Let's talk about using PRONOUNS WHEN WRITING

Pronouns (you, me, he, she, him, her, they, we etc.) are used to replace proper nouns and nouns. You should know how to use them sophisticatedly in order to make your writing fluent and interesting.

LOOK AT THESE PARAGRAPHS:

Sam never wanted to lie to Joanne. Sam wanted to repair their friendship. However, Joanne refused to listed to Sam and all attempts Sam made to repair things, Joanne simply ignored. Joanne maintained that Sam had lost his last chance when Sam missed Joanne's birthday. Still, Sam had to lie in order to make one last attempt at repairing things.

If you don't use pronouns in your writing, it will be extremely repetitive and lack fluency.

Dave and Mr. Colt had never seen eye-to-eye. He despised the way he always corrected people's grammar and the way he was just so sanctimonious. Still, he knew that they had to work together, and he was always going to be in his life. Moreover, he certainly had his good points.

However, if you overuse pronouns, your writing can become extremely confusing.

When writing, you want to make sure that you use a mixture of nouns, pronouns and noun phrases in order to keep your writing varied, fluent and interesting.

One more thing: NOUN PHRASES

Sometimes, instead of using a noun or a pronoun, you can use a <u>noun phrase</u> to keep your writing varied. A noun phrase is a group of words which function as a noun.

I first met the mystical old man when I visited his cabin as a teenager. He was a bit of a recluse, but he was kind, and he sure showed this young fella how to be a man.
