Griffin Page 1	<b>INSTRUCTION: Paraphrase the first part of the quotation, and then embed the second part:</b> <i>Studies have been done on the effects of sleep patterns on healthy people, and one such study found that disturbed sleep patterns caused some participants to have "blood glucose levels that qualified as pre-diabetic" (Griffin 1); this clearly supports the notion that bad sleep patterns can negatively impact one's health.</i>
As much as the speaker wishes to stop by the woods, he clearly feels a sense of responsibility.	<i>The woods are lovely, dark and deep, / But I have promises to keep, / And miles to go before I sleep</i>	POEM <b>Stopping By Woods on a Snowy Evening</b> by Robert Frost Lines 13 - 15	<b>INSTRUCTIONS: Include a part of the quotation; mention the name of the poet &amp; poem in your sentence.</b> <i>In Frost's poem 'Stopping By Woods on a Snowy Evening', the speaker identifies that the woods are indeed "lovely, dark and deep" (13), but he knows he has somewhere else to be and feels the weight of his obligations and "promises to keep" (14).</i>
Pip loves Estelle deeply. He loves her almost to the point of obsession.	<i>I loved her against reason, against promise, against peace, against hope, against happiness, against all discouragement that could be.</i>	BOOK <b>Great Expectations</b> by Charles Dickens Page 411 (Said by Pip)	<b>INSTRUCTIONS: Include the quotation (or a part of it) in the middle of your sentence.</b> <i>When Pip declares that he loves Estelle "against reason, against peace, against hope, against happiness, against all discouragement" (Dickens 411), the reader gets the sense that his love is strong, though perhaps to the point of being obsessive.</i>
If smoking is banned in public spaces, it will have an effect on both smokers and non-smokers.	<i>Smoke-free workplaces not only protect non-smokers from passive smoking but also encourage smokers to quit or reduce their consumption, reducing total cigarette consumption per employee by 29%.</i>	ARTICLE <b>Effect of Smoke-free Workplaces</b> by Fichtenberg, & Glantz Page 5	<b>INSTRUCTIONS: Break up the quotation and include at least two portions of it in your sentence:</b> <i>One study found that smoke-free workplaces positively effected "non-smokers from passive smoking", while at the same time encouraging "smokers to quit or reduce their consumption" (Fichtenberg &amp; Glantz 5), which gives weight to the argument for banning smoking in public spaces.</i>
The speaker clearly shows a resilience of spirit; she refuses to give up in life.	<i>You may trod me in the very dirt / But still, like dust, I'll rise.</i>	POEM <b>Still I Rise</b> by Maya Angelou Lines 3 - 4	<b>INSTRUCTIONS: Include the quotation (or a part of it) in the middle of your sentence.</b> <i>When the speaker of Angelou's poem says that no matter how badly she is treated, "still, like the dust, [she'll] rise" (4), she clearly shows a resilience of spirit and a refusal to give up.</i>
