




How to be a Poet is a 21st century guide to writing by poet Jo Bell and publisher and poet Jane Commane. Aimed at emerging and professional writers, these practical one-to-one surgeries are a follow-on from the book published by Nine Arches Press in 2017.

As part of the surgeries, Jo and Jane will give feedback on up to three poems. They can also offer advice on what to do next, how to develop your writing and where to seek publication. This is a fantastic opportunity to receive feedback on your poetry, and to examine and discuss both the technical and creative dimensions of being a poet.

There are 12 surgeries available – 6 with Jo and 6 with Jane. Each surgery will last 30 minutes, and you will be asked to submit up to 3 poems for Jane or Jo to read prior to the day.

All those attending one-to-ones will also get a voucher for £5.00 off How to be a Poet, which will be available to purchase on the day.



WORKSHOP SCREENWRITING WITH MICK FORD


MANTLE LANE PRESS: SPRING SHOWCASE

2018: THE YEAR OF PUBLISHING WOMEN?

In 2015, novelist Kamila Shamsie published a provocation in *The Guardian* newspaper addressing the gender bias in publishing. In her article she also referenced the institutional tendencies privileging male authors and reviewers in the press, the imbalance between male and female writers submitted for the Man Booker Prize for Fiction, and the greater number of male protagonists in award-winning novels. In concluding the provocation, Kamila proposed something radical - make 2018 the Year of Publishing Women, in which no new titles should be written by men.

Fast forward 3 years and independent publisher And Other Stories is the only publishing house in the UK to have taken up the challenge.

So what will it take to radically transform the gender bias in publishing? How can we change the status quo? What would you like to happen? Join the debate and put your questions and ideas to the panel.

Join Catherine Mayer (writer and co-founder of the Women's Equality Party) as she discusses with Tara Tobler (Fiction Editor at And Other Stories) and Sian Norris (writer, founder and director of the Bristol Women's Literature Festival) the lack of female voices in UK publishing.

SECRET SWIMMING
WITH JENNY LANDRETH

Writers Jenny Landreth and Elizabeth-Jane Burnett share their 'waterbiographies' and discuss the transformative and life-affirming power of swimming.

Jenny Landreth's book *Swell: A Waterbiography* is part memoir, part social history. The book uncovers a world of secret swimming and focusses on the 'swimming suffragettes'. It's a story of the pioneering women who fought their way into the water, and of what they did once they got there. It is also the story of how Jenny eventually came to be a keen swimmer herself.

Elizabeth-Jane Burnett's book *Swims* is a compelling poem, that follows the author as she dives into open waters across England and Wales. Plunging into rivers, lakes and seas in a watery circuit that takes in the Ouse, the Teign, the Channel, Grasmere and King's Cross Pond in London. A sinuous, innovative debut, *Swims* reminds us of the power of swimming to transform the human spirit, registering what water gives to us and what it takes away.

IS MONOGAMY DEAD?

RETHINKING RELATIONSHIPS IN THE 21ST CENTURY

Comedian, writer and broadcaster Rosie Wilby presents a revamped edition of her comedy science show *Is Monogamy Dead?* which eventually became her award-shortlisted book of the same name (Accent Press, 2017).

A mix of memoir and humorous sociological study, *Is Monogamy Dead?* details Rosie's very personal quest – from performing stand-up at a sex party to celebrating and re-evaluating her deepest platonic friendships – to find out why Western society is clinging to a concept that is laden with assumption and ambiguity.

Through the results of her online survey asking 'What counts as "cheating"?', Rosie reveals how diverse our definitions of infidelity are and calls for more language, such as the term 'love affair friendship', to describe the huge variety of connections that we experience. She also looks at the insights we gain about instinctive male and female behaviours from studying same-sex partnerships.

MEMOIR AND AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL WRITING WITH PATRICK McGUINNESS

Autobiography and memoir are two of the most widely read and fastest-evolving forms of literature. From confessional letters and diary entries to prize-winning non-fiction and celebrity tell-alls, these genres of literature are pouring off the shelves every year and attracting both new writers and readers.

As a popular form with a dazzlingly broad range, how do you begin to tell your story and make it memorable?

Led by novelist and poet Patrick McGuinness, this workshop will explore a non-traditional approach to autobiographical writing inspired by Patrick's award-winning memoir *Other People's Countries*. There will be readings and discussions surrounding existing works, and exercises to help you develop your own writing style and techniques.

STORIES IN TRANSLATION: WHERE ARE THE WOMEN?

In the UK, just 1 in 3 books published in translation are written by women.

Continuing our women in publishing theme, this event will discuss and explore thoughts and perspectives on why women are still hugely under-represented in the world of literary translation. Our event will also showcase some of the initiatives that are leading the way to promote more awareness such as the 'Warwick Prize for Women in Translation' and 'Women in Translation Month'. Our panel will also discuss how the translation process works and how books in translation are received in the UK.

Our panel will include Chantal Wright (Professor at the University of Warwick and co-ordinator of the 'Warwick Prize for Women in Translation'), Rosalind Harvey (award winning literary translator), Chilean writer Alia Trabucco Zerán and Anna Glendenning (Fiction Editor at And Other Stories).

The discussion will be chaired by Olga Castro (Lecturer in Translation Studies at Aston University).

THE LIBRARIAN BY SALLEY **VICKERS**



Salley Vickers is the author of nine highly acclaimed novels, including Miss Garnet's Angel, The Cleaner of Chartres and Cousins, as well as two short story collections.

The Librarian depicts Sylvia Blackwell, a young woman in her twenties who moves to East Mole, a quaint market town in middle England, to start a new job as a children's librarian. However the apparently pleasant town is not all it seems. Sylvia falls in love with an older man - but it's her connection to his precocious young daughter and her neighbour's son which will change her life and put them, the library and her job under threat.

The character Sylvia Blackwell is based on a children's librarian who radically affected Salley's own childhood, introducing her to the children's authors who in turn, inspired her to become a writer.

PROTEST: STORIES OF RESISTANCE

WITH ALEXEI SAYLE AND KIT DE WAAL

Whatever happened to British protest?

For a nation that brought the world Chartism, the Suffragettes, the Tolpuddle Martyrs, and so many other grassroots social movements, Britain rarely celebrates its long tradition of people power.

A timely and evocative collection. *Protest:* Stories of Resistance includes contributions by 20 authors who have re-imagined key moments of British protest - from the Peasants' Revolt of 1381 to the anti-Iraq war demo of 2003. Written in close consultation with historians, sociologists and eyewitnesses - who also contribute to the afterword - these stories follow fictional characters caught up in real-life struggles, offering a street-level perspective on the noble art of resistance.

We are delighted to bring together Liverpoolborn author and comedian Alexei Sayle and Birmingham novelist Kit De Waal to discuss their stories on the anti-Vietnam War demonstration and Malcolm X's visit to Smethwick. Kit will be joined by historical consultant and equal rights activist Avtar Jouhl to discuss her story, and the event will be chaired by the book's editor, Ra Page.




A HISTORY OF BRITAIN IN 21 WOMEN BY JENNI MURRAY
