“The True Gentleman is the man whose conduct proceeds from good will and an acute sense of propriety, and whose self-control is equal to all emergencies; who does not make the poor man conscious of his poverty, the obscure man of his obscurity, or any man of his inferiority or deformity; who is himself humbled if necessity compels him to humble another; who does not flatter wealth, cringe before power, or boast of his own possessions or achievements; who speaks with frankness but always with sincerity and sympathy; whose deed follows his word; who thinks of the rights and feelings of others, rather than his own; and who appears well in any company, a man with whom honor is sacred and virtue safe.”

The True Gentleman is the creed of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. It was informally adopted by the fraternity sometime in the 1930s, and officially adopted by the organization at the 2001 National Convention.

Few men have been better examples of this creed than Brother **Frank Arrington (CA-TH '64)**, who passed into Chapter Eternal on September 8, 2013.

As a man of good will, Frank expressed a genuine interest in other people. He had a healthy understanding of what human beings really are and he liked them because of their virtues and in spite of their faults. His enthusiasm, growing out of a positive attitude toward everything around him, was contagious.

Many people are unfortunately afflicted with "poverty, obscurity, inferiority or deformity." While we may deplore the misfortunes of others and try to do whatever we can to help them cope with or overcome their difficulties, Brother Arrington never knowingly made anyone conscious of those deficiencies over which they had no control. To the contrary, Frank was tireless in his efforts to help others overcome their deficiencies as evidenced by his 33 years involvement with Big Brothers/Big Sisters - early on as a Big Brother mentor (twice), and later as a Board Member & past Board Chairman. Frank was recognized by the organization in 1994 as their "Man of the Year".

In addition to his long service on the Board of the SAE Alumni Association of San Diego (honored as Brother of the Year in 1995), Brother Arrington was past President of downtown Rotary Club 33 and served on numerous committees over his 20 years of service. One of the activities that Frank led beginning in 1996, is the Interact Club Mentoring Program with Wilson Middle School, where each week Frank oversaw student leadership and community involvement activities for underprivileged students.

While the true gentleman has self-assurance and personal pride, he is never a boaster. He refrains as much as possible from talking about himself, and "his own possessions or achievements." Brother Arrington exhibited that trait, not wanting to dwell on the details and public recognition associated with his many philanthropic activities, too numerous to detail here.

He listened, learned and truly cared about people - from the young people whose lives he inspired through his community service work, to the many friends he cherished and the complete strangers he left with a smile, Brother Frank Arrington was an all around True Gentleman.

Frank is survived by the family he adored, his wife Linnea Arrington, son **Brian Arrington (WA-GA '91)** and daughter-in-law Colby Arrington, grandchildren Aly and Lily Arrington, brother Ted Arrington, niece Marci Egan and nephew Mark Arrington, as well as the many others whose lives he touched with his grace, compassion and love. In lieu of a memorial service or

flowers, Frank wanted those who would like to honor him do so by donating to Big Brothers Big Sisters of San Diego County at www.sdbigs.org/frank.



BRO PRO-FILES: JUDGE DAVID GILL - BY JENNIFER BRICE, SAN DIEGO UNION TRIBUNE
Longest-Serving Judge in San Diego



His Honor, Brother David Gill (CA-TH '56)

Judge David Gill is the longest-serving judge in San Diego, but he claims he hasn't worked a day in his life.

That's what he told people after he won Judge of the Year from the county bar association a couple years ago.

"I love it," the 79-year-old said. "That's why I'm still here ... I totally enjoy it. I feel comfortable, and I'm making a contribution, making a difference for people and contributing to the system."

Gill has spent the last 39 years on the bench. He has worked in the Municipal Court and currently serves the Superior Court system.

During that time, he has been the judge who greeted prospective jurors at the Hall of Justice and gave a speech telling them they were the most-important people in the room.

"I have great faith in the jury. Together, they have 500 to 600 years of common sense and life experience," he said.

Very rarely does he doubt the jury. He joked about how a jury's verdict is like a sausage.

"You don't really want to know how it's made," he said.

David Danielsen, an assistant presiding judge, said, "He's calm, thoughtful, thorough and very funny ... he's got a wry sense of humor."

Outside the courthouse, Gill serves the community and is involved with numerous nonprofits. He is involved with the Boy Scouts and is on the Eagle Board of Review.

He is on the board for Goodwill Industries and the Salvation Army, along with serving as a life member of the board of directors for Armed Services YMCA.

Gill credits his parents for ingraining in him the importance of giving back to the community.

"Every day, I remind myself how incredibly blessed I've been in my life," said Gill, who says he has no plans to retire soon. "I've been given so much in my life, and I have an obligation and responsibility to share those blessings for the benefit of others who haven't been so richly blessed."

Although Judge Gill has seen countless cases where people have made poor choices, Friday mornings give him hope.

At that time, he hears two to three petitions for certificates for rehabilitation. Still, he wishes he had a courtroom full of petitioners.

"I wish there was a line out the door of success stories," he said.

Gill wants people to realize they can overcome obstacles — to build a sense of confidence, purpose and focus in their lives.

At the end of the day, Judge Gill leaves his robe at the court but takes his heart into the community.

"I think that's what life is all about: serving your purpose and making a difference," he said.

Brother Matt Walsh survived a traumatic childhood to lead Cal State San Marcos



As student body president at Cal State San Marcos, Brother Matt Walsh counsels his fellow students to get involved, work hard and navigate the road blocks to success.

For the optimistic and ultraconfident San Marcos resident, these are more than clichéd self-help mantras. Born into the foster care system 22 years ago and abused by his adoptive mother, his childhood was scarred by poverty, neglect, hunger and homelessness. Today he leads his college campus. Tomorrow? The miniature White House made of Legos in his office offers a clue to his aspirations.

“When I was young, I had a natural ambition to succeed in life. I always knew I would make it,” he said.

The Anaheim native never met his birthparents. At age 2, he was adopted from a foster home by a Moreno Valley family that split up just two years later. For the next 10 years, he and his adoptive mother led a peripatetic existence, moving from town to town, and motel to motel, as she descended into crack cocaine and alcohol addiction.

“I didn’t have a childhood,” he said of his grade-school years in Fallbrook and Escondido. “There were no toys, no birthdays, no room of my own, but worst of all there was no love. I learned there are horrible people in this world. I saw the worst of humanity.”

Because he changed schools as often as three times a year and was a “self-diagnosed nerd,” Walsh had few long-term friends. He found an oasis in books and his education.

“School was my home,” he said. “I got good grades, I had friends there and it was where I got my meals. If I didn’t go to school, I didn’t eat, so I hated weekends and Christmas vacation.”

The first few months were rocky, but turn he did. With therapy, private school and a big Italian family that treated him like their own, Walsh graduated from Escondido Charter High School with honors and was accepted at several prestigious universities. He chose Cal State San Marcos.

Walsh got a full-ride scholarship and housing and quickly blossomed into a campus leader. He served as a dormitory adviser, joined dozens of clubs and a fraternity. He served on university boards and co-founded a campus civility campaign. Last May, he was elected the president of Associated Students Inc. He’ll serve in that post until his graduation next spring with a double major in social science and political science.

Walsh credits part of his success to ACE Scholars Services, an on-campus program that helps former foster children get into and stay in college. ACE program director Jim Mickelson said that just 1.5 percent of former foster youth nationwide will earn a college diploma, so Walsh is not only a rare success story but a role model.

Dilcie Perez, interim dean of students at Cal State San Marcos, said most people who meet Walsh would be surprised to discover his dark history because he doesn’t dwell on it and his personality is so fun-loving, quirky and thoughtful.

“He’s a servant leader with a good heart,” she said. “When I consider Matt, I know there’s hope for the future. He’s a student who doesn’t take himself too seriously. He really embraces learning and community and wants to make this place, meaning the world, a better place.”

On a wall in Brother Walsh’s office, there is an American flag and framed copies of the Constitution and Declaration of Independence. Although he’s not sure yet how he will serve his country, perhaps as an elected official or teacher, Brother Walsh said he wants to change lives.

Jerry Sanders Featured Speaker at the July Association Luncheon

“Transition from Mayor to CEO of the Greater San Diego Chamber of Commerce”

Approximately 40 brothers heard Brother Jerry Sanders speak about his transition from San Diego Mayor to his new role as CEO of the Greater San Diego Chamber of Commerce.

The San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce was founded in 1870 by Alonzo Horton with the mission to guide in the development of San Diego. Today, the Chamber is the largest nonprofit advocate for the San Diego regional business community. With nearly 3,000 members representing 400,000

employees, the Chamber is actively involved in local government, regional economic development and providing valuable resources to its members. Brother Sanders talked about the partnerships his Chamber is making with local businesses.

He then shared his thoughts on his experience as mayor, and what qualities the next mayor should have.

Brother Sanders said that when he was Mayor, he and other city leaders worked hard to fix the city during his term and he was sad to see that teamwork disintegrate in the last few months.

"What I think we need is a mayor who can bring everybody to the table, that'll accept input from business, labor, communities, neighborhoods. Somebody that can really transcend the political role and move into a healing role," he said.

He says that he's confident voters will make the right choice in the special election.

"You know, people always ask 'Did you have a great time doing it?' and I say no. It's not supposed to be fun - but it was rewarding", Brother Sanders said.

Aztecs “Head Coach in Waiting” Featured at the September Association Luncheon



Planned speaker Steve Fisher had to leave town to "hand hold" a recruit. “Head Coach in Waiting” Brian Dutcher did a great job filling in, in front of almost 50 ΣAEs and friends.

One of Steve Fisher's first moves as head coach at San Diego State was to hire Brian Dutcher as his top assistant. Dutcher had served as assistant coach and later associate head coach at Michigan under Fisher. He spent 10 seasons on the Wolverine staff, establishing himself as one of the nation's top assistant coaches. His final season in Ann Arbor ended with the Wolverines claiming the first-ever Big Ten Tournament championship.

Dutcher was named SDSU Associate Head Coach/Head Coach In Waiting in late August 2011.
