Interim Moderator Letter

Dear members and residents,

I have been appointed by the Presbytery of St Andrews to assume the role of Interim Moderator of the vacant charge of Crail which is now linked with St Ayle in Cellardyke and Anstruther. I am well aware that I am following one of my colleagues, the Revd Brian Oxburgh, who is known for his patience, good humour and ability to encourage gently and affirm new developments. It is my hope that I can do what I can to assist the parish in this time of change and transition.

Change is not something we are very comfortable with, as it disturbs our equilibrium and removes our certainties and our security. Change, however,

is a natural part to of life, in all of God's creation and in our human bodies and relationships. Children grow up to be teenagers, then young adults, develop relationships with others, often become couples, and sometimes parents, and then in God's good time, may become grandparents.

Change is now affecting the Church very dramatically. Perhaps the challenges we are experiencing are as great as the events we know as the Disruption or the Reformation. There is a major crisis in the number of candidates now in education and training for ordination, and a large number of ministers about to retire in the next five or so years. More and more is being demanded of the Church members, especially those willing to take on leadership roles with the civil legislation of data protection, safeguarding, charity trusteeship and financial responsibility under the Office for Scottish Charity Regulation. Many are finding the burdens expected of them in Church far more than they bargained for and are feeling under pressure.

In Crail the church has been vacant or, in less ecclesiastical terms, without a minster for over 2 years and the congregation has been well served by the excellent leaders of worship who have willingly and enthusiastically responded to the invitation to come and work in the congregation at this time.

A Nomination Committee is now looking actively for a minister for the linked charge, but despite some serious possibilities, no one has been identified as the right person to be called to the congregation in this vital role. Given the number of vacancies through the Church of Scotland, it is not easy to predict when the right person may be discovered.

In the meantime, there is a role for everyone to be patient and understanding. Some things may not be done as they were in the past, and there may be new ways and some difficult changes to adjust to in the time ahead. Some will believe, or think, that the Church of Scotland is not what is should, or could be and perhaps they will be right, but the Church and community can be confident in the guidance and care of God in this time. It is important that the Church still, in this time of vacancy tries to respond to the need of the people of this parish.

I look forward to working with the elders and other of the parish in our joint endeavours to serve the mission of the Church in this place in the time ahead. I am the Presbytery Clerk of the Presbytery of St Andrews and am aware of many of the tasks and difficulties facing the parishes throughout the whole Presbytery. In this time, I commend the Kirk Session and the Nomination Committee to your prayers and trust that their work will in due time, bear fruit.

We would like to thank everyone who made this year's Coastal Path Charity Walk a great success. Just over 100 walkers registered and warm, sunny weather (a following wind too), made for an excellent day. As usual registration and finish were in Crail, with free transport to the starting points of either Earlsferry or Anstruther.

With such wonderful weather most people took on the full 13-mile challenge and it was good to see so many family groups. Dogs too were having a great day out. As usual the athletes were first through the checkpoints, but picnics, lunch stops, fish and chips and ice cream were enjoyed by many. The glorious coastal scenery of the East Neuk of Fife did not disappoint.

All money raised is donated to registered charities – and each walker decides which charities to support. This year those taking part raised £11,255 and since 2010, when the Walk started, a remarkable £127,784 has been raised for many, many local, national and international charities.

As is now traditional, our next big Rotary fundraiser is the Christmas postal delivery service, which will run from 9th to 19th of December. This covers the East Neuk coastal communities from Elie to Crail and the price remains at a great bargain of 25p per card! Please keep a look out for more information nearer the time.

Crail Community Partnership

Crail Community Partnership has been tasked with delivering on the outcomes of the Crail Charrette. We have been very busy working on a variety of projects all geared to improving Crail and the facilities that we enjoy.

- 1. We have been busy engaging with Fife Council planners, the major landowner and the Scottish government, to establish a Masterplan Consent, in order that the Community's wishes are incorporated into the final design brief.
- 2. Business and Tourism. We have initiated discussions to deliver a Winter Festival in Crail in 2020, thus boosting tourism and local sustainability.





- 3. We are working on plans to deliver an upgrade and refurbishment of the facilities at the harbour, both for vistors and fishermen
- 4. We have initiated plans to acquire Crail Community Hall from Fife Council on an asset transfer. Plans are being progressed to repair and refurbish the building to provide a 21st Century multi use facility.
- 5. In conjunction with Crail Preservation Society, plans are being progressed to convert Denburn Field (the sheep field) in to an attractive walkway connecting Denburn Wood to the coastal path, with wild flower planting and appropriate trees.
- 6. Plans are in hand to delineate various local paths, improve these and have them signposted. In conjunction with Fife Coast and Countryside Trust, a volunteer group is being trained and equipped to manage these.
- 7. We are working with Fife Council to develop a Crail traffic management plan to deal with problems of inappropriate parking, traffic calming, and provision of electric car charging facilities.
- 8. In conjunction with Crail Community Council a trial glass recycling facility will be created at the primary school car park.





- 9. 4 new 'gull proof 'bins are going to be provided as a first step to combating bin overflow. These will also have the Crail Royal Burgh logo incorporated, thus improving appearance.
- 10. We are backing funding plans to assist the recreation on the Senior's Monday Club and the recently established Wee Crailers for the youngest in our community.

Crail Festival V

As most of you will know this year's highly successful Festival ran from 17-27 July in the usual locations around the village and, for a couple of events, just a little way beyond.

We were very optimistic that a varied programme would have broad appeal and this was certainly the case with nearly all the events and activities displaying 'Sold Out' notices.

The Putting Green, open from 15 June-25 August and also the first two weekends in June, provided great fun for all the family. In spite of inclement weather curtailing activity on several days, 4735 putting rounds were achieved. A notable achievement! The ambitious target of 5000 putting rounds is now clearly in reach.



The spectacular range of Children's activities is a unique selling point at every Crail Festival. The Afternoon at the Movies provided relaxation and fun on the first afternoon. The Workshops, Drama, Art, Calling all Wizards, and Krafty Kids proved as popular as ever. The prize for best 'newcomer' undoubtedly went to the Rock Stacking Event which may need to feature as an extra adult event next year! Archery and Falconry, in the Castle Gardens, once again sold out very quickly. The Junior Golf Skills at Crail Golfing Society attracted more enthusiastic participants than last year.

Memorable music is rightly associated with Crail Festival and the musical events this year were outstanding. The Blueswater, after last year's superb performance, launched this year's Festival in stellar fashion on the first night. The presence of Nicole Smit, a hugely talented young Blues singer, was an unexpected delight. Blazin' Fiddles, a group of the hottest fiddle players mixed with piano and guitar, brought the best of traditional music to Crail Kirk. Cat Loud's cabaret style worked so very well in the Kirk Hall. Ali Affleck and The Copper Cats performed sensational New Orleans Jazz and Blues.

The Scottish folk scene is vibrant, so the Crail Folk Club Concert, with Siobhan Miller, Jim and Rosie Malcolm and Johnny Izzat enthralled a large, enthusiastic audience well-fortified by the Darnley's Gin tasting. Michael Christian Durrant, a hugely talented, accomplished classical guitarist, made a very welcome return, this time to the community hall.

The inimitable Les Barker, always a favourite at Crail, showed just why he is a very funny, talented man who can entertain any audience with his comedic poetry and very topical parodies of popular songs.

Live theatre was back with Illyria's out door performance of 'The Tempest' in the Castle Grounds. This generated a larger than anticipated audience which also appreciated a mild evening.

Here I should add our grateful thanks to our unfailingly enthusiastic Volunteers who mow the putting green when required and man the shed daily, who are on duty at the Art Exhibition and in the Festival Box Office, who supervise and assist at all the children's activities, who attend the evening events in a variety of capacities and who help to erect and dismantle gazebos at the Street Market. A big thank you to all of you, we could not function without you.

So, we can look back with pleasure and satisfaction on Crail Festival 2019 but already thoughts are turning to next year's Festival from 15-25 July. Please do come to the AGM on 5th November, probably in the Legion Hall at 8pm.



Crail Primary School

We have had a very busy few weeks with lots of learning happening at Crail Primary School. Here is a flavour of what has been happening at our school...

We welcomed our new children and their families to our Nursery. This year we have 16 children attending our Nursery sessions and we are trialling the expansion of 1140 hours. This means that we are able to offer our children either 5 morning sessions (600 hours) or 5 sessions from 9am-3pm (1140 hours). All of our children have settled in really well and they are beginning to learn the Nursery routine. We also welcomed Miss Butchart, Miss Leitch and Miss Ritchie (our Early Years Officers) to our Nursery. Our pre-school children have been supporting our younger children, helping them to find their way around our Nursery and discovering all of the exciting opportunities that are on offer. Our children are all really enjoying being back at Nursery and exploring all of the different learning opportunities. We have also started our Nursery Stay and Play and Bookbug sessions. These sessions provide our families with the opportunity to play and learn with their child in our Nursery setting as well as learning new songs, rhymes, games, listening to stories and most importantly having fun!



The children have come back to school ready to work hard and to enjoy learning. This year we have 88 children in P1-P7. Our P1s have settled in really well and have enjoyed learning about our school routines and spending time with their P7 Buddy. We also welcomed Miss Coe to our school. Miss Coe is teaching our P3/4 class this session.




We have started the new session with every class in our school learning about the Establishment Phase. The Establishment Phase involves our children and staff focussing on developing a learning ethos and being ready to learn where everyone feels included, nurtured, respected, safe, responsible, healthy and active (the wellbeing indicators). This has involved our children and staff discussing routines, what makes a quality audience, a quality line and our Learning Code. This ensures that expectations are shared and are clear. Over the next few weeks we will focus more on: challenging our mindsets, the brain, our attitude to learning, developing a 'can-do attitude, learning from our mistakes, how we respond to challenges and developing a wellbeing toolkit for our class. This will equip our children with the strategies and skills for learning and achieving.

Our school is currently collecting the sports vouchers from Aldi. If you or a family member have any vouchers then please hand them into our school office. We would really appreciate your support.

As the year progresses we look forward to sharing with you our learning journey and highlights.

'Classical Spain'

A holiday visit to 'classical Spain' in May proved to be something of an eye-opening snapshot of the politics and religions of old Andalucia - that southern part of Spain, not too many miles across the Mediterranean from North Africa and the roots of the ancient Moorish culture. A culture that excelled in astronomy, science, mathematics, engineering, architecture and medicine - and one that was to have profound influences on the Western world.

We visited Mijas, Ronda, Seville, Córdoba and Granada. Hot sun, picturesque white villages, beautiful countryside of course; but it was the magnificent and centuries-old buildings - the cathedral and Alcazar in Seville, the Alhambra in Granada and Córdoba's Mezquita mosque - that left lasting memories. Two particularly strong memories remain.

The first was prompted by Seville Cathedral. A vast building of over a quarter of a million square feet; it is claimed to be the third-largest church building in the world, as well as the largest Gothic church. It is the resting place of Christopher Columbus in company, of course, with many others.

Completed in the early 16th century it replaced a 'Christianised Mosque' dating from the mid-thirteenth century - which had replaced the Almohad mosque which, in turn had supplanted a ninth-century mosque.

The Cathedral we can visit today was built to demonstrate the city's wealth. Inside, the centuries-long Christian and Muslim history has left a tangible presence; yet with beggars outside its doors, the enormous, beautiful and ornately gilded interior felt uncomfortable. The Christian message far from easy to discern there. Perhaps just too great a contrast with Scottish Presbyterian thinking and the simplicity of Crail Church!

A subsequent walk around Córdoba and a visit to its Mezquita Mosque and to its Jewish Quarter left though a remarkable, overwhelming, yet strongly contrasting second memory.

Dating from 784 the mosque is regarded as one of the most accomplished monuments of Moorish architecture. It is thought to stand on the site of an earlier small Visigoth church, by tradition dedicated to Saint Vincent of Lérins, who died around 445. He was a Gallic monk and author of early Christian writings. Remarkably it seems the site was divided up and shared amicably by Muslims and Christians after the Islamic conquest of the Visigothic kingdom.





'Classical Spain'

Córdoba returned to Christian rule in 1236 and this great Moorish mosque became a Roman Catholic Church - with a Renaissance cathedral nave built inside it in the 16th Century - now complete with huge 'grandfather' clock - and sticking out like something of an architectural sore thumb it must be said!

Over the many centuries of this great building there is evidence of a remarkable history of accommodation between Muslim and Christian communities. After leaving the cathedral-mosque, a guided walk around the Jewish quarter then added a further dimension to the story.

We wandered through bustling streets, through the area in which a vibrant Jewish community lived between the 10th and 15th centuries. We learned that Córdoba went through a brilliant period when three peoples - Christian, Jewish and Muslim- and their respective religions, lived together peacefully, offering the world an example of tolerance and intelligent civilisation. Córdoba then was the largest economic and cultural centre of the Western world.

It was particularly moving to find, in a small courtyard, a magnificent bronze statue dedicated to Maimónides, the great medieval Jewish philosopher and physician. He was born in Córdoba, although spending much of his life in Egypt.

It was tantalizing to consider that, so many centuries ago, peaceful co-existence was not only possible, but was at the heart of a vibrant and economically successful city. One of culture, science, architecture art and commerce. We found it sobering to ponder today's world, where extremism and division seem to be constantly on the increase.





Sadly one is left to wonder - how was it possible; why did it not last - and why is such peaceful co-existence still so elusive.
