DEAR PARENTS AND FRIENDS

Children have been busy practising for athletic sports events that are scheduled over the next few weeks. Equipment has been available for students to use during the lunch hours and it has been great to see many children making the most of this additional practice opportunity on a daily basis. This week there have been trials held for Age 7-11 athletes that will enable our main athletic sports to run more efficiently on Tuesday 6 November (Week 4) and to ensure we complete events on our sports day. Our athletes will have an opportunity to qualify for Dunstan Zone and Central Otago Championship Athletic Events following our school sports. As the school roll continues to grow, we are aware that we will need to continue to make ongoing organisational changes to many school-wide events, in order to manage our increasing number of students.

Last Thursday I was very fortunate to attend the Central Lakes Polyfest held in Queenstown. The high quality of the performance by our combined beginner and performance Kapa Haka Groups was a direct reflection of the huge amount of effort and commitment demonstrated by both the children and their tutors – Karen Gallagher, Claire Lincoln and Amber Nepe. CURRICULUM CORNER: HOMEWORK POLICY REVIEW & PARENT FEEDBACK

Currently we are reviewing our homework policy and guidelines as part of our three yearly self review of our school policies. Below is our current policy and guidelines. We will share a Google Survey with all families and we would really appreciate your feedback, based on what homework your children have been doing. Since we last reviewed this policy there have already been changes made by our three teams – Hārewa, Kārearea & Ako. This review will enable us to update our policy and include current feedback from teachers, students and parents.

Homework Policy and Guidelines

Research indicates that at primary school level, homework has little effect on student achievement. However, we believe that the following goals can be fulfilled by assigning some tasks to be undertaken at home:

- To promote the development of positive, successful work and study habits and self-management skills and attitudes.
- To build an attitude that learning is a lifelong skill and takes place outside school as well as in school.
- To foster an active partnership between home and school and to keep parents informed about their children's learning.

Guidelines:

1. Homework is provided on a regular, consistent basis. We have established separate expectations for Junior & Senior School students.
2. **Junior School** - daily homework will consist of:
 - **New Entrants:** Reading book provided by the school and practising sight words on their key rings. Beyond emergent books daily reading book from school and practising key ring of basic facts, Spellwrite spelling words
 - **Years 1-3:** Daily reading book provided or personal reading book on advice from the teacher, Maths and Spelling activities (for example word lists, flash cards, computer based activities, games).
 - Homework will be monitored regularly by the teacher.
- Senior School** - daily homework will consist of:
 - **Years 4-6** (approximately 20-30 minutes maximum daily, 3-4 times per week). Some classes may have homework set each day, others may have weekly homework tasks set.
 - Reading in the senior school is expected to be enjoyment-based with books of the child's own choosing in order to develop a love of recreational reading. 15 - 20 minutes independent reading is encouraged daily.
 - In the senior school students mark their homework collaboratively in class. Teachers will monitor completion and will contact parents of students who regularly do not complete homework tasks.
 - Students in Years 5/6 with their own devices will be expected to access their homework online. This will require access to the internet.
3. Homework tasks will be linked to classroom programmes and will be relevant to what students are learning at school. Homework will be a reinforcement of literacy and numeracy learning taking place at school. It should not involve any new learning. There is a focus on simple skills and materials or on the integration of skills already possessed by the student.
4. Projects may be set at certain times to support classroom programmes or may underpin regular homework routines. These may run for more than one week and teachers will provide guidelines including expectations of time to be spent on projects and expectations of parental involvement.
5. Feedback will be regular and will acknowledge and recognise students' efforts. Students who

consistently complete homework to a good standard will be recognised in a variety of ways (week off homework, stickers, awards.)

6. Staff and parents acknowledge that extra-curricular activities are important. We also believe that homework has an important role and that by following school guidelines (see recommended times for juniors/seniors) students should be able to complete tasks set.
7. Parents are asked to play a supportive and encouraging role with homework tasks which include creating an environment that facilitates the development of study and self-management skills required in preparation for college and further education.
8. Parents who wish to withdraw their child from the homework programme need to make an appointment with the principal to discuss this further.

HEALTH & SAFETY NEWS: BEING SUNSMART

Part of being a sunsmart school is to ensure that parents are made aware each year of our school expectations around being sunsmart.

Sun Protection Procedures

Excessive exposure to ultraviolet radiation (UVR) from the sun causes sunburn, skin damage and increases the risk of skin cancer. New Zealand & Australia have the highest melanoma rates in the world. One or more episodes of sunburn in childhood and adolescence have been shown to increase the risk of melanoma later in life.

This sun protection policy will apply during Terms 1 & 4 (especially between the hours of 11am and 4:00pm). During the winter months sun protection is unnecessary. However, from the beginning of September UVR levels are increasing, therefore sun protection should be used in September when children are outdoors for long periods. Our school will:

- Require children and staff to wear broad rimmed uniform bucket hats (minimum 6 cm brim, deep crown) whenever they are outside.
- Implement a “no hat, no play” policy. Children without hats must play in shade areas only.
- In Terms 2 & 3 students are allowed to play outside without protection. The exception being for Years 4-6 ski trips where students should wear SPF 30+ broad spectrum sunscreen on their faces.
- Work with the wider community to promote the students’ use of SPF 30+ broad spectrum sunscreen
- Encourage children to keep shoulders, necks and arms covered by wearing clothing that protects the skin from the sun e.g. school uniform polo shirt, long .sleeved shirt, hat and long shorts.
- Encourage staff to act as Sunsmart role models by wearing appropriate sun protection.
- Publicise and reinforce the SunSmart Policy through the newsletter and at any other appropriate opportunity.
- Inform parents of the Sunsmart policy at enrolment, especially the use of uniform hats, clothing, SPF 30+ sunscreen and encourage parents to practise SunSmart behaviour themselves.
- Provide sunscreen for every classroom or at school events & activities held outside.
