

SPEAKER BIOS

Caitlin Bagley, MLS, is an Associate Professor and Instruction Librarian at Gonzaga University. She received her MLS from Indiana University. She is the author of *Makerspaces: Top Trailblazing Projects* and has been published in Introduction to *Cloud Computing: A LITA Guide and Social Information Research*. She is interested in the intersection between technology and education and firmly believes libraries and librarians should be leaders in this area. She lives in Spokane.

Elizabeth Bridges, PhD, RN, has 32 years experience with a focus in critical care and critical care research. She joined the University of Washington faculty in 2004, and also is the Clinical Nurse Researcher at the UW Medical Center. She served for 30 years in the Air Force Nurse Corps (22 years active duty), which has given a focus to her research on enroute critical care. Her current research is related to enroute critical care and the integration of cardiovascular monitoring into the care of critically ill/injured. She has also focused on the translation of her research into practice, including the creation of the *TriService Nursing Research Battlefield and Disaster Nursing Pocket Guide*, which provided evidence-based practice recommendations. Dr. Bridges has lived all over the United States and traveled around the world while in the military. She currently works closely with clinical nurses at UWMC to bring evidence to the bedside.

Cathy Burroughs, MLS, is Associate Director of the National Network of Libraries of Medicine, Pacific Northwest Region (NNLM PNR) a membership program of libraries, research organizations and community-based organizations in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. From the PNR office at the University of Washington, Cathy oversees personnel, budget, funding opportunities, program planning and evaluation for the NNLM PNR program. Her staff provide training, current awareness, and consultation to increase effective use of National Library of Medicine resources and to support current and emerging roles of the information professional. Cathy's previous positions include: Assistant Director of the NN/LM Outreach Evaluation Resources Center from 2001-2004; Project Manager for an NN/LM outreach evaluation project from 1997-2001; reference librarian at Georgetown University Medical Center Library in Washington DC; and research librarian/ project manager for NIH health promotion and education contracts in Rockville, MD. A native of Spokane, she received her MLS, with a health sciences specialization, from UCLA.

Joel Cummings, MLIS, has worked at Washington State University since 1999, first as an electronic resources librarian, then collection manager for the sciences and now Head of Collection Development. Previous positions include reference and instruction librarian at University College of the Fraser Valley, corporate librarian at ID Biomedical, and information specialist at Nova Chemicals. He received an MLIS from the University of British Columbia. He has been published in a variety of journals, including *Library Hi-Tech*, *Serials Reviews* and *portal*. He has contributed to the research literature and professional meetings in the areas of information technology for library public services including articles on link resolvers, wireless devices usage by library users, virtual reference and collection development, including articles on aggregation databases, collection evaluation and eBooks. Also, he has have been a reviewer for *Reference Reviews* and *Choice* for many years. He and his co-authors have received an Emerald Literati Award for a Highly Commended Article published in *Library Hi-Tech* in 2010.

Joe Eckert, MA, is MLIS Academic Advisor at the University of Washington Information School. He as been Academic Advisor for UW Undergraduate Affairs (Lead) and the UW Department of Geography. He was Co-Founder and Project Manager of the Social Media Lab at UW, managing a \$1 million National Science Foundation grant. He earned is MA in Geography at UW.

Diane Korngiebel, DPhil, works at the intersection of bioethics, informatics, and the delivery of healthcare innovation. She is an Assistant Professor in Biomedical Health Informatics and an Adjunct Assistant Professor in Bioethics and Humanities at the University of Washington School of Medicine in Seattle. She brings her expertise in mixed methods research, bioethics, and user-centered design to developing innovative, people-informed interventions—using collaborative approaches—that improve health while addressing issues of accessibility, acceptability, inclusivity, and equity.

Jevin West, PhD, is an Assistant Professor in the Information School at the University of Washington and co-founder of the DataLab. With his colleague, Carl Bergstrom, he developed a new course, "Calling Bullshit." In just one year, more than 60 universities have contacted Jevin about using the course. He is now taking the class to high schools around the country. The course rooted out of his core research in data science, data reasoning, and the science of science. Using millions of scholarly papers as his sandbox, he asks questions about the origins of scientific disciplines, the social and economic biases within science, and the impact the current publication system has on the health of science. To study these questions, he develops machine learning techniques for mining scientific text, citations, mathematical equations and figures.
