come to the ending of the Church's Year. And we are reminded that the Church's Year begins in September with the Birth of the Mother of God. The Feast also explains to us the origin of the hymn that we sing to the Mother of God: "More honourable than the cherubim, and by far more glorious than the seraphim". These are not simply elegant words that a pious hymnographer sat down and wrote, they have an origin in a spiritual revelation, as all that is in the Church. For this Feast reminds us of how our Lord from the Cross entrusted the care of His Mother to the



Apostle John the Divine. It reminds us of how the Holy Virgin, then aged about sixty, was visited three days before her falling-asleep by the Archangel Gabriel, who long before had announced to her the conception of Christ in her womb.

We recall how the Apostles were miraculously brought to Jerusalem to make their farewells. We recall how the Virgin gave away all her earthly possessions to poor widows as she made ready for her burial in Gethsemane, next to her parents Saints Joachim and Anna and also her kinsman Joseph. We recall how she comforted the grieving, how her house was filled with light, her face shone and her body was fragrant, as Christ came with the angels to take her soul, as we can see from the icon of this Feast. We are reminded how her soul was taken up by Her Son, together with the cherubim and the seraphim, and now we understand the origin of our hymn: "More honourable than the cherubim, and by far more glorious than the seraphim". We remember how the Apostles, singing in procession, took her body to the tomb which then they sealed. We recall how the Apostle Thomas arrived, delayed for three days, and wanted also to make his farewell; and so the tomb was unsealed and found empty except for the burial clothes and the wonderful fragrance. And from the very beginning we have piously taken this to mean that the body of the Holy Virgin was so pure that it too had been taken up to Heaven, and that is why we have nowhere any bodily relic of the Mother of God. And we understand by this that the first in the Kingdom of Heaven after Christ is the Holy Virgin. We understand by this that even given the weakness of human nature it is possible for our bodies to attain to utmost holiness. The Mother of God is, after Christ, the first-fruit of the Resurrection and shows us the way to the life of the Resurrection.

As stated at the beginning, with this Feast we come to the ending of the Church's Year. In it, we also come to the ending of human life on earth. It is indeed our destiny to die; it is the only certain thing in this life; every day that passes we draw one day nearer to our deaths. However, whatever our destiny, our ambition is not to die, but rather to fall asleep, in the manner of the Virgin, and have our souls taken to heaven by the holy angels, that death might become a mere passage from mortal life to immortality, from this deathly life to deathlessness in the Everlasting Kingdom of Christ and all His saints.

POPE FRANCIS BRINGS EAST AND WEST EVER CLOSER ~ Michael R. Heinlein, OSV

In 2016, Pope Francis ordered several changes to the Catholic Church's Code of Canon Law bringing about further harmony between the Church's Eastern and Latin rites. The changes were decreed in an apostolic letter issued "motu proprio" (on his own authority) called *De Concordia Inter Codices*, published Sept. 15, 2016. The intention of the new laws is to promote congruence in sacramental discipline and practice among the Eastern and Latin churches. As Pope Francis writes in the apostolic letter, "due to the constant concern for correlation between the Codes, I have become aware of certain points that are not in perfect harmony between the provisions of the Code of Canon Law and the Code of Canons of the Oriental Churches."

The changes come as the product of more than 15 years of consultations, and the revisions are the result of a commission of experts assembled by the Pontifical Council for Legislative Texts. Likewise the pontifical council approved the new text before papal promulgation.

Vatican officials have described the changes as necessary because of the growing number of Eastern Catholics in disparate lands.

"From a reading of the 'motu proprio,' it immediately comes to our attention that the motivation for these reforms responds to the desire to facilitate pastoral attention to the faithful, especially in the so-called places of the diaspora, where in areas with a Latin majority, there live thousands of Oriental faithful have left their land of origin," Bishop Juan Ignacio Arrieta, secretary of the Pontifical Council for Legislative Texts, said in a statement.

Bishop Arrieta noted that "wishing to harmonize the two Codes in the pastoral matters most in need of clarification, it was enough to limit the modifications to some texts of the Latin Code, without the need to touch the Oriental one."

The Latin code governs what is commonly referred to as the "Roman Catholic Church" and the Eastern Code governs the 23 *sui iuris* Eastern Catholic Churches. The changes now in force for the Latin Code respond to some of the discrepancies that existed between the two codes — in part due to the differing traditions present in the Eastern and Latin rites but also in part due to the fact the two codes were promulgated close to a decade apart with unique intentions.

Most of the new changes in law promulgated by Pope Francis pertain to the celebration and discipline of the Sacraments of Baptism and Matrimony. The newer, modified laws address questions of marriages between Catholics of differing rites, as well as the rite assigned to a child produced from a union of a mixed-rite marriage. Also addressed are noting the rite of the child in parish sacramental records and the roles of clerics who celebrate or preside at the sacraments. For example, the Latin code allows a deacon to preside validly at a marriage, but if an Eastern Catholic is married in the Latin rite certain conditions for the validity of marriage in the Eastern rites were ignored. The "motu proprio" respects and restores precedence to the necessity of a priest's blessing for a valid marriage in the Eastern Catholic tradition.

The roots of the Latin rite and 23 Eastern rites of the Catholic Church go back to the unique cultures and languages present in the Eastern and Western halves of the Roman Empire as Christianity grew from its persecution to the status as official religion of the empire.

These most recent changes in Church law should come as no surprise to observers of the current pontificate. Pope Francis has exhibited great respect and reverence for the Eastern Churches and rites. <u>In 2014, he restored to the Eastern rite Catholics in diaspora the tradition to allow for a married priesthood, a ban that had been fully in force since 1929.</u>

Pope Francis' regard for the Christian East is likewise reflected in the ecumenical advances during his pontificate with the Orthodox Church. Earlier in 2016, he was the first pope to meet with the Russian Orthodox patriarch since that patriarchate had been established at Moscow in 1589. The recent canonical changes show a sensitivity to various Eastern Christian practices, indicating little Catholic resistance, if any, to the same principles held by even the Orthodox Church.
