Aims and Scope:

The *Taiwan International ESP Journal* is a peer-reviewed academic journal published by the Taiwan ESP Association. The journal has been listed in **TCI-HSS**, **ACI** and accepted by **Scopus**. Its primary objective is to disseminate scholarly information on research and development in the field of **English for Specific Purposes** worldwide, and to bridge between theory and practice. The journal welcomes year-round submissions and contributions that address the common professional concerns of both practitioners and researchers. It is published biannually—in the middle and end of the year.

TIESPJ publishes

(1) articles up to 7000 words that focuses primarily on the following areas of inquiry and development in ESP:

- EAP (English for Academic Purposes)
- EOP (English for Occupational Purposes)
- ESP Initiatives
- ESP Teacher Training
- Discourse/Genre Analysis
- Materials/Course Design
- ESP Methodology
- Assessment and Evaluation
- EIL (English as an International Language)

(2) forums up to 3500 words that discuss researchers' and practitioners' reflection on their current ESP pedagogical practices.

- Establish the empirical or conceptual framework for ESP
- Describe ESP instructional context, pedagogical objectives
- Provide details of how ESP has evolved with paradigm, ideology, or tools
- Comment on the challenges encountered and on the suggestions
- Propose a policy based on a constructive and clear rationale to promote ESP education

Guideline for authors:

Submission of articles and forums :

Articles and forums should be submitted electronically to iPress Online Submission System (<http://www.ipress.tw/J0110>). Each article will be reviewed anonymously by at least two experts in the field.

Each contributor will receive a free copy of the issue in which their article appears in case of multiple authors, the copies will be sent to the primary author. If you have questions about the submission process, please contact tw.esjournal@gmail.com.

Manuscript Format

1. Manuscripts including the abstract, notes and reference list, should be written in English, formatted in Microsoft Word, and typed single spaced on A4 paper, using 12-point font with page numbers. Margins of at least 2cm should be left on all four sides.
2. All manuscripts should be submitted with the author identification removed, but the author's name, affiliation, mailing address, email, and phone number should be given on a separate cover page, to facilitate anonymous review. In case of multiple authors, please indicate the primary author to whom all correspondence should be directed.
3. Manuscripts should normally be no longer than 7000 words. Each article should include an abstract of no more than 350 words plus key words. Forums should be no longer than 3500 words.
4. As far as possible, manuscripts should consist of the following sections: Introduction, , Literature Review, Method, Results and Discussions, and Conclusions.
5. Acknowledgements (if any) of no more than 100 words should be included at the end of

the manuscript, but before the list of references.

6. References should be set up in a separate Reference Section in alphabetical order of the author's name in a list at the end of the manuscript. The English entries should be put first, followed by the Chinese or other language resources. They should be given in standard form, as in the following examples:
