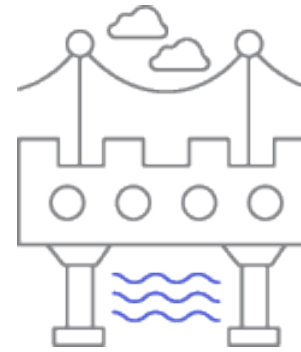

Speed dating for research

Elizabeth Bridges, University of Washington, School of Nursing

A challenge with evidence-based practice is the need to find, rapidly read and synthesize evidence. What information is needed to quickly evaluate the quality and findings of a research paper? What information is needed to identify the level of evidence supporting or not supporting a practice? Enter “Speed Dating for Research”—a strategy to introduce the principles of reviewing the literature in an efficient manner. In this session, we will discuss the critical questions that should be asked when reading any research paper and apply this method to quickly synthesize the literature.

Bioethics in patient-centered informatics: from patient portals to mHealth

Improving the creation of informatics tools meant for patients’ use is critical for supporting patient empowerment in today’s age of big, and small, data. Using case examples from patient portals attached to medical records to applications of mHealth technology, Dr. Korngiebel will touch upon the broad range of ethical issues and how co-production frameworks and approaches, such as User-Centered Design and Community-Based Participatory Research, can help address or mitigate them while increasing the relevance of health technologies for patients and health care providers and systems.
