The Gospel account for today's feast is far from joyful. Nevertheless, it is one that we *need* to hear and fully understand. For if Jesus had refused to suffer the shame and reproach of the Cross, and if the Crucifixion had never taken place, then our sins could not be forgiven or remitted. As a matter of fact, there wouldn't be a Gospel, for the Gospel stands on the foundation of the Crucifixion. We can experience the resurrection power in our lives because of the crucified and risen Christ.

Today, when we exalt the cross, we're not exalting an instrument of hatred, violence and death used by the ancient Romans — indeed a stumbling block to the Jews and foolishness to the Greeks. Rather, we're exalting how Jesus transformed that instrument into an instrument of love, goodness, victory, and life, and that's the way of the cross we must try to follow.

ow many of you would like to play the piano? Before you say "yes" to that question, let's see what it would cost to be able to play the piano and see if you are willing to pay the price.

First of all, you would have to buy a piano, if you don't have one. It would be rather silly to say that you wanted to play the piano if you weren't willing to go out and buy a piano, wouldn't it? So, the first you would need to do is look for a piano. A used one may cost \$700. Hmm....do you still want to play the piano? Next you need to find a teacher. After all, you can't teach yourself. Did you know that Jesus said that same thing to some people who said they wanted to be His disciples? Jesus told them that if they wanted to follow Him, they had to count the cost. He said they had to be willing to take up their Cross daily and follow Him. To follow Him, they might have to be willing to give up their family and friends. Jesus also said that people might make fun of them and Call them names and that some people might even want to hurt them. They had to count the cost and make sure they were willing to pay the price.

A lot of people today say that they want to follow Jesus. They join the church and for a while you will see them every week, but when they find out how much it is going to cost, they fall away. Being a true follower of Jesus is not always easy, but it is always worth it, if you are willing to pay the price.
