

David's two wives, Ahinoam from Jezreel and Abigail, the widow of Nabal from Carmel. were among those captured. David was now in great danger because all his men were very bitter about losing their sons and daughters, and they began to talk of stoning him. But David found strength in the Lord his God. (1 Samuel 30:1-6 NLT) What a wonderful attribute! David was in a helpless situation - his two wives, his men's wives and children had been taken captive by the Amalekites. When David found himself in such great distress, what was his mentality? Did he put forth a victim mentality? It's true that David wept until he was exhausted, but that was just for a very short period of time. He refused to sit down in the ashes of defeat. He shook off all those

disappointments; he recognized God's call and anointing upon himself. He looked up to God, his Commander-in-Chief and found strength in Him. He turned his ears to hear His voice for guidance. He asked God, "Should I chase after this band of raiders? Will I catch them?" And the Lord told him, "Yes, go after them. You will recover everything that was taken from you."

Big Escape or Great Sacrifice?

Reading: Mark 15:16-47 "And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, heard His cry and saw how He died, he said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!" (Mark 15:39)

No one can deny death when it comes to his/her doorstep. Jesus was the only person who lived in this world who could say "No" to death; yet He chose to die on a cross. It was His choice, but why?

The Jewish authorities wanted to crucify Jesus for proclaiming Himself to be the only Savior of all who ever lived, is living now and, will live on the face of planet earth. He claimed that no one -

including their Father Abraham, Moses who gave them the Law and, David who made a kingdom for them- could enter into God's presence except through Him! It was more than they could bear. They somehow wanted to disprove his claims to be the Savior. They sought to kill Him. They not only wanted to eliminate Jesus by crucifying Him, but also to take away the "image of Jesus" as the Savior of the world from the minds of people. All the mockery they meted out to the suffering Jesus was to disprove His claims. The soldiers put a "purple cloth" upon Jesus as if it were a royal robe and placed a crown of thorns upon His head as if it were a royal crown and

mocked Him by kneeling before Him in irony as if they were paying homage to Him! They struck Him on His head and spat upon His face... They mocked Him as Prophet (v.29), as Savior (v.31), and as King (v.32). They made themselves believe that Jesus was not a king.

Looking at Jesus hanging on a cross, the chief priests and the teachers of the law mocked Him. "Save Yourself," they challenged, "to prove that You are able to save others..." It is interesting to note that the Jewish religious leaders so hated Jesus that they even went out to Golgotha to mock Him! The High priest's intentions seem to have been fulfilled if we look at it from a human perspective. Everyone present at Calvary disdained Jesus. Passers-by derided, the soldiers mocked: even the thieves reviled Him. Our Lord's patience is simply wonderful! He didn't utter a word!

The chief priests asked for a miracle so they could believe in Jesus. It was quite a simple test... "Prove Yourself, man... You say that You are the Savior of the world, the Messiah who came to save all mankind... Poor guy, now hanging on a cross, facing sure death! Hey, Man... Forget about saving the whole world... First save Yourself... Perform your mighty saving power in Your own life...

Come out of the cross by Your "magical" power!"

"Let this Christ, this King of Israel, come down now from the cross, that we may see and believe" (v.31, 32).

Why didn't Jesus perform a miracle on the cross to make them believe? All those who believed in Him- including John the disciple and the women who followed Jesus even to the cross- surely might have expected Him to take up the challenge of the chief priests and come out of the cross. However, Jesus was silent. He was calm and cool towards the mockery of the chief priests and others... Why? Was it due to His lack of ability? Couldn't He miraculously escape from the cross? God forbid! He was God, even on a cross... He could have, if He wished! However, He knew the disastrous result a "big escape" could pose!

"Only by saving yourself can you save others" is the philosophy of the world and of worldly religions. The truth is just the opposite. If you want to save others, you need to take up their punishment. If you need to give life to others, you need to endure death yourself.

Had Jesus come down from the cross, at the challenge of the chief priests, He could certainly have saved Himself, but never any

other. Satan knew that and, that was "the last temptation" by the tempter!

Iesus didn't avoid the cross. He endured it. He took all of mankind's punishment caused by their sin. The biggest challenge He faced on the cross was not the physical pain He suffered, but His "separation from the heavenly Father. "And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "E'lo-i, E'lo-i, la'ma sabach-tha'ni?" which means, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" (v.34). It was necessary for Jesus to suffer even this separation from His Father, because that's what sin did to mankind... it alienated man from God. To rebuild that relationship, Jesus had to be isolated from His Father for some time!

In great pain, Jesus cried aloud and died (v.37). In human eyes, the death of Jesus was a tragedy. However, when the centurion who stood there in front of Jesus heard His cry and saw how He died, He said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!" (v.39)

"Only by saving yourself can you save others" is the philosophy of the world and of worldly religions. The truth is just the opposite. If you want to save others, you need to take up their punishment. If you need to give life to others, you need to endure death yourself."

It is quite unusual that a Roman centurion, who believed power is god, acknowledged a Jew to be the Son of God: especially when he was seeing Him dying on a cross as a destitute! The chief priests needed a "big escape" to believe in Jesus. But the centurion believed in Him, seeing His death as a "great sacrifice!" Many a time we tend to think a miracle will make people believe. However, it is not a miracle but a sacrifice that makes genuine people believe!

Jesus found glory not in escape, but in sacrifice. How about you and me? Remember, without sacrifice there is no salvation!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, I understand it is not a big escape but a great sacrifice that made Jesus my Savior. Help me to see more greatness in sacrifice than in a miracle. Amen

Yes, I also want to say like Paul, dear brothers and sisters, that whatever happened negatively in our lives during the last 27 years has served to spread the Good News in that area! See every challenge or adversity in your life as an opportunity to become a pool of blessing. In that way, you can make every "valley of weeping into a refreshing spring" so that His name will be glorified through your life in every situation.

Taxes, threat of terror attacks, illness and aging, finances, political conflicts, family relationships, church struggles, fears, insurance issues, air travel impositions, job loss, gasoline prices, war, injustice, death - these are just a few of the enemies most of us face daily. Yet, let me also tell you what the Lord has spoken to my soul:

Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:6-7).

The Lord doesn't want us to sim-

ply possess a generalized peace, based on having no particular problems; nor does He plan to give us a slightly spiritual, yet human-sized kind of peace. If we follow the sequence of obedience He presents, His intention is to shelter us in His very own peace: the imperturbable peace of God. The peace of God is the deep calm that envelops the thought processes of the Almighty. He is never anxious, always in command, never without a remedy. He sees the end from the beginning and views the needs of man from the position of unlimited resources and capabilities. He perceives the needs of His children with both compassion and confidence, for all things are

possible for Him.

The peace He gives is not only from Him, it is an extension of Him – it is the very substance of His peace. It is God-sized peace. It is this divine fabric that He says will "guard [our] hearts and . . . minds in Christ Jesus."

Many Verses Same Promise

Some may challenge my interpretation, but remember the Savior's promise:

"Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful" (John 14:27).

"Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body; and be thankful" (Col 3:15).

Again, Paul says,

These Scriptures and others reveal that there exists a place of refuge for us, a dimension guarded by God's very peace, where we can abide. As we enter this realm of trust, the God of peace promises to actually crush Satan beneath our feet (Rom. 16:20).

Give Peace A Chance

Of course, we must decide what realm shall preside over us. Thus, the Scripture says, "Let the peace of Christ rule," and "Do not let your heart be troubled," and "let your requests be known to God." The word 'let' speaks of choices we can make with realities that are at hand. Remember, even as circumstances begin to trouble your heart, you can retreat from fear. For the peace of God is also accessible. Take authority over your fretting, worrying attitude, for "it leads only to evildoing" (Ps. 37:8). Stand, instead, in faith upon the promises of God. Peace is our shield and the Word of God our weapon. Therefore, capture negative, unbelieving thoughts that would magnify problems rather than magnify the Lord. Our Father knows what we have need of before we ask Him (Matt. 6:8).

Cease striving and know that He is God! If you are weary, come to Him and take His yoke upon you. You will find rest for your soul. Finally, recall Paul's words to make our requests "with thanksgiving." Many have been thinking too much and thanking too little. Therefore, let us cast our burdens upon the Lord, for He indeed cares for us. He will make a way.



DEMONETIZATION - A Reminder

Tot so long ago "Incredible India" arose to a clarion call by our ever so mesmerising honourable Prime Minister on the eve of Nov 8, 2016. This was deemed to be "nation at war" against the menace of black money. "DeMo" became a household discussion topic with everyone offering a doctoral thesis. The world stood astonished and watched this brave step where 85% of currency in circulation became defunct. The idea was that of a surgical strike on unaccounted money supposedly stashed away out of the reach of Taxmen. In our country where 1% Indians own 58% of wealth and 10% own 80% of wealth, the balance 90% of our countrymen felt vindicated. The euphoria wasn't on the expectation of some incoming benefits but rather an anticipation that the rich would

suffer alongside the commoner who was anyway suffering. The whole country awaited with dramatic anticipation the unearthing of the betrayers of our motherland. Well, two months shy of announcement anniversary, RBI reported that 99% of defunct currency had made its way back into the system with gains of the move yet to be quantified. However, since I realise you are not reading this article for appearing in MA Economics final, I would like to narrow our attention. to some vital issues we observed through all this melodrama. Just wondering: When did money have colour? How did it gain the ability to change colour? How is it white? And when does it turn black? Why black? Not blue? Not green? Is wealth a problem or possessing it a problem?

I would argue that this is symptomatic of a deeper trouble. We may demonetize currency in a move to arrest its illegitimate hoarding, but I wonder whether a piece of paper has its own will? One of my classmates in XII standard once stated in an extempore "If you think money can do anything for you, you will do anything for money". I suggest that the problem isn't in the quantity or value of the tender, it is rather in the intent of the bearer. The issue therefore isn't blackness of currency rather it is the darkness of our heart.

Let's run some diagnostics here. Read Jeremiah 17:9 - The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it? Matthew 6:21 - For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also, Genesis 6:5 - The Lord saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time. Jesus said "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions." Luke 12:15. But Jesus answered again and said to them, "Children, how hard it is for those who trust in riches to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." - Mark 10:24-25

This depravity of our hearts is

all-pervasive and is not just limited to money matters. It is not rooted in ignorance or negligence. Rather it is based on conscious choices we make. Come to think of it, If God the Son had to empty Himself to make a way out of this woe, how serious the situation must have been! Ponder, how could 'infinity' become 'nothing'? A mathematical improbability, philosophical incongruity, logical absurdity yet a historical reality and thankfully a saving grace!

Any idea how God demonetized our hearts?? For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. - John 3:16. God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God. - 2 Corinthians 5:21. In His amazing grace, instead of making us defunct for our wretchedness, God has atoned us into becoming His righteousness, 'in Christ'! For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord - Romans 6:23. Remember! For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your ancestors, but with the precious blood of Christ, a Lamb without blemish or defect. - 1 Peter 1:17-19. Question: have we really demonetized the darkness of our heart at the counter of grace?



BLESSED IN CHRIST

Ephesians 1:3 Praise be to our God and Father who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ.

Through Christ Jesus, we have been blessed by God the Father with every spiritual blessing. Spiritual blessings are different from and superior to material or earthly blessings. While God as our Heavenly Father certainly meets our daily needs (Mt 6:11, 33; 1 Tim. 6:17; Phil. 4:19), the blessings we have received in Christ are of far greater worth and value!

Jesus described the essential features of a spiritually blessed per-

son in terms of "godly character" (Mt. 5:3-12). When He looked at people and identified them as blessed or cursed, it was based on their "receptivity and response to His teachings and mighty works" (Mt. 8:10; 11:20-24; 23:13). His parables and letters focused on being "rich toward God" and "having treasures in Heaven" (Lk. 12:20-21; 12:33; Rev. 3:17-18). And the apostles of Jesus also emphasized the aspect of godliness, telling everyone that God sent Jesus to "bless people" by enabling them to "turn away from their wicked ways" (Acts 3:26).

We must recognize that even if we experienced every external comfort and pleasure, we would still be empty and miserable without the Lord's work of inner or spiritual transformation. Two biblical characters would help us grasp this truth. One is the patriarch Jacob who was blessed beyond measure from an earthly perspective but was desperate for the real or authentic blessing- an inner life change or character transformation (Gen. 32:26). The other person was Solomon who enjoyed all kinds of pleasures but whose observation after having tasted them all was "Meaningless! Everything is meaningless!" (Eccl. 1:2; 2:1-11).

Going deeper into our study, let us now briefly examine the blessings we have been given freely and generously in Christ. The new covenant established through Christ is based on better promises and grants unique, unparalleled advantages compared to what people of God experienced under the old covenant (Heb. 8:6-13; 1 Pet. 1:10-12). What are some of those glorious riches and priceless benefits we can now appropriate and enjoy through our union with Christ?

"Spiritual blessings are different from and superior to material or earthly blessings."

1. BLESSED WITH THE ACCESS

(Mt. 27:51; Eph. 2:13; Heb. 10:19, 22)

Through sin, man's relationship with God got severed. But through the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross and His blood shed for our sins, we have been reconciled with Him (2 Cor. 5:18). We who once were far away from God have now been brought near to Him (1 Pet. 3:18). We who once were guilty are now forgiven (Eph. 1:7). We who once were unrighteous are now declared righteous (Rom. 3:22). We who once were identified as sinners are now called as saints (Rom. 1:17). We who once were enemies of God are now His beloved children (1 Jn. 3:1) and close friends (Jn. 15:15).

Now, we can relate to the Lord and experience Him in the most glorious way! We can literally live in His presence and enjoy deep intimacy with Him. We can rejoice in His love, behold His beauty and sing of His goodness. We can hear His voice, feel His heart, discern His will and know His ways. We can experience the fulfillment of His dream and purpose for our lives.

2. BLESSED WITH THE ANOINT-ING (Lk. 11:12; 24:49; Acts 1:4-5) John the Baptist revealed the full

We are encouraged and strengthened in the faith by being part of an assembly of believers (Heb. 3:14; 10:24-25).

5. BLESSED WITH THE ASSURANCE (Jn. 14:2; 2 Pet. 3:13; Rev. 21)


