The struggle

Today, health and social service providers in the community work on **CARE ISLANDS** - - while they appear close in proximity, communication and reporting barriers make it difficult for providers to track and coordinate care as an integrated team.

Communities with fragmented systems of care struggle to deliver whole-person care and produce relatively low achievement in population health and well-being.






What is the Health Commons Network?

A Natural Community of Care is powered by a technology platform, called the Health Commons Network (Commons). The Commons is a communication network that digitally connects health and social service agencies in a Community. Where agencies in a Natural Community of Care are connected to the Commons:

- Providers can share the informatior needed to coordinate and track care as an integrated team
- 2. Organizations can disseminate strategies, workflows, and best practices that improve population health and well-being.





What is the Health Commons Project?

We are group of PNW communities, provider organizations, and technologists dedicated to creating connected and sustainable systems for delivery of whole-person care. We call these new systems Natural Communities of Care.



A Natural Community of Care is a fully integrated system of care where health and social service providers work together to ensure there is "No Wrong Door" for people to access the care and services they need. A Natural Community of Care is designed to improve the population health and well-being of individuals and populations.





How does the Health Commons Network work?






The Commons supports a wide range of digital tools including Electronic Health Record, eReferral, Health Information Exchange, eConsult, Secure Chat, Digital Consent and Remote Monitoring.

The Commons is vendor agnostic. The Commons Project Team works with your organization to identify and implement best-in-class technology based on what is best for each pilot test / use case.

The Commons operates like a public utility. Partnering organizations in a Natural Community of Care develop a financial model to sustain the Commons. Each organization that connects to the Commons uses their voice to drive system improvements.



- Remainder of 2018
 - Continue to seek braided funding
 - Enhance partnership with Puget Sound Fire and Greater Columbia
 - Roll out Commons to Clallam NCC, starting with the Opioid/Primary Care workflow)
 - Finalize governance documents
 - Considering Community Paramedicine home visits
- Kittitas and South King NCCs are focused on Community Paramedicine
 - Workflows are easily shareable with Olympic (no need double pay!)
- Present 2019 Commons budget at October Board meeting

Kitsap NCC Survey Results

- 32 respondents.
- 8/32 reported this was their first NCC
- 12/32 reported PHBH CP was "somewhat difficult," with one "very difficult."
- 5/32 reported PHBH CP was "somewhat easy."
- 26/32 say they feel "very" or "somewhat" connected to their NCC.
 - 5 say "a little."



Kitsap NCC Survey Results

- 27/32 feel "very" or "somewhat" connected to the work connected to the work connected to the work of OCH.
 - 4/32 say the feel "a little" or "not at all" connected to the work of OCH.




Background

This is our final version of your Natural Community of Care's Shared Change Plan following three convenings during January and February with your input and revisions. It has been updated to include additional partners. This Shared Change Plan represents agreement by the listed parties on shared expectations, goals and strategies of the Medicaid Transformation Project (MTP), a statewide initiative to improve care for the Medicaid beneficiaries of Washington.

Adoption of MTP Goals

We commit to the following goals Olympic Community of Health has put forward to transform the health system for Medicaid beneficiaries:

- Prepare for or optimize value-based contracts
- Continually enhance processes to integrate care
- Improve patient/client access and health outcomes
- Collaborate with partners within our Natural Community of Care (NCC) to coordinate care
- Collaborate with partners in our NCC and across NCCs to address social influences of health and improve health equity
- Collaborate on transformation activities that will benefit by and/or require a cooperative approach to be successful. These activities
