Pharisee and Tax Collector Lesson

Bible Reference: Luke 18:9-14

Lesson Objective: The children will learn that Jesus wants us to be humble and not

prideful.

Target Age: 1st grade - 5th grade

Items Needed:

magazine pictures of various items basket/hat/bowl to put pictures in

Welcome Activity:

Have the children compete in races. You could have them do different types of races: running, hopping, crawling, bear crawl, skipping, etc. Keep track of who won each race. (Notice if anyone brags about winning or if anyone congratulates someone, etc.)

Bible Lesson Introduction:

Bible Lesson:

Read through Luke 18:9-14 in your Bible, explaining as you read to make sure the children are understanding.

You could use the Pharisee and Tax Collector: A Parable told by Jesus Skit to have the children involved in the telling of the story.

This parable is about two men: a Pharisee and the Tax Collector. The Pharisee was a respected member of society and held a position of great importance. The Tax Collector was hated and a disgrace to the community. They both went to the temple to pray.

The Pharisee, knowing his status (and liking it), walked in with pride and arrogance. He was grateful for not being like the other guy...the dreaded tax collector.

The Tax Collector, knowing his status, walked in with a humble attitude and feeling as though he wasn't even good enough to be there. He couldn't even look up, but only could beat his chest and pray for forgiveness.

[&]quot;What was it like competing in the races?"

[&]quot;How did you feel if you won a race? Did you brag about yourself?"

[&]quot;How did you feel if you lost? Did you congratulate the winner?"

Bible Lesson Understanding:

Jesus looked more highly upon the Tax Collector because he had a humble attitude and knew that he needed saving. The Pharisee thought he was good enough on his own and wanted everyone to know it.

Bible Lesson Activity: Keep or Give

Bring out the basket/hat/bowl that you put the magazine pictures in. Line up the children. Ask a child to come up and choose two pictures out of it without looking. They have to choose which item they are going to keep and which one they will give to the next person in line.

The next person in line chooses one picture out of the basket. They will now have two pictures in their hands. Now they have to choose which one they will keep and which one they will give away.

Continue with this process until all of the pictures have been chosen from the basket.

Discuss with the children about their reasoning for giving and keeping. Did they think more highly of themselves or the other person?

Bible Verse:

Luke 18:14 "for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but he who humbles himself will be exalted"

Bible Verse Activity: Hand Motions

"for everyone" - point to everyone in the class

"who exalts himself" - stand on tip toe and act prideful

"will be humbled" - bow down

"but he who humbles himself" - bow down

"will be exalted" - stand up and smile

"Luke 18" – put one finger up and then put 8 fingers up

"14" – put one finger up on left hand and 4 fingers up on right hand

Evaluation:


Jesus, with this parable, is trying to show people to not think too highly of themselves. We need to keep in mind what truly matters and to keep a humble spirit about ourselves.
