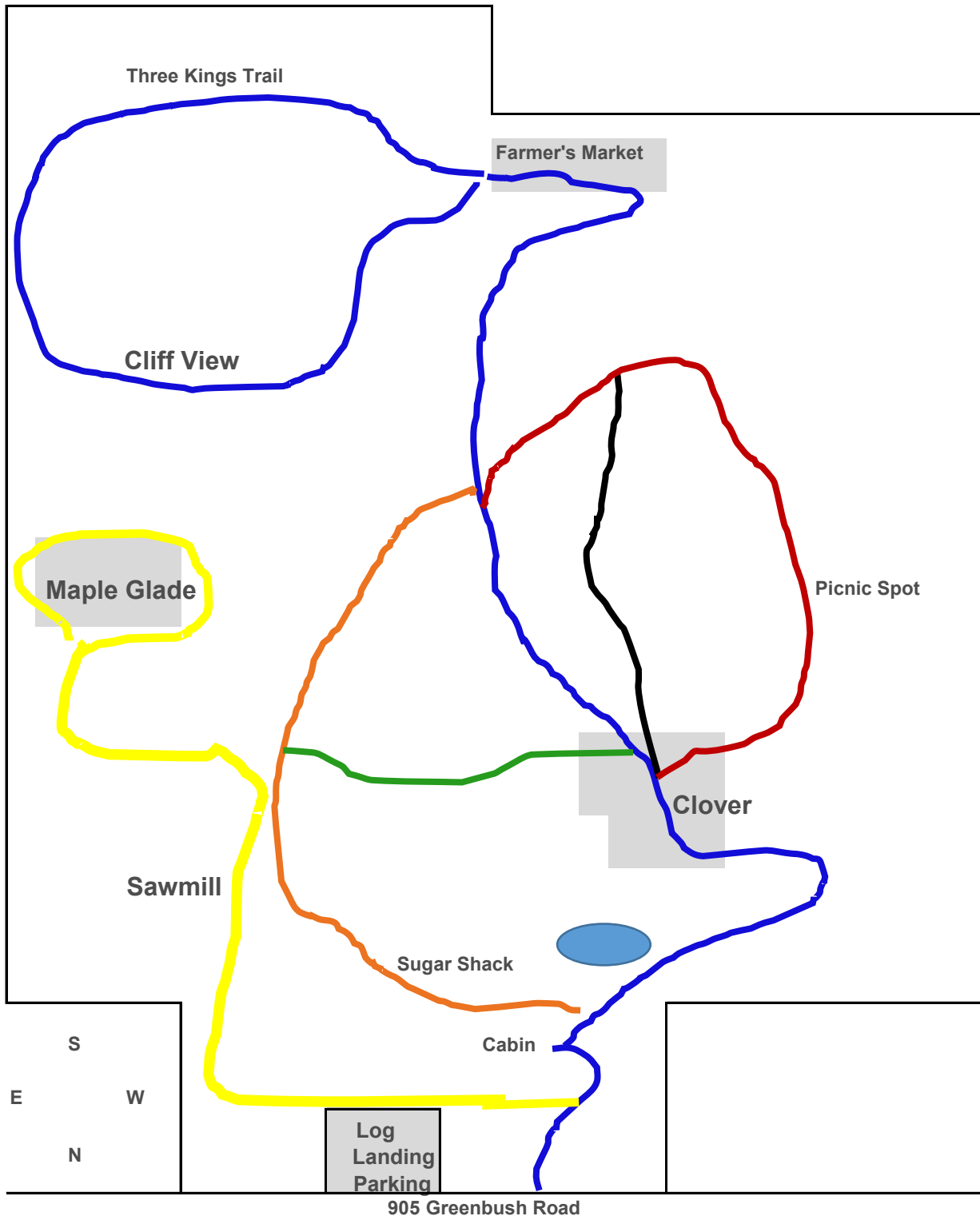


Crocker Family Forest

Maple Glade Trail

0.5 miles
Yellow Arrows

This is a trail with a gentle slope through Pines and Balsam Fir ending in a stand of Red and Sugar Maple. We tap nearly 70 trees here in the spring to make our delicious Maple Syrup!

Sugar Shack Trail

0.4 miles
Orange Arrows

This trail starts behind the Sugar Shack through a small clearing with regenerating Balsam Fir, then a gentle sloping trail ending in a stand of graceful Hemlocks overlooking a great view of the Five-Acre Bog.

Clover Field Spur

0.1 mile
Green Arrows

This is a shortcut connecting the Sugar Shack Trail to the trails behind the Clover Field. Look for deer and rabbit tracks here!

Picnic Spot Trail

0.25 mil
Red Arrows

This trail moves from the Clover Field through an opening with several apples trees, then along a slight ridge with partial views of the Five-Acre Bog, then connects to the Three Kings Trail near the Shooting Bench.

The small clearing with the apples trees is a favorite spot to stop and enjoy the sun and have a snack!

Middle Road Spur

0.1 miles
Black Arrows

This is an alternative route through a mix of Balsam Fir, Beech, White Birch and Beaked Hazelnut.

Look for grouse, turkey, and small mammal tracks near each of the brush piles. They love them for warmth and protection!

The Three Kings Trail

1.1 miles - Blue Arrows

This is our longest (and favorite!) trail. Beginning near the Cabin, the trail bisects the Crocker Family Forest, displaying the full diversity of tree cover and land types.

From the Cabin to the Clover Field, the ground is ledge, resulting in slight rolling hills. A mix of Poplar, Maple, Birch and Spruce is common here.

Once past the Clover Field, the trail is flat to the Shooting Bench which overlooks the Five-Acre Bog.

Cross the bridge and follow the trail to the top of a steep ledge outcropping and the Farmer's Market . Crossing the meadow and re-entering the woods, you will find several interesting sections.

Bearing right, you will first encounter Squirrel City, a mix of Hemlock, Spruce and Fir favored by red squirrels. Next are the Three Kings, a trio of 90+ foot tall White Pines that are always worth a selfie!

The trail winds along, crosses a small brook, and goes along the top of a beech ridge. The trail follows the ridge top through Red Pine, Balsam Fir and ends up back at the Farmer's Market.

Parking Lot

Park carefully so others can park.
Park only in the cleared sections.
Please pick up after yourself.

Property Boundaries

Feel free to explore the trails and woods.
Stay within the property boundaries.
Most property lines are clearly marked.

Safety

Stay off the ice! (both pond and bog)
Cell service is spotty—Don't rely on it.
