WORLD TEACHERS' DAY CELEBRATIONS IN 2020

In 2020, World Teachers' Day celebrated teachers with the theme "**Teachers: Leading in crisis, reimagining the future**". The day provided the occasion to celebrate the teaching profession worldwide, take stock of achievements, and draw attention to the voices of teachers, who are at the heart of efforts to attain the global education target of leaving no one behind.

The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly added to the challenges faced by already over-extended education systems throughout the world. It is no exaggeration to say that the world is at a crossroads and, now more than ever, we must work with teachers to protect the right to education and guide it into the unfolding landscape brought about by the pandemic.

The issue of teacher leadership in relation to crisis responses is not just timely, but critical in terms of the contributions teachers have made to provide remote learning, support vulnerable populations, re-open schools, and ensure that learning gaps have been mitigated. The discussions surrounding WTD addressed the role of teachers in building resilience and shaping the future of education and the teaching profession.

Update from Birka Bekumsa – our link school in Ethiopia

This week we have received an update from Penny Pullen

Hi Rachel and all at Blackawton,

I know what a really difficult and stressful time you have all had during the last 8 months and therefore left a few weeks this term before getting in touch. My thoughts have been very much with teachers during this time. I hope you all managed to have a good break during August.

I thought you would like to know the situation and how your school in Ethiopia is managing. Covid 19 is in Ethiopia, in Addis Ababa and in many other areas and we know there have now been cases in Nekemte, but it does not seem to have spread as fiercely as here.

Schools there have been closed since March, but they intend that all schools will open in mid-October. Obviously all our (EEL) projects have been on hold, but in the meantime, we have sent funds for PPE and detergents for the hospital, and for seeds for rural communities.

Anyone visiting Ethiopia would have to isolate in Addis Ababa, in a prescribed hotel, for 14 days, and Nekemte is still on the list of places where our Foreign & Commonwealth Office advises only essential travel, so we cannot visit. However, we are in touch with our Ethiopian colleagues in Nekemte and hoping to be able to continue with our education projects as soon as schools open.

As soon as schools in Nekemte are functioning again I will let you know, and I will write to the Director and staff of Birka Bekumsa to assure them that we shall continue to support their link with Blackawton, which has been a most successful link for many years. Although we cannot do anything at the moment, I think they would like to know that they are not forgotten. All at Birka Bekumsa are very proud of their link with Blackawton. The really good news is that there are still funds from your last fundraising effort to support their library / librarian for this academic year 2020 / 21, for which they are very grateful. This will give a great opportunity for their pupils to make up the time they have lost.

I'm afraid that there is some way to go before we can put this year behind us and get back to anywhere near the normal, we knew, but your school in Ethiopia hopes very much that their link with Blackawton will continue.

Ambassador Volunteer Project

Ambassador Volunteer Project Update- October 2020

The Ambassador Volunteer project has now been running for just over a year. A lot has happened during that time despite Lockdown.

The Ambassador Volunteer project connects parents within their own communities and more widely into a network across Devon.

Ambassador volunteers are mums and dads of children with SEND and some are professionals and support staff who work with them. What they all have in common is a desire to help families and an understanding of what life is like with a child with special educational needs. Volunteers do two main things:

- They share information from DiAS about all kinds of SEND issues and help parents to access DiAS services. This means parents get the most up to date information and support to help them make decisions and understand what's happening for their family.
- They help parents share their views about Devon services and support through the local Parent Carer Forum. This is a great way to influence policy and change the way services work for children and young people with SEND in Devon.

As part of the Ambassador Volunteer Project we will be offering FREE parent information workshops around Demystifying SEND for parent carers new to the SEND Journey. These sessions have been planned and developed after feedback shared by Ambassador Volunteers.
