



Dear Parents and Carers,

I am delighted to share with you our Yellow School Categorisation 2018-2019

We are now categorised as a 'Yellow' school which means that we have made very good progress over the last 18 months. The school requires less external support in order to keep on improving. The school is now judged to be 'effective'. As many of you will be aware, in January 2017, following an extensive external review by the EAS (Education Achievement Service), the school was categorised Amber, with some aspects requiring significant and urgent improvement, E.g. Provision for ALN. Our Estyn inspection in October 2017, recognised that rapid progress had been made over a period of 6 months and judged all areas of the school at that time to be 'adequate'. We were placed in Estyn review, as the changes made needed to embed, meaning that we had 12-18 months to demonstrate progress against all of the Estyn recommendations. We are currently awaiting the outcome of our Estyn Progress Review, submitted in December 2018, which we should know by the end of this term.

Whilst our overall category is 'Yellow', I have included some extracts from our Categorisation report below. As you will see, we are already well on our way towards meeting some of the requirements for the 'highly effective' practice required of green schools, such as having a well run school, with strong leadership and the capacity to support other schools. We will continually strive towards improving standards in the school and giving your children the best possible education in our improvement journey towards excellence.

I am exceptionally proud of the school team and the children in making this rapid improvement from Amber to Yellow over the last 18 months - 2 years. Thank you to all of our families and our community for your support and helping us in many ways, to be the best that we can be.

Extracts from 2018-2019 Categorisation Report

On Leadership and the capacity to improve...

- A strength of the school is the jointly created mission, vision and aims which permeate the life and work of the school and have been instrumental in developing the professional learning culture that exists within the school...
- There is a relentless drive towards continual reflection and improvement. The school has made excellent use of the new professional standards with staff, who reflect upon their own practice against these. This innovative practice has been shared with other school across the region.

- Leadership including governance is good with some evidence of excellent practice around the school.
- Governors are more involved in the life of the school e.g. attendance at school events and trips
 and through participation in reviewing pupils work, and through attendance at regional training
 events...
- Leaders are highly effective and responsive to the outcomes of self-evaluation activities.
- The school newsletter is used to regularly update families about progress.
- Leaders ...engage in disciplined, informed professional enquiry within the school and beyond, this is a strength of the school and has supported the school in developing as a learning organisation well placed to engage fully with curriculum reform.
- The school has planned well for and made effective use of its Pupil Development Grant.
- The school provides good opportunities for all pupils to use and apply IT skills through
 purchasing a range of digital learning resources, which are used effectively to improve pupils'
 digital skills.
- Professional learning opportunities have been provided for almost all staff, who are now able to offer a wider range of interventions e.g. ELSA and Thrive.
- Non-contact time for the ALNCo has improved the quality of planning, provision and tracking for vulnerable learners...

On Teaching, Learning and Pupil Progress...

- The school is making strong progress in developing pupils' skills across the curriculum. Planning for skills has a high priority and pupils are provided with a wide range of opportunities to develop their skills both inside and outside of the classroom and in real life contexts.
- Therefore, pupils' skills in speaking and listening, reading and writing, numeracy and ICT are good.
- Throughout the school, pupils Welsh skills are improving and are at least satisfactory. In Foundation Phase, almost all pupils understand and can use simple phrases and Welsh words...
- End of year outcomes in KS2 show an improvement in pupils Welsh skills.
- There has been strong improvement in pupils use of Welsh around the school, from a relatively low baseline.
- The quality of teaching in foundation phase is a strength of the school with very effective use made of the learning environment to support high levels of pupil engagement and independence in their learning.
- Well-being and attitudes to learning are improving and are good in nearly all classes. Almost all
 pupils demonstrate resilience, confidence and perseverance and remain on task when engaged
 in challenging learning activities and when working independently.
- They respond to the high expectations of the teacher and generally have high expectations of themselves. They work hard to produce outcomes of a good standard given their previous knowledge and understanding.
