

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BAINBRIDGE SCHOLARSHIP

Applications are now being accepted through February 27, 2015 for the Bainbridge Memorial Internship - application instructions can be found on the Society's website under the heading "Bainbridge Memorial Internship." The internship honors a former board member and supporter of the Historical Society, Mildred Bainbridge (1907-1992). Born in Brooklyn, Long Island, Mildred Bainbridge was the daughter of Ella (1882-1954) and Henry C. Bainbridge Jr. (1882-1956). The Bainbridge family were the proprietors of the Charles T. Bainbridge & Co., founded in 1867, who were noted for their artists materials, including "Bainbridge Board." At the time of Mildred Bainbridge's death in 1992 she left her large estate, valued at over five million dollars, to a variety of charities on the North Fork, including the Southold Historical Society. 

I was in the office not long ago when a phone call came in from a supporter of the Society who resides in the southwest of the United States. The caller wanted to speak with me about the 2013 annual report which they had received. They were concerned with the state of the Society finances and wanted to know more about what was going on. I was happy to oblige and described the recent cuts to our trust income, lower fundraising results, as well as rising costs. After having a meaningful discussion on the topic, the caller closed noting we do such good work in Southold and that they "were going to try to find some money for us." I thanked the caller, and we bid our adieus.

Many organizations like us get phone calls or letters from individuals who want to help out, though most of the time either there is no result or a small donation is made to help the group in question. About two weeks later we picked up the mail and found an envelope postmarked from the state in which the supporter lives – and the return address on the envelope was a bank. I opened the envelope and was enormously surprised to find an "anonymous" gift to the Society totaling \$30,000.

To say I was shocked really does not cover the range of emotions I was feeling. Very quickly that feeling of shock turned to an overwhelming sense of pride and happiness that this supporter – who does not live locally and has only been a donor for a few years – made such a generous gift to us. It just goes to show when your provide a quality of service that is valued, you never know what might come of it.

COLLECTIONS CORNER %

A pair of portraits. One of the fun things about working here is that there is always an opportunity for me to learn. Recently, I got to learn more about the Cleveland family of Southold, when the historical society received a gift of two portraits. The portraits are of Parnell Conklin Cleveland (1772-1857) and Nathaniel Hubbard Cleveland (1834-1922). They join the portrait of Moses Conklin Cleveland which was donated to the Society in 1987. Parnell, the mother of Moses, was painted by Sylvester Genin, a painter whose family started out in Southold



then moved west to Ohio. Genin came back to the area for a visit between 1840 and 1841,

and while he was here, he noted in his diary that he painted a number of portraits on the North and South Forks. Nathaniel Hubbard Cleveland was Moses' son and was painted by Orlando Hand Bears. Painted as a young boy, he cradles a kitten in his arms. The artist, Bears, lived in Sag Harbor and is well known for his portraits as well as folk art of the area. In fact, Bears also painted Moses Conklin Cleveland in 1837 and could have painted Nathaniel about the same time, or a year or two later. The location of a portrait of Mrs. Moses Cleveland – which must have also been painted – remains unknown. So, search your attics and garages! If we can find Moses Conklin Cleveland's wife we will be able to reunite the whole family. — AMY FOLK

FROM THE ARCHIVES %

My Hat's Off to Him ... Frankly Speaking!

Peconic resident Frank Davis Smith was a tailor who was also known as the "Man Milliner of Eastern Long Island." His hat shop was one of the unique places for more than half a century. As you entered the shop on Peconic Lane, you stepped into the front room, which was rather dark, with glass cases filled with trimmings and other things needed by his customers, and chests of drawers filled with more of the same. All around on stands were hats on order in various stages of completion. Then you headed into the back room where you would find Frank and his niece Geneva Sayre busily at work. Frank and his wife Minnie Terry Smith were married for 42 years. To many, they were "Uncle Frank and Aunt Minnie." He died July 11, 1942 and is



buried in the Southold First Presbyterian Church Cemetery. A pulpit was dedicated at the Southold First Universalist Church in loving memory of Frank Davis Smith in August 1943 as he was a very special member who served as trustee. For 40 years, he was superintendent of the Sunday School and also formed the Young People's Society. Among some of the items in the Society's 2001 Hidden Treasures Exhibit was a collection of 24 fine and decorative hats by the milliner. — DAN McCARTHY
