In celebration of both Twelfth Night and the Feast of the Epiphany, we are proud to present this important American work. Amahl, a shepherd, tries to tell his mother about what he



has seen outside; an enormous star with a long tail. His mother, used to his habitual lying, grows angry; she is even angrier when Amahl tells her that a knock at the door is three kings come to visit them. The kings enter and tell the two peasants that they have come to find a king, and they show the rich gifts they have brought him. While Amahl's mother is out gathering wood for the fire, Amahl asks the kings questions about their lives. The mother returns with her neighbors, and the villagers present their gifts to the visitors. That night, Amahl's mother tries to steal some of the kings' gold to use to help her child; she is caught, and when the kings offer to let her keep the gold, explaining that the king they seek will need nothing but love to rule his kingdom, she returns it. Amahl offers his staff as an additional gift, and suddenly finds that he can walk. He leaves with the kings to pay homage to the child who has healed him.

Charpentier's Te Deum

The <u>Te Deum</u> (H 146) is unquestionably the best known composition of Marc-Antoine Charpentier (1643–1704), especially since its "*Prélude en rondeau*" was made the Eurovision signature tune. Although Charpentier set the <u>Te Deum</u> altogether four times, this is his only setting employing a "military band", i.e. trumpets and timpani. This brilliant and magnificent piece was frequently played at victory celebrations and other occasions of public jubilation during the 17th century. Presented amid Choral Evensong with orchestra, our final concert of the series will be certain to be one of the highlights of the season.
