STICKS 'N' STONES

Two weeks ago Karla Sanders (Director and Co-Founder of Sticks 'n' Stones) and Shelly Baird came to provide a taster session of Sticks 'n' Stones to Ako. The students were then given the opportunity to put themselves forward to be part of the Sticks 'n' Stones Junior Ambassador programme.



This is a strength-based Social and Emotional Skills development training programme for Year 5/6 students that takes place every two weeks. Junior Ambassadors take part in a range of games and activities that develop practical skills and confidence to support them in positive relationships. They will also take on a leadership role to run events and create resources for other students at school to apply their learning.

The Sticks 'n' Stones Junior Ambassador programme was developed by a local psychologist and piloted at Hawea Flat school last year, the programme covers the following topics: Resilience Friendships, Self-Esteem, Assertiveness, Emotions, Stronger Together.

Sticks 'n' Stones was founded here in Central Otago in 2013 by 30 teenagers who wanted every (young) person to be accepted and respected for who they are and for bullying to be a thing of the past. Since then, Sticks 'n' Stones has grown into an independent registered charity providing high quality, ongoing training programmes and opportunities for over 500 eight to eighteen year olds across Otago.

Last week the New Junior Ambassadors from Goldfields and Cromwell Primary School met together for a collaborative training day. EOTC WEEKS – JUNIORS MARCH 27-29 & SENIORS MARCH 12-16

Plans are well underway for a range of activities that will happen during Education Outside the Classroom Weeks. Our Years 5/6 students are off to Camp Columba (Pukerau near Gore) in Week 7 (12-16 March) & the Hārewa Team are already planning activities for Week 9 (27-29 March). The Kārearea Team has already completed part of their EOTC Week that included First Aid, Kayaking, Team Co-operative activities and Enviro Art.

Other activities including an overnight camp at the Te Rau Aroha Marae (Bluff) for Year 4 students and bike rides for the Kārearea team are planned for later in the term. You will receive more detailed information from class teachers about EOTC activities.

TEACHER ONLY DAY – SCHOOL CLOSED MONDAY 5TH MARCH

School will be closed for instruction next **Monday 5 March**, to enable all classroom teachers & support staff to attend further training with Margaret Thorsborne, International Restorative Practice Consultant. This Teacher Only Day involves our Cromwell Community of Learning (CoL) and will include staff from Goldfields Primary and Cromwell College. This is a unique opportunity for our staff to hear such a highly regarded speaker presenting in an area we have identified as a key part of how we deal with conflict and teach children to take personal responsibility for their actions and behaviour at school. We know it has a direct and positive effect on our school cultures, and we appreciate your support with this, by making alternative arrangements for your child/children on Monday 5th March.

CURRICULUM CORNER: STARTING SCHOOL

Everyone in the family has to make adjustments to routines once school starts. Establishing workable routines helps everyone cope with their own responsibilities while easing things for others in the family. At the start of the school year, put in place a family plan for bedtimes, morning routines and after-school chores, commitments and homework. A plan will help the family function smoothly, ensure important priorities are met and keep everyone happy and healthy for a successful year.

Strategies:

1. Consider how many activities children can realistically manage. Homework, music lessons, clubs, scouts, sports, dance and speech lessons are all important in building a rounded personality, but children of all ages can become stressed if they take on too much. School demands can vary from year to year and should be taken into account when decisions are made about which activities children sign up for.
2. Ensure school-age children get enough sleep. Both the brain and the body need sleep to refresh, recharge, and function effectively. Establish bedtime routines and stick to them throughout the year. When children know you are consistent, they will organise themselves around the times you have set. Well-rested children are healthier. Parents also need some quiet time to themselves in the evening.
3. Maintain a master calendar. The school provides a Term Calendar (attached to the newsletter) which shows all main events happening at school each particular term. You may choose to buy a large calendar and keep track of everyone's programmes and events. Checking, maintaining and up-dating the calendar can become a routine and help everyone see and respect the busy lives every family member leads, including Mum and Dad.

OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAMME 2018

Special Choir: The Special Choir. Choir is up and running already with Mrs Klemick. The choir is invited to sing in the local community on a number of occasions throughout the year. If your child is in Years 3-6 and missed the original notices about choir, they can catch up with Mrs Klemick who is in the school every Thursday and Friday.

Guitar: Sessions with Pete Stevenson will be held on Thursdays this year. Sessions will commence in March. At this stage we have over 50 students interested, so Pete will be very busy. Pete organises the children into groups of 4 or 5, with new students being kept together and returning students being grouped according to their playing ability. Individual letters have been given to interested students about this, as there is a charge per term (a lump sum can be paid for the whole year). Please return the permission slip and the payment required, as soon as possible. We have restricted guitar in the first instance to Years 4-6 children because of the large number of interested children. Children who were involved with guitar last year will also take precedence, if we have large numbers wanting to learn.

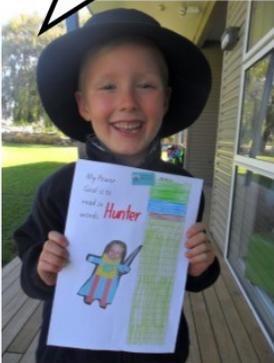
Saturday Morning Music Lessons (SMMC): Johanna Hansen is responsible for this tuition with days and times yet to be confirmed. If your child is interested in learning violin, cello or clarinet, please contact Wendy or Kate (445-0264). Enrolment forms are available from the office.

Kapa Haka: Mary-Anne Tamati, our specialist Te Reo teacher provides Kapa Haka tuition every Monday afternoon. Claire Lincoln (K2) and Karen Gallagher (Ako) are the teachers in charge of Maori across the school and will support the Kapa Haka Groups. There is an expectation that all our senior Maori students will participate in this activity.

HEALTH & SAFETY NEWS

- **Highlighter Vests:** a reminder that it is compulsory for all children travelling on school buses to wear a highlighter vest. Please support the school by ensuring your child has a vest in their school bag for daily use.
 - **Hats:** we are still reminding a number of children about the compulsory wearing of hats in Terms 1/4. It has been good to see lots of hats being purchased from the office. We remind parents that caps are not suitable for wearing at school – we expect children to wear either the new school hat or the old navy hat with a brim. Please ensure these are clearly named!!
 - **Footwear:** there are lots of bees on our grass areas, so please remind your children that they must wear shoes at school, especially in the playground.
 - **Medical Information Forms:** we are currently updating our pupil information files which include any health related issues. Please return the form sent home on the first day of school if you have not already done so. Thank you to the many families who have already returned their forms to the office. If you have lost the form please call at the office to up-date details required.
 - **EOTC Local Permission Form:** we would appreciate the speedy return of the signed permission forms, to allow your child to participate in local based activities outside school. It is important that we receive these from all families, as students will not be permitted to leave the school grounds for class based activities unless this form has been signed and returned. The form was sent out with medical forms and other information last week. If you require a new form please call at the office.
- Drink Bottles:** please ensure that your child has a named drink bottle for their water. We encourage the regular drinking of water at school.

Message from our local police.

Good family rules to promote safety include:

- never accept a ride from a stranger, make sure a parent knows where you are at all times, don't reveal personal information to strangers (including online) and keep the door locked and don't answer it if you are home alone.
- "No, Go, Yell, Tell". These four words are part of the National Crime Prevention Council for teaching children about strangers. This phrase teaches children to yell "No!" if approached by strangers, run away quickly, yell for help and tell a trusted adult what happened. Even young children can learn these four words and what to do.

Most children will grow up without having any trouble with strangers, but it's best to be prepared. Teach your children to be aware of the people around them and follow basic safety rules. Doing this will help them have confidence to know how to keep themselves safe. Start today!

TIPS FOR HEALTHY LUNCHBOXES

1. Base lunches around sandwich type foods plus seasonal fruits and/or vegetables. Try different breads such as wholemeal, pita rolls, flat bread, Panini or naan
2. Use savoury fillings for sandwiches: cold meat, cheese, tinned fish, peanut butter and hummus are great choices for growing children and go really well with salad fillings.
3. Try to keep sweet spreads such as jam, honey or chocolate spread to no more than once a week.
4. Bite sized food such as sandwiches and muffins, fruit cut into small pieces and vegetables sticks are more likely to eaten than larger food items.
5. For the non-sandwich eater try left over pizza, cold pasta, salad, crackers & cheese, wheat biscuits with spread or other breakfast cereals.
6. Over summer to keep food chilled and fresh use an insulated lunchbox or a frozen bottle of water.
7. Water and milk are the only drinks recommended for children. Sweet drinks such as soft drinks, fruit juice and flavoured milks are not recommended as they contribute to weight gain and tooth decay.
8. Although muesli bars may appear to be healthy, many are high in sugar and fat. Look for bars with less than 600kj and less than 2g saturated fat per serve. Unless your child is very active and not overweight, they should be occasional food only.

A CHANGE TO CENTRAL OTAGO PRIMARY SCHOOL SPORTS EVENTS

Central Otago schools have grown significantly in recent years and new schools have been built to cater for the increasing number of school age children. Over the last few years larger numbers of entries at Central Otago primary school sports events have grown to a point, that a review of how we organise school sport, has become a matter of some urgency. A steering group of principals and Bill Godsall from Sport Central, has proposed that from this year we start a three tier interschool sports competition for swimming, triathlon, orienteering, cross country and athletics. This would mean that Clyde pupils would compete in our school competition and be eligible for selection for a Dunstan zone event. Those children who do well at the zone event would be eligible to compete at the Central Otago Sports. Central Otago Schools will no longer select children to compete in Dunedin. However if parents request that they would like their child to compete in any events in Dunedin, and they have reached the qualifying mark for that event CPS will enter them. In recent years, these Dunedin competitions have had a limited number of events, some events do not have the same challenge as our Central Otago competitions and there is a significant amount of travel involved.

Central Otago schools are presently working on a proposal to appoint a regional sports coordinator to oversee the running of the Central Otago competitions.

The new three tier interschool competition will begin this term with our CPS School swimming sports on the 19th of February, the Dunstan zone sports in Cromwell on the 8th of March and the Central Otago Primary School Championships in Cromwell on the 15th of March.

WEB STEPS - AVAILABLE TO YOUR CHILD

Steps is an internationally recognised programme which is used in over 700 schools throughout New Zealand. Steps is a research based literacy programme. It is non age specific, which means anyone regardless of age and ability can be catered for.

Aims of the programme are to strengthen:

- letter/sound correspondence
- Processing skills with sounds and sound patterns
- Rapid whole word recognition
- Spelling accuracy

You can purchase Web Steps yourself online for your child. However, Learning Staircase who manage the Steps programme provide a less expensive option through your child's school. We can register your child for Web Steps at a cost of \$15.00 per student. Websteps allows students to access the programme on any device.
