# **Estimate/Target Setting**

"All estimates and targets in all years are set in order to support individual students achieve their best possible outcome, regardless of their starting point on entering the school."

# How are Key Stage 4 estimates set?

Estimated grades use past national data. These are an average of how the top 20% of students with similar prior achievement (the same Key Stage 2 SATs scores) have performed in the past in each GCSE subject. They are not, therefore, a prediction of future results.

### How are Key Stage 4 targets set?

If a student and his/her teacher feel they could achieve higher than his/her estimate they set a target higher than his/her estimate. This is intended to be aspirational and can be changed throughout the GCSE course.

# How are Key Stage 3 estimates set?

Estimated grades for Key Stage 4 are used for each subject. The progress between Key Stage 2 to Key Stage 4 is split into five equal steps to give the end of year estimates. If a student is reaching their estimate at Key Stage 3 they will reach their estimate at the end of Year 11 assuming they continue to make progress at the current rate.

### How are Key Stage 3 targets set?

If a student and his/her teacher feel they could achieve higher than his/her estimate they set a target higher than his/her estimate.

### When is data collected?

Data is collected for every student once each term (and more often for Year 11).

#### What are Transition Grades?

Transition Grades are awarded to students who are performing just below a Grade 1 at GCSE.
