# LIFT

Many thanks to John Seymour for his ghostly tale about the Ascending Room on Pages 10 & 11.

As John said at the end of his Research Project the reliability of the lift does cause us concern at times. Fortunately, despite what many of you think, the lift is very reliable, even though it was put in when the third floor of William House was built in the 1970's. Any of you with a delightful old mechanical object will be aware that it can sometimes be quite trying on the nerves! However, when it does breakdown, it is usually something quite major which means it is out of action for longer than any of us would wish. When the Contractors first came to see what was wrong with the lift initially, they said that the part would cost about £6,000.00 and there would be a twelve / fourteen week wait, as there were no suitable parts in the country and the Italian Factory which have to make the part, went on holiday for a fortnight in August!!. After a few (polite) words the Contractors managed to locate a part in England and so the work was carried out. Unfortunately, the design of the new part seems to leave something to be desired.

However, at today's date Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> July the lift is fully repaired and working again. We have asked the Contractors for a quotation for a total new lift and are investigating the possibility of a "Stannah" style stair lift for the southern end of William House, although there will be a brand new lift in the Hub

## From the Suggestion Box

Thank you to those who have submitted items in the Suggestion Box some of which will be for the Residents Meeting but I will go through them quickly here:-

#### Hot and cold water system.

It is now ten years since the "new" system was installed, the Governors having been told that the old one was likely to fail at any time and leave the hospital without heating and hot water. I can honestly say that in those last ten years we have spent a small fortune on the system and I am sure the Governors will make sure that this does not happen with the New Hub Building.

#### **Guest Room / Library**

The New Library is up and running and thanks to Jos'e for all her hard work in sorting this out. The rooms will be shared between the Guest Room and the Library / Computer area. When there are guests in the Guest Room it may be necessary to restrict access to the Library so as not to disturb guests. This has not been decided yet but is likely to be limited before 8:00 pm in the evening. This would allow peace and quiet for the people in the Guest Room after 8:00 pm.

#### **Gardening Raised Beds**

Thank you for the suggestion for having some raised beds for residents to grow vegetables or herbs and from the example given, it looks as though the person is suggesting at least two foot six high raised bed. There is of course the area where the greenhouse and chicken run used to be which is available if anybody wishes to plant anything in that area, but this would involve bending, so may not be practical.

#### **Chapel Seating / Lighting**

A couple of people have mentioned the removal of pews in Chapel and their replacement by chairs. The comment has been made that this happening in many churches as chairs are seen to be more comfortable than pews. It will be interesting to look at the attendance records where this has occurred to see if the change has made any difference to the number of people attending. The pews are very solid and any chairs would need to of a very high quality to match the standard. If there were chairs it could make it easier for concerts in Chapel giving the Master more flexibility and work.

Comment has also been made about the lighting in Chapel. We have looked into this but the electrician is not convinced that a higher lumens (brightness) could be achieved at a realistic price. The hanging pendants, from the 1960's, are now starting to come back into fashion! Although the pendants may look a little dated, for the priest celebrating at the altar when looking out to the congregation the lights form a cross reminding him that he is God's representative on earth.

## **ANNUAL ACCOUNTS**

The Annual Accounts for the Charity for the year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2017 are now available for anyone who wishes to read them. A copy can be found in the Library or the Foyer of each House and they should also be available via the Charity Commission Website. Simply go to the Charity Commission and then under Charities Search enter the Charity Number 216873 and click on the Financial History tab.

As will be seen from the accounts, Wyggestons is not really a small charity any longer but a small to medium enterprise. We have £2.2m of income last year and almost £2m of expenditure. As will be seen from the Charity Commission Website or the accounts, the charitable activities produced an income of £1.3m but cost £1.8m. It is through the investment income received from the various investments that the charitable work can be subsidised. As will also be noted from the Charity Commission Website, the retained for future use equals 11% of income. There would be many Companies (think Carillion) who would be proud of such a figure!

# THE STRANGE TALE OF NELLY ANNE

# and the ASCENDING ROOM

Every respectable and ancient institution should have a ghost. Wyggestons is ancient, and certainly respectable – so why no Ghost? I decided to do some serious research and settle the matter once and for all.

I searched the British Library in London, and libraries in Oxford, Cambridge and Ratby. I Googled. I ransacked Wikipedia. But all without result.

So, deciding that some fieldwork was the next best thing, I spent many long nights on the site of the original Wyggeston's Hospital in Peacock Lane. If a ghost ever existed, then he/she was most likely to be where the old gothic hospital stood. Ghosts always prefer the gothic whenever gothic is available.

At first no apparition, phantom or poltergeist appeared, but then... but then... on one particularly stormy night, with the wind howling round the cathedral pinnacles and parapets, the truth (although I *was* feeling a little drowsy), came to me in a vision as clear as daylight...



In the 1820's there was a female inmate at the

hospital known to everyone as Nellie Anne. Now Nellie Anne, a dear soul, was a 'keeper'; a female inmate whose tasks included carrying coal for the upstairs fires, and water for the male inmates' ablutions, and all well before Mattins. These elderly gents, alas, rarely lifted a finger to help. Poor Nelly Anne was then required to carry down the dirty water, hot ashes from the fires, as well as buckets of the unmentionable. Her breathlessness and rheumatism increased with her advancing years. She sought help from the Master, but in those bad old days the Master was rarely there: he spent most of his time on his estates in far-away Berkshire.

Now it so happened that nearby, at the ancient parish church of St Martin, some masons were working on the crumbling Norman tower. They devised a *hoist* with ropes, scaffold poles and pullies, and so were able to lift heavy blocks of stone and buckets of mortar to a great height with little (if any) physical effort at all.

Nellie Anne was no fool. 'That's exactly what I need,' she thought. So without loss of time she persuaded the masons to build her a similar hoist, on the west side of the

hospital - where few would see what was happening. She soon learned how to operate this new machinery. It was a great boon.

But alas, it was also dangerous. Tragically on the 20<sup>th</sup> July 1823, as she was lowering to the ground the last load of the day, she slipped and fell from top to bottom. Nellie Anne was dead. Dead as a door-nail.

Or was she? I saw that wherever hoists were to be found the ghost of Nellie Anne was never far away. Her apparition would search the old town looking for anything in the nature of a hoist. Later she travelled far and wide to find new places to haunt. In the year of her death a steam operated *'ascending room'* was erected in London, offering tourists panoramic views of the city. For some years, therefore, there were no known *local* appearances of poor Nellie Ann. She re-located to London.



But Nellie Anne was born and bred Leicester. She was not happy roaming about and looked for a more permanent haunt. In the 1960's she discovered that a new Wyggestons was being built and that this modern building contained not one, but *two*, ascending rooms, or lifts, as they were now generally known. Good news indeed for Nelly Anne.

But her influence on these lifts was not always helpful. Sometimes the ghostly powers emanating from her would upset the mechanism. The lift has been known to break down with increasing frequency, and sometimes between floors: most distressing for the present-day inmates, now known more discreetly as *residents*.

And on the anniversary of her death on 20<sup>th</sup> July 2018 the lift was actually heard and seen to be riding up and down *without any passenger inside*. But was it really empty? Was not this the ghost of poor Nellie Anne, condemned to ride the lift for eternity?

Nellie Anne or not, the continuing problem of the William House lift is quite distressing. It is a struggle for those with mobility problems and who live on the upper floors at the south end of the building to get to the Chapel lift. There are so many good things about Wyggestons. It is good, very good, to be here. Hopefully a more permanent solution to the lift problem may soon be found.

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## RECIPE

## **Summer Pudding - for sharing**

Prep Time	Cooking Time	Easy
20 mins	10 mins	

Serves 8

## Ingredients

300g strawberries
250g blackberries
100g redcurrants
500g raspberry
OR
1 ¼ kg / 2lb 12oz mixed berries and currants of your choice
175g golden caster sugar
7 slices day-old white bread from a square, medium cut loaf



## Method

Bring out the juices: Wash fruit and gently dry on kitchen paper – keep strawberries separate. Put sugar and 3 tbsp water into a large pan. Gently heat until sugar dissolves – stir a few times. Bring to a boil for 1 min, then tip in the fruit (not the strawberries). Cook for 3 mins over a low heat, stirring 2 - 3 times. The fruit will be softened, mostly intact and surrounded by dark red juice. Put a sieve over a bowl and tip in the fruit and juice.

Line the bowl with cling film and prepare the bread: Line the 1.25 litre basin with cling film as this will help you to turn out the pudding. Overlap two pieces of cling film in the middle of the bowl as it's easier than trying to get one sheet to stick to all of the curves. Let the edges overhang by about 15 cm. Cut the crusts off the bread. Cut 4 pieces of bread in half, a little on an angle, to give 2 lopsided rectangles per piece. Cut 2 slices into 4 triangles each and leave the final piece whole.

Build the pud: Dip the whole piece of bread into the juice for a few secs just to coat. Push this into the bottom of the basin. Now dip the wonky rectangular pieces one at a time and press round the basin's sides so that they fit together neatly, alternately placing wide and narrow ends up. If you can't quite fit the last piece of bread in it doesn't matter, just trim into a triangle, dip in juice and slot in. Now spoon in the softened fruit, adding the strawberries here and there as you go.

Let flavours mingle then serve: Dip the bread triangle in juice and place on top – trim off overhang with scissors. Keep leftover juice for later. Bring cling film up and loosely seal. Put a side plate on top and weight down with cans. Chill for 6 hrs or overnight. To serve, open out cling film then put a serving plate upside-down on top and flip over. Serve with leftover juice, any extra berries and cream.
