According to the 2016 Minnesota Student Survey (MSS):

- > Students report that, in the past month, approximately:
 - 1 out of 20 students engaged in bullying behavior
 - 1 out of 4 students experienced bullying behavior
 - 1 out of 5 students both were bullied, and bullied others
- > The most frequent type of bullying reported is exclusion of students from friends/activities, followed by students spreading mean rumors or lies.
- > The prevalence of bullying and harassment decreases by grade level (see graph).

Risk for Substance Use

Bullying behavior puts both those engaging and those experiencing the bullying behaviors at higher risk for social and emotional problems, including substance use and academic failure.

Alcohol

- Rates of reported past-month alcohol use increase with the frequency at which students report being bullied or harassed (see graph); the same pattern appears for past-month binge drinking.
- > Past-month alcohol use was reported by...
 - 9.1% of students who neither were bullied nor bullied others...
 - 14.1% of students who reported only being bullied...
 - 20.8% of students who reported bullying others...
 - 23.2% of those who reported both being bullied and bullying others...

...in the past month.

Other Drugs

- Compared to students who weren't bullied in the past month, students who were **bullied weekly** or more often were:
 - **2.6 times** more likely to report **tobacco** use...
 - 2.3 times more likely to report marijuana use...
 - **3.6 times** more likely to report **prescription drug** misuse... ...in the past month.
- > Students who were bullied daily were:
 - 3.1 times more likely to report tobacco use...
 - 3.0 times more likely to report marijuana use...
 - **4.6 times** more likely to report **prescription drug** misuse... ...in the past month.
