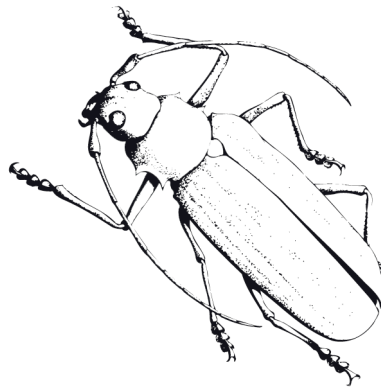

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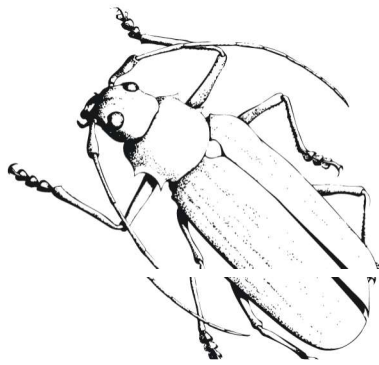

# Little Children's Bible Lessons

## Instructions

1. It does not matter the time of the year when you start using this book.
2. It would be well to take many walks that you might observe nature.
3. Remember to repeat your simple words over and over again.
4. Sing hymns that relate to the lessons, character qualities, and nature.
5. When a memory verse is too long, only give the young child a phrase from the memory verse. A very young child may only say one or two words of the whole verse. Reward him with a hug and a kiss. The important thing is to start teaching your young children to memorize Bible Verses. We recommend the Old King James Version as its words are easier for them to memorize as are metered poems.

**Remind**—these are to be used to help the children remember what you have taught them about the Bible lesson, nature lesson, and character quality

**Reinforce**—here are practical, hands-on ways to help the facts become a part of the daily life

**Remarkable Parent Food**—thoughts for the parent/teacher

4. Please note that there is usually more information in each day then can be covered. Do not overload your children with information. Teach one idea and teach it well!

## Research Making Plans

“Abraham had become an old man, and expected soon to die; yet one act remained for him to do in securing the fulfillment of the promise to his posterity. Isaac was the one divinely appointed to succeed him as the keeper of the law of God and the father of the chosen people, but he was yet unmarried. The inhabitants of Canaan were given to idolatry, and God had forbidden intermarriage between His people and them, knowing that such marriages would lead to apostasy. The patriarch feared the effect of the corrupting influences surrounding his son. Abraham’s habitual faith in God and submission to His will were reflected in the character of Isaac; but the young man’s affections were strong, and he was gentle and yielding in disposition. If united with one who did not fear God, he would be in danger of sacrificing principle for the sake of harmony. In the mind of Abraham the choice of a wife for his son was a matter of grave importance; he was anxious to have him marry one who would not lead him from God.

“In ancient times marriage engagements were generally made by the parents, and this was the custom among those who worshiped God. None were required to marry those whom they could not love; but in the bestowal of their affections the youth were guided by the judgment of their experienced, God-fearing

parents. It was regarded as a dishonor to parents, and even a crime, to pursue a course contrary to this.

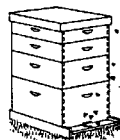
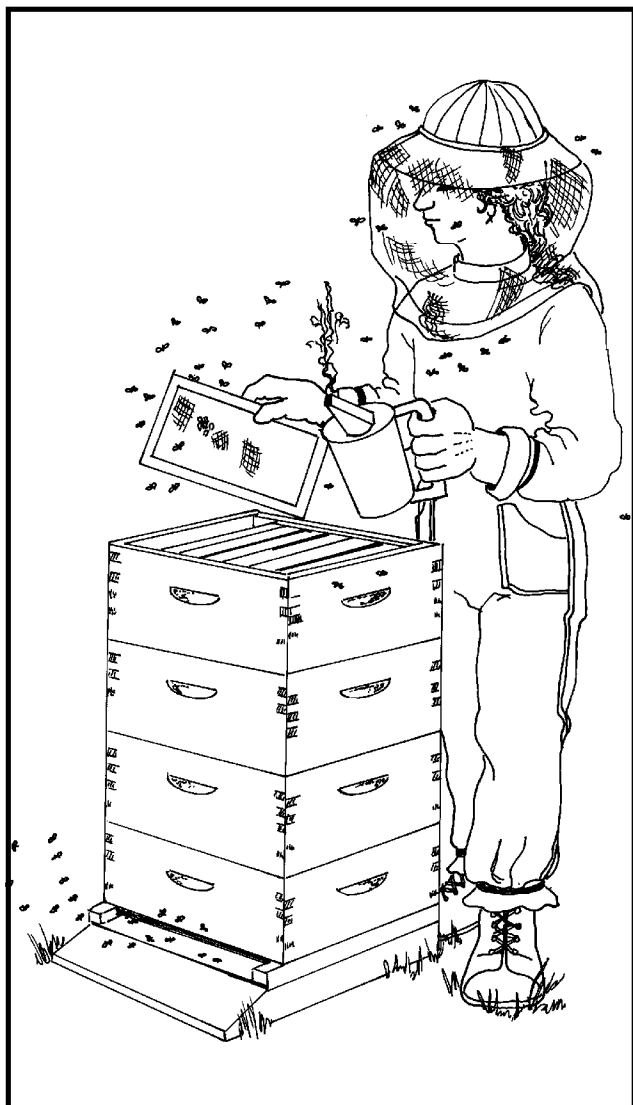
“Isaac, trusting to his father’s wisdom and affection, was satisfied to commit the matter to him, believing also that God Himself would direct in the choice made. The patriarch’s thoughts turned to his father’s kindred in the land of Mesopotamia. Though not free from idolatry, they cherished the knowledge and the worship of the true God. Isaac must not leave Canaan to go to them, but it might be that among them could be found one who would leave her home and unite with him in maintaining the pure worship of the living God. Abraham committed the important matter to *‘his eldest servant,’* a man of piety, experience, and sound judgment, who had rendered him long and faithful service. He required this servant to make a solemn oath before the Lord, that he would not take a wife for Isaac of the Canaanites, but would choose a maiden from the family of Nahor in Mesopotamia. He charged him not to take Isaac thither. If a damsel could not be found who would leave her kindred, then the messenger would be released from his oath. The patriarch encouraged him in his difficult and delicate undertaking with the assurance that God would crown his mission with success. *‘The Lord God of heaven,’* he said, *‘which took me from my father’s house, and from the land of my kindred...He shall send his angel before thee.’*” (*Patriarchs and Prophets* 171-172)

Abraham’s servant showed him great **courtesy**. How? By being polite, and by kindly agreeing to help find Isaac a wife. He respected his master. *“The hoary head is a crown of glory, if it be found in the way of righteousness”* (Proverbs 16:31).

*"Thou shalt rise up before the hoary head, and honour the face of the old man, and fear thy God: I am the Lord" (Leviticus 19:32).*

Honeybees work to produce honey; they have to visit about 2,000 flowers to make just one tablespoonful of honey. ## Research Seeking a Wife

“The messenger set out without delay. Taking with him ten camels for the use of his own company and the bridal party that might return with him, provided also with gifts for the intended wife and her friends, he made the long journey beyond Damascus, and onward to the rich plains that border on the great river of the East. Arrived at Haran, ‘*the city of Nahor*,’ he halted outside the walls, near the well to which the women of the place came at evening for water. It was a time of anxious thought with him. Important results, not only to his master’s household, but to future generations, might follow from the choice he made; and how was he to choose wisely among entire strangers? Remembering the words of Abraham, that God would send His angel with him, he prayed earnestly for positive guidance. In the family of his master he was accustomed to the constant exercise of kindness and hospitality, and he now asked that an act of **courtesy** might indicate the maiden whom God had chosen.

“Hardly was the prayer uttered before the answer was given. Among the women who were gathered at the well, the **courteous** manners of one attracted his attention. As she came from the well, the stranger went to meet her, asking for some water from the pitcher upon her shoulder. The request received a kindly

answer, with an offer to draw water for the camels also, a service which it was customary even for the daughters of princes to perform for their fathers’ flocks and herds. Thus the desired sign was given. The maiden ‘*was very fair to look upon*,’ and her ready **courtesy** gave evidence of a kind heart and an active, energetic nature. Thus far the divine hand had been with him. After acknowledging her kindness by rich gifts, the messenger asked her parentage, and on learning that she was the daughter of Bethuel, Abraham’s nephew, he ‘*bowed down his head, and worshiped the Lord*.’” (*Patriarchs and Prophets* 172-173)

He prayed a special prayer that just the right young lady would come to the well and give him and his camels a drink of water. He could not choose wisely without God’s help. This special request for a sign was for an act of **courtesy**, shown by the maiden who God had chosen. His master Abraham’s household were always kind and **courteous**. He just finished his prayer and Rebekah came with a pitcher on her shoulder. She was beautiful, but better than that she was **courteous**. When Eliezer asked for a drink she gave him a drink and offered to draw water for the camels also. Was this the wife for Isaac?

# MONARCH BUTTERFLY



The Monarch butterfly is very beautiful, and colorful. It reminds me of Rebekah who “*was very fair to look upon.*” Even more beautiful was her kind, **courteous** heart.

These butterflies will collect on one tree. They gather by the thousands. Then together they begin their long flight south, on their annual migration. They stop to rest again gathering on one tree.

The Monarch is one of the few butterflies that migrate. It will travel over 2,000 miles each year. It flies from Canada to Florida and back, and from Canada to California and back.



Some Monarchs are also found in Asia, Australia, and Hawaii.

Birds are one of the enemies of butterflies. Monarchs are not afraid of birds. Birds get sick if they eat a Monarch. Once they learn their lesson they do not bother them again. So the Monarch is not fearful to fly out in the open.

# Insects and Their Habits at Home and What Herold Learned about Them

## Part 1

Uncle Frank was coming on a visit, all the way from London, and Harold was delighted.

“What did you say Uncle Frank was, mama? I never can remember,” questioned Harold for the twentieth time, the day before the Uncle was expected.

“An entomologist, which means a person who has made the habits of insects a study. Your uncle has learned much about ants and spiders and bees and bugs of all kinds; and a very interesting study it is.”

Harold’s papa had just begun keeping bees, and the little lad never tired of asking questions about them, and watching them as they hurried back and forth—an army of busy workers—all day long.

The next day, after the greetings were over, and Uncle Frank had enjoyed a hearty dinner with the family, Harold could wait no longer to conduct his uncle to the pleasant orchard, under the shady green trees, where papa had chosen to plant his colony of bees.

“I suppose you will tell me how the bees make their honey, Uncle Frank: I’ve asked papa ever so many times, and he always says, ‘Wait until Uncle Frank comes: he’ll tell you all about it.’”

“I’m afraid your father has set me a hard task, my lad; for really I do not suppose there is a man on earth who is wise enough to answer even so simple a question as that. But I’m sure we can learn very much about the habits of these useful insects if we watch them for an hour every day. Just see these little fellows pacing back and forth before the door; but be careful not to venture too near.”

“I wonder what they are doing. They don’t seem to go inside at all.” “Neither do they fly away. They are sentinels, who warn the inhabitants of the hive of the presence of danger.”

“How strange! they are just like soldiers in the army, but papa said you would tell me about the queen bees.”

“Well, there are three different kinds of bees in each hive—the

queen, or mother bee, the worker, and the drone. But before I speak of the queen bee, I must tell you something about the way strange little cells that hold the honey are made. Did you ever notice, Harold how wonderfully exact they are? These little creatures are great carpentars, and they build their cells in the very best way to insure they're containing the most honey in the least space."

"Yes, Uncle, papa said only the other day that he could not do as fine carpenter work as bees: I wonder if they think about their work, as people do."

"I am very sure they must: for they work with marvelous speed and skill, but they do not all do the same kind of work. I'll tell you how they begin: the first bee clings to the roof of the hive with his fore legs, and another hangs by the hind legs of the first, and so on, until they form a ladder of bees."

"How funny they must look! I wonder what they do then?"

"They just wait patiently a little while, and after a time, small thin scales of wax appear on their stomachs: for these little workers are formed by their all-wise Creator for doing this very work. They then knead and roll this wax with the

legs, until it is ready to be glued to the roof to form the first layer. To this is added layer after layer by the other bees in the cluster, and then this detachment go out again into the fields, for a new store."

"What do the other bees do when this first company go away for more wax?" asked Harold.

"O they are not idle by any means! Another squad of workers that seem to understand another part of the trade begin at once to shape the mass into the six-sided cells where the honey is to be stored. They work so fast and with such skill that they can build four thousand cells in twenty-four hours."

"Just think, Uncle, how long it would take a boy to do the same thing!"

"Yes, and a very strange-looking honeycomb we should have, I am thinking. But you see, Harold, that the Creator did not intend boys to do this kind of work or He would have made them able to do it. But I promised to tell you something about the queen or mother bee."

"Papa says there is only one queen in each hive."

"Yes, a colony of bees is very much like a kingdom governed by a king

or queen. There are sentinels and workers and nurses and drones, besides a multitude of baby bees to attend to.”

“I am wondering if the queen goes around in the hive to see if the others do their work all right,” ventured Harold.

“O, no; there is small danger but that the bees will perform their work faithfully: for I am sorry to say these little insects are much more diligent in doing the work for which they were created than are boys and girls—or grown people, either. But the principal business of the queen is to lay the eggs for a new bee colony.”

“I suppose the queen lays an egg every day, doesn’t she? Like my white leghorns: they never disappoint me,” and Harold smiled with satisfaction.

“O, the queen bee lays at least two hundred eggs every day, and continues this work all summer.”

“But I should think she would get awfully tired!”

“Possibly, but she never complains. Indeed, this is all the work she ever does. The workers wait upon her, and tend and feed her with great care.”

“But, Uncle Frank you said there were nurses: that seems so odd: do explain what they do.”

“They take care of the little bees before they become perfect insects. This generally takes twelve or thirteen days: and all this time the nurses feed the helpless infant a sort of white stuff which looks much like paste. When these babies grow larger, their taste seems to demand more and more sweet. This, the wise little nurses are careful to supply. So, little by little, the young bee develops all its organs, and becomes a perfect insect.”

“Then I suppose the nurses leave it, don’t they, Uncle?”

“Not quite yet; the baby must have careful attention for a few hours longer: and this, the nurses seem to be perfectly willing to give: they support and tend it with almost human care until, if it is a young worker, it is strong enough to begin to make honey.”

“Who teaches the baby bees how to do that—do they have teachers who show them how to make honey and wax?”

“O, no, my lad: they have no teacher other than their Almighty Creator, who has implanted in their tiny heads a complete knowledge of

their mysterious trade, so that the very first honey made by a young bee, is just as good as that made by its older relatives.”

“How strange that people must be taught how to work, when little bees do not need a single lesson. Can you explain this, Uncle Frank?”

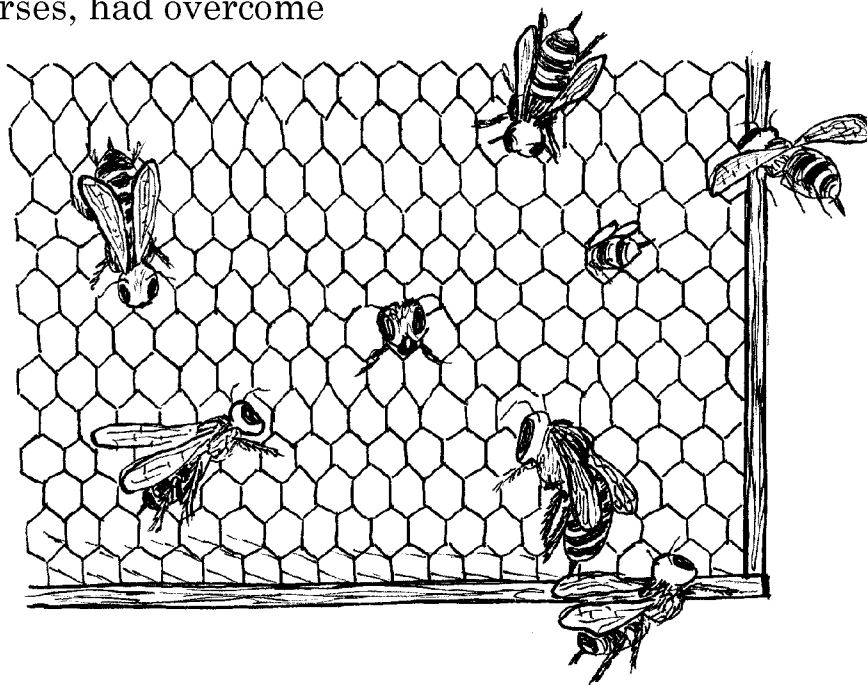

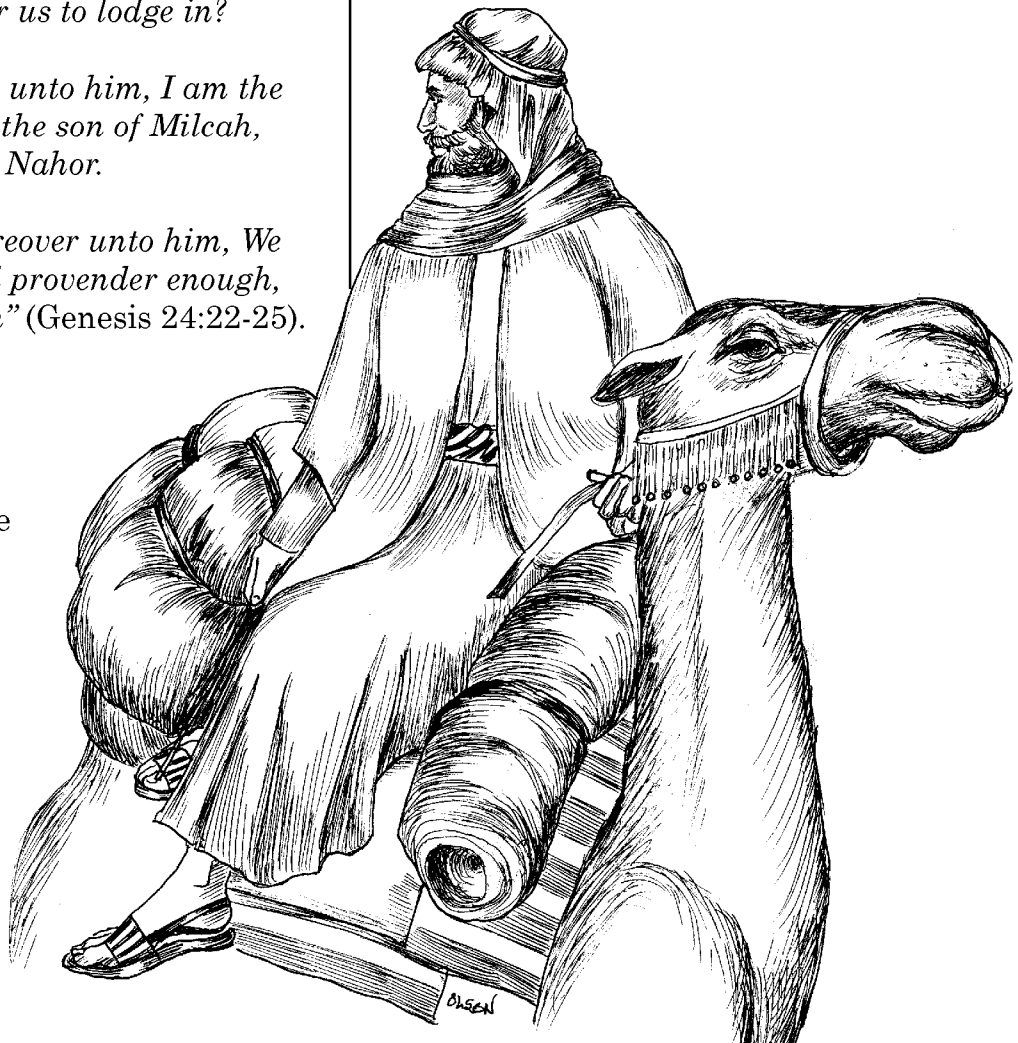

Abraham's family was walking in the light of the truth and were like the butterflies that like to be active during the daylight hours.

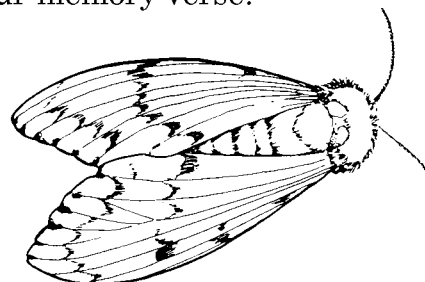

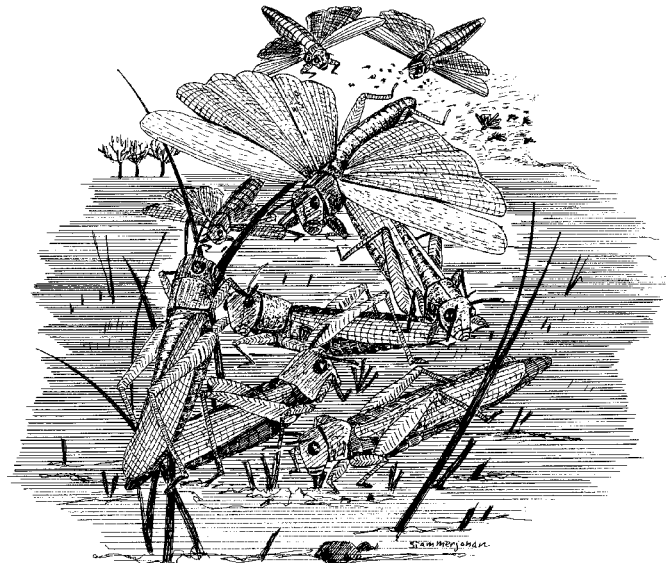
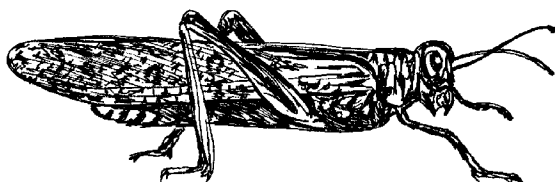
#### A Grasshopper Is An Insect

“True love is a high and holy principle, altogether different in character from that love which is awakened by impulse and which suddenly dies when severely tested. Some insects have “songs” like the cricket, cicadas, etc. The “songs” of different types of insects are not the same and females will respond only to the songs of their species in mating. 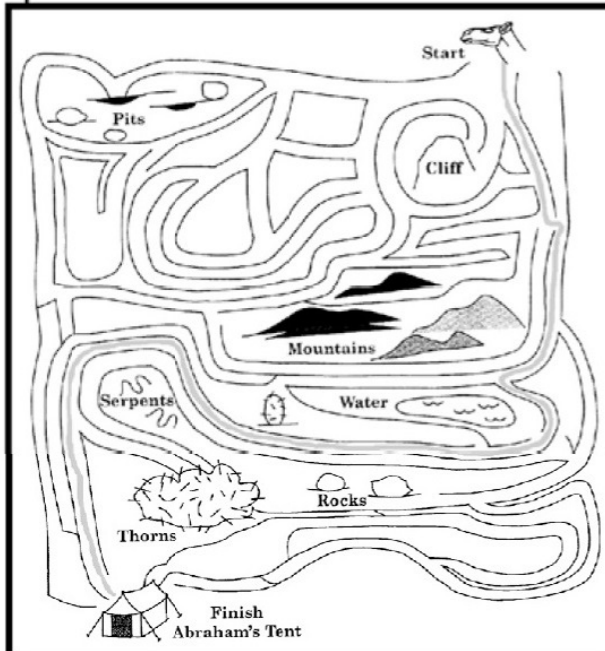

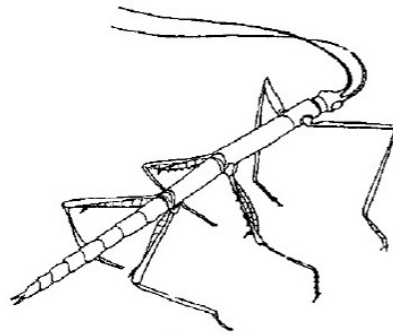
