


STORY:

I'd been working so hard on writing projects that my visual art had taken a back seat. A light bulb hit me one day: PAINT! BIG! So big, I would be IN it, everyone will be in it! And the viewer will be in it, too.

I hadn't drawn a horse in decades, but I have done so many... they are in my bones. With complete liberation I stepped up to the canvas and said "Okay, no thinking, just GO!" But, liberation is not disconnection. The whole past is always with us, behind us, ahead of us. In this painting, are relatives of the past, present, and future.

STORY:

This second painting was born just after the first. I wanted to paint a different perspective of family. This painting infuses the world with delight + momentum = a sense of frolicking.

STORY:

I had just completed a massive white horse rearing, and wanted to do it again. This stallion marches through a windy vast plain, in the middle of the night, guarding the sleeping herd. Nothing gets in his way. The energy emanating from him is calm power. After this painting, I knew these were more than decorations. They create an environment that imbues the viewer with a special energy.

STORY:

STORY:

For this painting, the sixth, I wanted an interaction between the subjects—a backstory, a little drama. (Siblings!) After decades of strife, my sisters and I finally get along again. It's a big deal. I found an image for inspiration, stepped up to the canvas, cleared my mind, and painted. A funny thing happens when you do that: Life. Story. Connection. These horses painted themselves, complete with their life story, their personalities, and the conversation that we get to join. There is communication and understanding—Beyond words. And they know you know. They know you "get it," and that it's all OK.

STORY:

A friend said, "I'm going to arrange a show for you in Kentucky!"

I cried, happy. "I'll paint the Kentucky Derby."

One image called to me, so I cropped it and painted this, inspired by it.

After, I thought, "Well, I wonder what horse that is—who I focused on?"

Among a throng, there was one that had drawn my eye: Justify!

In those muscles and eyes, and heart, is a winner. The mud at the bottom is an equally important subject. It rained over three inches.

Justify battled through the slippery sloppy mess of mud and doubt, but believing in himself, he ran hard, and WON!



Action

STORY:

Hang on! The rider's only purpose is to choose the cow, and when to "quit" it and end the run. This is an amazing game of cat and mouse. Imagine strapping yourself on a pouncing cat's back.

All three know what the others are thinking, and the rules of the game. Play. Work. Commitment and community. All urges are in sync.

The rider and horse have one body-mind, and have one body-mind with the "adversary" the cow. If you've ever watched cutting horses, you've witnessed a miracle. One Mind, One Body engaged in heart-pounding fast-pasted action.

Like rifle marksmanship: Self-doubt points you away from the target.

Positive self-talk redirects you towards the target.

But non-thinking clear action, after the decision has been made, aims you AT the target.

STORY:

For the last of this series, I had to address Dressage. The closer I looked, the stranger, and more strained, this sport became for me. Throughout history, humans have portrayed horses with arched necks and exaggerated gaits. Why? These horses are trained to exhibit the posture of warlike competition. Wild mustangs posturing and protecting exhibit the poses we see in dressage. Don't be fooled:

This gentility is dressed up and polished bravery and fight.

STORY:

Similar to *Action* I wanted to capture One Body-Mind action, but on a smaller canvas. Polo is complete confidence, cooperation, commitment and one body-mind action—not only between horse and rider, but between two horses and their riders. Fast, dangerous, chaotic.

Focus and Trust are your lifelines.

Artist statement

I decided to blend my studies of Zen, anthropology, philosophy, graphic design and hypnotherapy to create huge black and white pieces that would create environments that infuse the inhabitants with the energy of big, bold, confident horses.

Bio

Anna grew up riding horses in the Hollywood Hills, then enjoyed the Boston punk scene of the 80's. She's been in Utah for almost 30 years, having earned degrees at the U of U in Anthropology and Philosophy with combined studies in art and linguistics. On the weekends, you can find her upon a cutting horse outside of Park City, Utah.

Her art has been, and is being, exhibited in Salt Lake City, Boston, and Hollywood.

Process

For Anna, painting is an act of clarity, liberation, and joy. She approaches each blank canvas as she addresses a golf ball, or a shooting range target—with a clear Zen mind, with trust and complete confidence. Then, with Japanese sumi-e brush, house paintbrush, or Dollar Tree store-bought broom, she steps into her paintings—literally on them, as the huge unstretched canvases lay on the floor. Pencil marks are laid down first—"to get the eyes in the right places." Getting the perspective right at a compromised angle is challenging—reminiscent of being a small child drawing at the dining room table. Most of her paintings are completed in one session. Working with India ink has some unique challenges as it often has a mind of its own in how it will eventually dry. The biggest challenges are in keeping Bam Bam (dog) and the cats off the wet canvases, and finding walls that are "big enough" for displaying finished pieces.
