n the Sunday before Great Lent, the last day that traditionally Eastern Christians were allowed to eat dairy products until Easter, the Church remembers the expulsion of Adam and Eve from Paradise. God commanded them to fast from the fruit of a tree (Gen. 2:16), but they did not obey. In this way,

Adam and Eve and their descendants became heirs of death and corruption. In the Gospel, we hear the words of our Lord: "If you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, but if you forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses..." Now, forgiveness stands at the very centre of Christian faith and of Christian life because Christianity itself is, above all, the religion of



forgiveness. God forgives us, and His forgiveness is in Christ, His Son, Whom He sends to us, so that by sharing in His humanity we may share in His love and be truly reconciled with God. Indeed, Christianity has no other content but love. And it is primarily the renewal of that love, a return to it, a growth in it, that we seek in Great Lent, in fasting and prayer, in the entire spirit and the entire effort of that season. Thus, truly forgiveness is both the beginning of, and the proper condition for, the Lenten season.

In the Eastern Rite, Great Lent begins tomorrow. It is a day of strict abstinence for those who have the strength to do so — no meat, fish, oil, wine, eggs, and dairy products should be consumed. Those who are unable to keep such a strict fast are encouraged to eat less, while everyone should refrain from snacking between meals. Vegetables and legumes (lentils, beans, peas, etc.) cooked in water and salt (no stir-frying in oil) are suggested, together with fruit, nuts, bread and honey as alternatives on this day.

Attention all parishioners: The order sheet for pyrohy (for the March 12 making) on the table in the narthex has been removed as we are getting very close to the limits. For any further orders, please call Walter at 475-3757 at your earliest convenience.

### Readings for the 1st Sunday of Lent

(February 18)

(to help prepare for the nourishment of the Word of God at Liturgy)

Epistle: Hebrews 11: 23-26, 32-40; 12: 1-2 Gospel: John 1: 43-51

As you read each passage, ask yourself these questions, "What thoughts, ideas, words or images come to mind?" and "What are the connections between them?" This will help make them easier to follow and understand.

REAT LENT is a period of time when people are more conscious about their spiritual wellbeing. The passages of the Gospels and the Epistles, the hymnology and prayers, the spirit of the Church, all help to cleanse ourselves spiritually through repentance. However, that repentance does not simply mean feeling sorry for our sins. The goal of repentance is the transformation of our minds and hearts, our very consciousness. It means a transformation of our whole life.

To engage in repentance means that we have to embrace change. This change not only will affect our diet for these few weeks, or abstaining ourselves from some bad habits, it will bring a different way of behaving, of perceiving God, our neighbours, and ourselves. It will bring a rejection and renunciation of the old ways we have been living according to, and the adoption of a new way of life.

We have to come to the recognition that how we have been living and behaving does not lead us deeper into communion with God and our neighbours, but rather alienates us from both, and from our very selves. It is only through this transformation that we will be able to open our spiritual eyes, and with all our being, we will be able to shout with joy on Easter Sunday, "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling death by death, and to those in the tombs giving life!"



## Forgive Those Who Sin Against You

Right after Jesus taught us how we should pray using "The Lord's Prayer" in the Gospel of St. Matthew, He continued by saying, "If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you refuse to forgive others, your Father will not forgive your sins." Uh oh. Now that seems tough. It does sound tough, but that is because it matters so much to God. If we expect God to forgive us for the wrong things we do that hurt Him, it is only right for us to forgive the wrong things that other people do that hurt us.

You see, forgiveness is a big deal to God. If we are hurt by someone, it is easy to just ignore them or be angry. Neither of these options makes God happy. God wants all of His children to get along. When we choose to ignore or be angry with others instead of forgiving them, we are not getting along with them like God wants us to.

Even when it is hard to forgive, we can remember that Jesus DIED so we could be forgiven of the many, many sins we commit against Him, and He does not keep track of all the things we do wrong. That helps make it easier to forgive, doesn't it?

So, it is important to forgive everyone, no matter what mean things they say or do. Remember, people may not always say they are sorry. When you forgive, it is not because they feel sorry, but because God told you to forgive them, even if they are never sorry. You do not have to tell them they are forgiven if they do not say sorry, but you need to tell God in your heart that you forgive them. This will help you be kind to these people and continue to get along with them. This does NOT mean we have to stay in situations where people keep hurting us. If a friend continues to be mean, you do not have to spend time with him or her. Continue to pray that he or she would repent to God and turn away from his or her sins, but you do not have to let yourself continue to be hurt. This is especially important if someone is physically hurting you or bullying you or making you uncomfortable in any way. TELL A GROWN UP YOU TRUST. If you want, you can talk to your teacher, your pastor, or your parents. They all care about you very much and want to protect you from getting hurt. Let them know if there is any way they can help you in an unsafe, uncomfortable, or scary situation.
