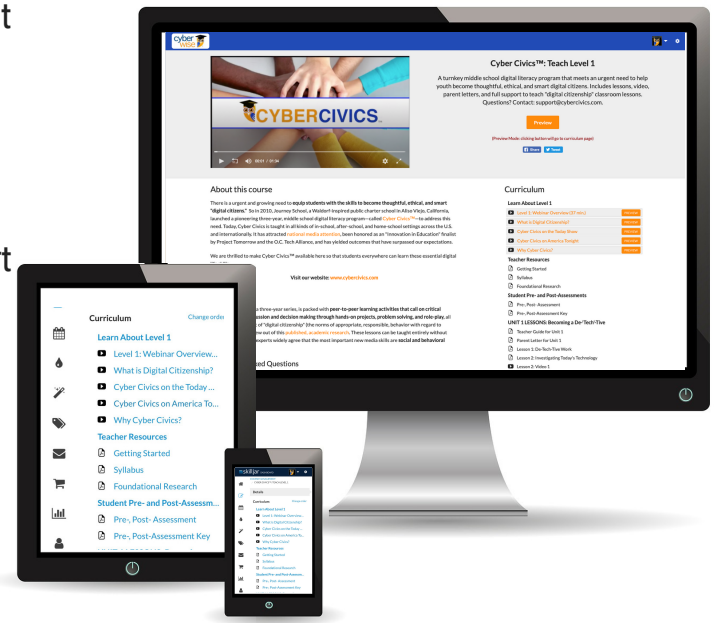

THE CURRICULUM

LEVEL 1: DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP (suggested for 6th grade)

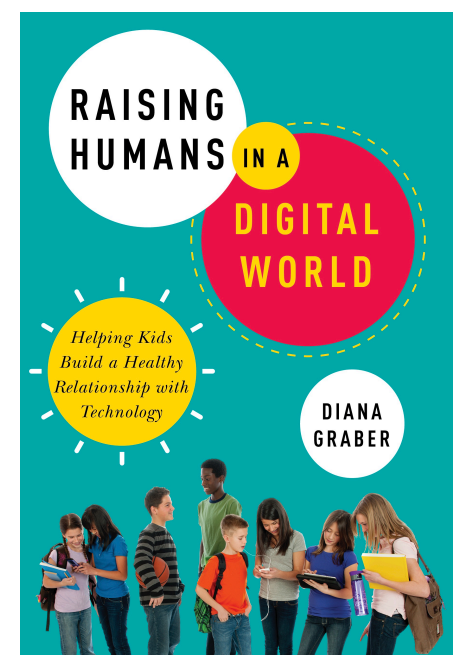
Level 1 teaches students how to be thoughtful, ethical, and smart digital citizens. Through hands-on activities, problem solving tasks, and role-play, students learn how to use technology safely and wisely. Topics include: *citizenship, digital reputation management, online safety, cyberbullying, digital drama, privacy, ethical use, proper online communication*, and more. This level can be taught entirely without technology...that's because experts widely agree the most important new media skills are social and behavioral skills.

LEVEL 2: INFORMATION LITERACY (suggested for 7th grade)

The second level of Cyber Civics focuses on information literacy, which is a set of skills needed to find, retrieve, analyze, and use information. Topics include: *online/offline balance, search strategies, analyzing search results, copyright, fair use, public domain, using Creative Commons, personal information, online security, using Wikipedia*, and more. Like Level 1, lessons call on ethical and critical thinking, discussion and decision making through hands-on projects, problem solving, and role-play. These lessons can be taught whether students use devices in the classroom or not.

LEVEL 3: MEDIA LITERACY FOR POSITIVE PARTICIPATION (suggested for 8th grade)

Lessons in media literacy teach students how to use critical thinking skills to evaluate the assault of media messages, much of them visual, that they encounter (and will continue to encounter) via all sorts of new technologies. The completion of their three-year journey through this program encourages students to become media "producers" rather than "consumers" as they learn to use the digital tools in positive and productive ways. Topics include: *detecting misinformation, "fake" news, visual literacy, sexting, media stereotypes, and a final research project using research skills*. Cyber Civics concludes with lessons that encourage students to become digital leaders.
