Hi XXXX, to answer your question on one of our posts -all grizzly bear mortalities that occur this year (2018), including bears killed in self defense, will be reflected in the following year's potential hunting allocation (2019). The mortality limits for this fall were based on last year's population estimate and overall estimate of total mortality. You can view our annual reports here: <https://wgfd.wyo.gov/Wildlife-in-Wyoming?Large-Carnivore/Grizzly-Bear-Management> We are not looking for the cubs at this time because we know that they can survive on their own and we are hopeful that is what happens. But, unfortunately, in either instance, for the sake of mortality estimates they will be considered a mortality.
