President's Message

I have heard many positive comments about Pastor Scott's preaching and his interaction with you, the congregation! Those are good things! Thanks be to God for bringing us together!!!

I want to thank you for your outstanding support at the Congregation Meeting on September 2nd and your understanding that our facility is aging and needs some loving care! Two of the three items we brought to your attention have already been resolved.

The two air conditioners over the preschool/ fellowship hall area have been replaced. The flat roof, over that same area, has been recoated. I have a mixed message for you on that subject. The good news is that the contractor found very little evidence of dry rot or leakage. They fixed what little they did find before they applied the new coating. The other side of the coin, isn't bad news just costly news. The contractor offered to apply the same material to the roof of the administration wing for an additional cost of only \$14,500. The added work would raise the total roofing cost from \$45,500 to \$60,000.

This offer was based upon three factors: no significant repairs were necessary on the flat roof which reduced the time and cost required to complete it; the roof of the administration wing was in need of recoating but required no significant repairs; the contractor's team was already here and had the time, before their next scheduled project, to complete this whole task.

Time was of the essence! Your Executive Committee considered the above factors and, recognizing there was not enough time to call another Congregation Meeting before the contractor's original work would be finished, made the decision to authorize the additional cost.

Other things we considered in our decision were: we had already entered into the refinancing process that you authorized; a number of significant contributions have already been made and/or promised; thankfully there has been an increase in Debt Reduction (green envelope) giving.

We can hold off, for a few months, on the window replacement in the preschool area. But, in the last week, a new expense has been added to our ongoing list. Another air conditioning unit has reached the end of its life cycle. Luckily, with autumn here, we can hold off on replacing this, too.

I have been praying that you will follow through, as you are able, to help pay down this additional debt. I hope you will join me in those prayers.

"Peak Season"

This past Sunday was the first day of autumn. A season of change that marks the beginning of the transition from summer to winter. This transition held additional meaning to us these past nine autumns, because we lived in New England. Autumn was always a time of great beauty and thanksgiving,

the humid heat of summer finally began to fade and the fall colors began to appear. Each autumn there was much speculation about when the leaf colors would be at their most majestic, or peak. It was impossible to predict, but people planned their "leaf peeping" trips around the forecast, much like a farmer would rely upon the Farmer's Almanac to time their planting. As a native Californian I appreciated the beauty of fall, and enjoyed the cooler, and less humid, weather, but I dreaded the winter that autumn foretells!

But that is not all that I dreaded! The leaves that turned beautiful shades of red, orange and yellow eventually fell off of the trees and had to be dealt with. Countless are the hours I spent raking and blowing leaves into piles each year. With limited daylight and temperatures falling, it was difficult to find the ideal day and time to rake leaves. When it appeared as though the time was good; a breeze would inevitably pick up, dislodging more leaves from the trees, and disturbing those that had already been raked into a pile! Over the years I developed a real love/hate relation with "peak season" and the beautiful fall foliage that became my chore.

However, while I was raking leaves I did my best to adopt my grandmother's thankful and positive approach. Whenever she tackled a task she always found a way to give God thanks; so when raking the leaves I adopted a posture of thanksgiving. I gave God thanks for the shade that each of the leaves that I was raking had once provided for me, my family, our dog and any of the children from the church and preschool who might have played beneath them. For trees, their leaves and the shade that they provide (in addition to the oxygen that we can't live without) are gifts from God, the giver of every good and perfect gift. So it was appropriate to give thanks to God for them!

Autumn is also the season of the harvest, when the fruits of our labors and the abundance of God's creation conspire to produce much of the food that we eat. Traditionally, harvest festivals and Oktoberfest's were celebrated to acknowledge the bounty of the harvest. The first fruits of the harvest were used to celebrate and give thanks to God for the abundant provision and blessing that God had provided. Over time these celebrations have become a celebration of the conclusion of the work of the harvest; an acknowledgment of the labor of those who have worked the field and gathered the harvest.

Giving God thanks for the abundance of God's creation and the many blessings that we have received is a part of our worship each Sunday. In addition to giving thanks to God in song and prayer, we are invited to give God thanks through the offering of the first fruits of our labors. Collection of the offering is often seen as a necessary "evil" in the life of the church (kind of like raking leaves), but it should be done with a grateful heart as we give God thanks for the abundant harvest that we have each received. Our generous God will continue to provide for us, as we respond to God's leading of the ministries of Lutheran Church of the Ascension and Lutheran Christian Preschool. Let us give with a grateful heart.

These numbers do not reflect any funds going into or going out of dedicated accounts. As of August 31st all bills and benevolences are paid.

The total offerings received during the ninth month of the 2018 fiscal year are \$38,705.01. Offerings include regular and restricted (white envelopes), loose plate, Sunday school, Simply Giving and Thrivent Choice Dollars that are designated as regular or restricted. 4.57% of the offerings received were designated as restricted, which means that the donors do not want their offerings included in calculating the congregation's basic benevolence amounts. (10.5% of General Fund offerings are designated for benevolence.)

Schwab Funds: Balance as of June 30, 2018 - \$372.93.

The money market account at American River Bank as of July 31, 2018 -\$84,976.85.

Mortgage:

The outstanding mortgage balance on the August 7, 2018 statement was \$44,816.19. An additional principal payment of \$1510.00 received in August for debt retirement was made from Line Item 721 Debt Reduction on August 27, 2018. After the September 1st payment the new balance is \$40,335.37.

A copy of the August 2018 financial report that includes the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Activities for all General Fund accounts is posted on the bulletin board in the narthex.

Property Committee



Properties Committee Mission Statement: Following God's commandment for good stewardship, the Properties Committee oversees the property of the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in an efficient, effective and economical manner.

We are continuing to make progress on many projects and have some projects which will need additional funds to complete as well as your physical labor, all of which is so greatly appreciated.

Biblical Garden: The Properties Committee has been working diligently in order to proceed with the Yamasaki architecture plan for the Biblical Garden. The landscaping crew has laid the pavers in the walkway. With the help of volunteers, installation of the bender board is completed and rock has been placed around the perimeter of the garden. We will be discussing the appropriate plants based on what is in the bible. Based on funding, the planting is scheduled to begin in late October or early November. We also have to determine what material to use as a ground cover. Our goal is to reduce the maintenance for this area while providing a place for some quiet time. You are welcome to watch our progress as we move forward.

Exterior Painting of Soffits and Two Walls: The exterior painting project as well as repairing and painting of the fountain was completed. The rest of the outside walls around the sanctuary is to be painted at the end of October/November.

Kitchen Oversight Committee (KOC) Update:

Wally Rosenberg is in the process of building new cabinets that will replace the mailboxes and cabinets below the mailboxes. We are estimating they will be finished in about three weeks. We will keep you posted.

Work day in October:

Be sure to watch out for the announcement in the bulletin, email and Friday's EBLAST regarding our upcoming church workday. This day is always open to all ages.

Facility Projects:

The roof over the Preschool, Youth Room and offices is now being repaired and will be completed by the time you read this newsletter.

Installation of the windows for the Preschool/Sunday School rooms is scheduled for some time in November.

The installation of two, new AC units in the Preschool/Sunday School area has been completed.

We are focusing on finding the correct-sized tables that will be replacing 10-15 tables for the Fellowship Hall.

We are purchasing six outdoor LED lights for the parking lot which should be installed in October. This will improve the lighting in the parking lot significantly and help reduce the electrical utility bill.

We have decided upon new flooring for Conference Room 1 and the Office Hallway, however we still need the funds (approximately \$4,000) to cover this.

We welcome your input and your help with any project. <u>Please remember that the Properties Committee must review and approve all facility-related projects.</u> The necessary form for this can be obtained from Susie.

Great Lesson on Stress

A young lady confidently walked around the room with a raised glass of water while leading a seminar and explaining stress management to her audience. Everyone knew she was going to ask the ultimate question, 'Half empty or half full?' She fooled them all. "How heavy is this glass of water?" she inquired with a smile. Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. To 20 oz.

She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm.

If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. In each case it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes."

She continued, "and that's the way it is with stress. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on."

"As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we're refreshed, we can carry on with the burden - holding stress longer and better each time practiced.

Treasurer Comments - October 2018

You will recall that at our 9/2/2018 special congregational meeting, we approved a mortgage refi, along with a new loan of \$120K to pay off the mortgage and complete some much needed building repairs. The major project is the resealing of the roof over the kitchen/preschool/fellowship hall building. After inspection by the roof contractor, it was discovered that the roof over the office building is in at least as bad a condition as the other roof. An estimate to reseal that roof was provided to us (\$15K). It seemed a smart decision to add this project on while the roofer was here. It is currently being done as I write this.

Ideally, we would have liked to have added that additional amount onto our new requested loan, but the amount is more than the council has authorization to approve without congregational approval (1% of current approved budget). We are seeking your help with your green debt reduction envelopes to assist with this extra project.

How about some good news!! As I may have mentioned in the past, we normally have about 10-12 members who use their green debt reduction envelope consistently each month. Since we have talked several times recently on the great benefit of also contributing to the debt pay down, already this month we have received debt reduction contributions from 22 members! Thank you so much for listening to us. This is the way to get these much needed projects completed and pay down our loan.

It is also that time to get next year's budget put together. Our most significant change from the past year is the calling and installation of our Pr Scott. Along with a full time pastor, comes the additional expenses of supporting that pastor. Let your weekly offerings reflect how we have been blessed to complete this long process. We know the Lord is truly watching out for us and guiding us in our missions!

Save the Date: Saturday, November 3 HART Spaghetti Feed


